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each chapter has three types of learning aides for students open ended questions multiple choice questions and quantitative problems there is an average of about 50 per chapter there are also a number of worked examples in the chapters averaging over 5 per chapter and almost 600 photos and line drawings

an accessible undergraduate textbook on the essential math concepts used in the life sciences the life sciences deal with a vast array of problems at different spatial temporal and organizational scales the mathematics necessary to describe model and analyze these problems is similarly diverse incorporating quantitative techniques that are rarely taught in standard undergraduate courses this textbook provides an accessible introduction to these critical mathematical concepts linking them to biological observation and theory while also presenting the computational tools needed to address problems not readily investigated using mathematics alone proven in the classroom and requiring only a background in high school math mathematics for the life sciences doesn't just focus on calculus as do most other textbooks on the subject it covers deterministic methods and those that incorporate uncertainty problems in discrete and continuous time probability graphing and data analysis matrix modeling difference equations differential equations and much more the book uses matlab throughout explaining how to use it write code and connect models to data in examples chosen from across the life sciences provides undergraduate life science students with a succinct overview of major mathematical concepts that are essential for modern biology covers
