from the scream of psycho to the psycho of scream the horror movie survival guide is your essential source for information on the creatures and monsters that darken your daydreams and stalk your nightmares separated into five identifiable categories aliens beasts creations psychopaths and the supernatural each horrific entity is presented with a full description an overview of unnatural habits and tips on how to destroy it this definitive handbook also includes a directory of horror films so you know where to find your favorite monsters thirty photographs of the baddest of the bad and a list ranking the worst creatures to grace the silver screen by their number of kills so the next time you're confronted by the supernatural the extraterrestrial or the unclassifiable look in here for all the facts and run like hell

horror films can be profound fables of human nature and important works of art yet many people dismiss them out of hand horror and the horror film conveys a mature appreciation for horror films along with a comprehensive view of their narrative strategies their relations to reality and fantasy and their cinematic power the volume covers the horror film and its subgenres such as the vampire movie from 1896 to the present it covers the entire genre by considering every kind of monster in it including the human

why do so many of us enjoy being told frightening stories what are some of the consequences that result from such exposure in light of the considerable popularity of horror films over the last three decades these questions have become the focus of growing attention for many scholars however research on audience preferences for and reactions to horror films has been performed eclectically by investigators from varied theoretical and methodological backgrounds as a result the information has not been effectively integrated

this volume was written to address this problem and to position the study of audience responses to frightening fiction as a significant research topic

critics have traditionally characterized classic horror by its use of shadow and suggestion yet the graphic nature of early 1930s films only came to light in the home video dvd era along with gangster movies and sex pictures horror films drew audiences during the great depression with sensational content exploiting a loophole in the hays code which made no provision for on screen gruesomeness studios produced remarkably explicit films that were recut when the code was more rigidly enforced from 1934 this led to a modern misperception that classic horror was intended to be safe and reassuring to audiences the author examines the 1931 to 1936 happy ending horror in relation to industry practices and censorship early works like murders in the rue morgue 1932 and the raven 1935 may be more akin to the texas chain saw massacre 1974 and hostel 2005 than many critics believe

the genre's target group monster movies always deal with the irresistible temptation of the unknown and forbidden and therefore shock with a horrific impact of terrifying elements since horror and monster movies stand for an important part of the american film industry and with it of its popular culture throughout the last eight decades it is useful to look at the development of the horror genre in its historical and cultural context and thus to focus again on the question of interpretive perspective as horror movies despite all obscurity still deal with real fears of a society or the urge to break with social conventions concentrating on the change of themes styles and characters of the genre means to learn more about the american collective consciousness and what was bothering a whole society during the 20th century

when the texas chain saw massacre first hit movie screens in 1974 it was both reviled and championed to critics it was either a degrading senseless misuse of film and time or an intelligent absorbing and deeply disturbing horror film however it was an immediate hit with audiences banned and celebrated showcased at the cannes film festival and included in the new york moma's collection it has now come to be recognized widely as one of the greatest horror movies of all time a six foot four poet fresh out of grad school with limited acting experience gunnar hansen played the masked chain saw wielding leatherface his terrifying portrayal and the inventive work of the cast and crew would give the film the authentic power of nightmare even while the gritty grueling and often dangerous independent production would test everyone involved and lay the foundations for myths surrounding the film that endure even today critically acclaimed author hansen here tells the real story of the making of the film its release and reception offering unknown behind the scenes details a harrowingly entertaining account of the adventures of low budget filmmaking illuminating insights on the film's enduring and influential place in the horror genre and our culture and a thoughtful meditation on why we love to be scared in the first place
