minority entrepreneurship reviews the economic and sociological literature on the topic of minority entrepreneurship while economists and sociologists have written most of the influential studies these groups typically ask different questions and base their analysis on different assumptions the literature predictably lacks a single unifying focus and is quite diverse regarding issues explored and methodological approaches employed differing approaches and their outcomes are summarized and critically probed in this monograph with the intent to illuminate strengths and weaknesses along with patterns of common findings in this voluminous literature minority owned businesses are collectively reflections of evolving constraints and opportunities

operating in broader society minorities seeking to create viable business ventures have traditionally faced higher barriers than whites as they sought to exploit market opportunities raise financing and penetrate mainstream networks entrepreneurial dynamics are clarified by focusing upon specific contexts in which firms are being shaped by prevailing opportunity structures progress has been noteworthy overall for minority owned businesses in part because barriers impeding their collective development have been gradually declining minority entrepreneurship shows that the dominant methodological approaches and findings of economists and sociologists in the minority entrepreneurship literature are highly complementary sociologists have posed bolder questions while economists have paid more attention to pinning down cause and effect relationships yet their findings have been gradually moving towards convergence over the past two decades this monograph posits that it is possible and desirable that these respective bodies of work may someday merge creating a minority entrepreneurship scholarly synthesis

how do americans develop business enterprises for community and individual economic stability this book emphasizes immigrant and minority entrepreneurship providing rich historical research and recent analyses of these issues the authors show that an analysis of the 1910 data reveals that black americans were more likely than white americans to be employers and almost as likely as whites to be selfemployed we also learn that the immigrant experience includes unauthorized aliens poverty and the rise of vibrant business communities

this book features contributions by international scholars who have worked to establish a theory and empirics based discussion on disadvantaged minorities and long term economic development depending on their socio demographic characteristics minorities have long lived under the shadow of the groups categories or communities they presumably belong to despite the obstacles they have to face they manage to demonstrate that above all they are entrepreneurs capable to start run and successfully complete their venture their motivations are often assimilated by the research community into necessity entrepreneurship in addition to the external barriers they face they have to overcome endogenous cognitive factors that hinder their entrepreneurial intention anxiety before the future the anguish of death generativity health condition as perceived by others subjective age and the cultural gap as viewed by natives among others the book integrates a diversity of challenges and disadvantages faced by entrepreneurs allowing the reader to have a renewed understanding of entrepreneurial behavior on the theoretical level the chapters emphasize the need for integrating entrepreneurship theory with multidisciplinary approaches such as the theory of cumulative disadvantage advantage cda cultural and geographical theories and

minority entrepreneurship 2.0 examines the unique challenges facing minorities pursuing entrepreneurial alternatives in very specific social political historical and economic contexts and these contexts differ from nation to nation this monograph examines the different contexts in which black and asian owners have run their firms since the late 19th century in sociological terms the kinds of firms they owned and the way these owners operated their firms were heavily shaped by the differing contexts in which they were embedded key factors shaping mbes in america differ substantially from the relevant contextual factors operative in england or france or germany

how does gender and minority status shape entrepreneurial decision making this question seems long overdue since minority women in the us start new businesses at four times the rate of non minority men and women this book is about minority women entrepreneurs in the united states though these women are thriving as business owners their stories are very seldom told and few think of minority women as successful entrepreneurs therefore the first purpose of the book is to give voice and visibility to us minority women business owners the second purpose is to explain what makes these women different from the standard white male business owners most people are familiar with through in depth interviews and first hand accounts from minority women entrepreneurs the authors found that in innovative and exciting ways minority women use their outsider status to develop socially conscious business practices that support the communities with which they identify they reject the idea that business values are separate from personal values and instead balance profits with social good and environmental sustainability this pattern is repeated in statistical evidence from around the globe that women contribute a much higher percentage of their earnings to social good than do men but until now there was no clear explanation of why using sociological and psychological theories the authors explain why women especially minority women have a tendency to create socially responsible businesses the innovations provided by the women in this study suggest fresh solutions to economic inequality and humanistic alternatives to exploitative business policies this is a radically new socially integrated model that can be used by businesses everywhere this book is intended for undergraduate and graduate students of business sociology race and gender studies as well as practitioners of entrepreneurship aspiring entrepreneurs and

all those looking for new examples of holistic sustainable and socially responsible business practices

in their powerful presentation of minorities in entrepreneurship the authors go beyond the traditional definitions of entrepreneurship to enhance our understanding of minority groups whether they be younger older women ethnic immigrant lgb disabled or indigenous the book provides a new perspective on the driving forces in becoming a business owner and the push and pull factors within and across groups enhanced by in depth case studies of members in each group the study is a valuable contribution to the understanding of all venture owners a rich reference source for scholars and a worthwhile book of readings for students in the fields of entrepreneurship and gender and diversity dorothy perrin moore the citadel in charleston south carolina us there are books on minorities and there are books on entrepreneurship but there are no books combining the two and amongst a wide range of minorities in society this truly is a novel and innovative work and should be essential reading for all interested this topic cary l cooper cbe lancaster university management school uk although there is an expanding body of literature on the characteristics aspirations motivations challenges and barriers of mainstream entrepreneurs relatively little is known about whether these findings can be applied to the entrepreneurial activities of minority groups this book addresses this short fall and presents an international review of the characteristics motivations and obstacles of eight minority groups younger older women ethnic immigrant lesbian gay and bisexual disabled and indigenous entrepreneurs the expert contributors discover enormous variability between these minority groups such as in the motivators that either pushed or pulled individuals into an entrepreneurial venture as well as diverse attitudes toward success some groups wanted to achieve financial security others wanted to enhance their sense of self worth or to change existing social and economic circumstances however some striking similarities were noted initial disadvantage often created a powerful impetus to starting up a business venture and accessing finance was extremely difficult for many including comparative cross cultural data and case studies on the various minority groups reviewed both post graduate students and undergraduate students studying entrepreneurship will find this book an invaluable resource in addition it will also be of interest to policy makers governments and all those who wish to comprehend the nature of small business ownership for a wide range of minority business owners

whilst there has been an increased interest in minorities and their contribution to society the literature on minorities and under represented communities is still weak this edited volume discusses entrepreneurship in the context of minorities and the role they play in

society the book looks at under represented communities such as lgbtq disadvantaged ethnic minority religious entrepreneurs medically limited indigenous refugees young old and other socio economic segments it provides a holistic comprehensive overview of how diversity in entrepreneurship facilitates increased levels of innovation the book will be amongst the first to take a broad perspective of minority entrepreneurs

entrepreneurship is challenging whatever your background in the current science and technology driven western world however unlike traditionally dominant native born white male entrepreneurs in silicon valley and elsewhere those who face greater hurdles blocking their path to success primarily come from marginalized and minority groups both real and self perceived including immigrants refugees women blacks hispanics and asians despite their potential to innovate and add value in the global marketplace they persistently struggle or fail because they lack the requisite code breaking skills this book helps these underdog entrepreneurs acquire those skills with actionable advice to achieve and sustain success it proposes a framework that pinpoints what the author calls the outsider problem that is situations in which individuals are primarily disadvantaged because they lack access to networks that facilitate superior learning and performance outcomes he completes the framework by incorporating personal qualities and strategies that can solve this problem along the way morgan distills insights and evidence from multiple fields combined with a fresh look at the familiar stories of initially marginalized business leaders such as indra nooyi jack ma hilary devey and mike lazaridis he also shares the less known but equally inspiring stories of others this book will help readers thrive while transcending their underdog status

recent literature claims that minority entrepreneurship is changing e g entering non ethnic sectors a change partly related to spatial transformations such as gentrification in neighbourhoods where minorities are settled and to policies affecting their ventures this article aims to disentangle how targeted and general policies affect minority entrepreneurship in neighbourhoods characterised by ethnic and class diversity in copenhagen istanbul milan and warsaw based on a comparative analysis of qualitative interviews this article aims to answer the following questions how do changes in neighbourhoods characterised by population diversity affect minority entrepreneurship are policies especially those at city and neighbourhood level including regeneration measures sustaining or challenging minority entrepreneurship our findings show that despite local variations in terms of political economy welfare structure and urban governance notwithstanding displacing effects related to national and local policies many minority businesses are responsive to neighbourhood changes and succeed to extend their market range beyond the ethnic or impoverished clientele

the global economy threatens the uniqueness of places people and experiences in here and there bill conlogue tests the assumption that literature and local places matter less and less in a world that economists describe as flat politicians believe has globalized and social scientists imagine as a global village each chapter begins at home journeys elsewhere and returns to the author s native and chosen region northeastern pennsylvania through the prisms of literature and history the book explores tensions and conflicts within the region tensions and conflicts created by national and global demand for the area s resources fertile farmland forest products anthracite coal and college educated young people making connections between local and global environmental issues here and there uses the pennsylvania watersheds of urban lackawanna and rural lackawaxen to highlight the importance of understanding and protecting the places we call home

entrepreneurship is an extremely important but little understood component of the u s economy this book aids that understanding by exploring the challenges and outcomes of the start up phases of new firms this is the first detailed large scale longitudinally based analysis of the entrepreneurial process three representative samples of new firms and two representative samples of nascent entrepreneurs those attempting to start new firms are used to consider a variety of factors that affect successful completion of the major transitions in the life of new businesses conception birth and early development survival and growth surprisingly a substantial minority of start ups become operational new firms among the many lessons the authors learn are that although new firm growth appears to reflect many factors initial size is of special consequence not only are many general insights for entrepreneurs revealed but the authors also pay special attention to the involvement of women and minorities in entrepreneurship and suggest effective government policy for different stages in the entrepreneurial process

minority business enterprises play a significant role in evolving the u s economy and contributing to its gross domestic product although entrepreneurs seek independence and the rewards of entrepreneurship corporate financing may be a necessitate to begin or continue the life of a business however finding engaging and securing capital is an ongoing problem for some that extend beyond existing discriminatory barriers such as race gender ethnic origin or geographical positioning the objective of this phenomenological inquiry is to investigate an additional obstacle encountered when

seeking business financing and explore whether the educational level of an applicant is a factor the design utilized a conceptualization adapted from Gary Becker's economics of discrimination theory to explore whether educational level plays a role in the process the framework investigated the lived experiences of minority entrepreneurs in the St. Louis metropolitan area in a closed ended survey in which educational levels are evaluated similarly to other established biases this new research direction is consistent with similar research yet expands it to uncover an additional bias and determinant of corporate financing this study contributes to existing business theories and further develops the knowledge in business by analyzing financial processes relating to MBEs and minority entrepreneurs funding experiences the results indicate an involvement between the educational level of minority entrepreneurs and existing barriers and the level of education as a perceived bias these findings are significant because recognizing discriminatory behaviors and economic barriers can emancipate a minority business owner and rechannel their corporate financing experiences

first published in 2000 the invisible hand of the market cannot conceal color this study contends that the economy is an extension of society's system of racial and ethnic stratification the central argument of this study is that the internal colonial paradigm should be used as a guiding principle in the analysis of minority business development in minority markets through the use of this paradigm the institutional constraints of doing business in a minority market can be identified the ethnic beauty aids industry was selected as the subject of this case study because it is embedded in the context of minority markets which entail high concentrations of minority entrepreneurs and consumers minority entrepreneurs enter minority markets to avoid racial barriers they perceive in the mainstream economy and minority consumers find minority markets more accessible and responsive to their consumption needs

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
