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this series of essays by prominent academics and practitioners investigates in detail the history of performance in the classical greek and roman world beginning with the earliest examples of dramatic presentation in the epic cycles and reaching through to the latter days of the roman empire and beyond this 2007 companion covers many aspects of these broad presentational societies dramatic performances that are text based form only one part of cultures where presentation is a major element of all social and political life individual chapters range across a two thousand year timescale and include specific chapters on acting traditions masks properties playing places festivals religion and drama comedy and society and commodity concluding with the dramatic legacy of myth and the modern media the book addresses the needs of students of drama and classics as well as anyone with an interest in the theatre s history and practice

many dogmas regarding greek theatre were established by researchers who

lacked experience in the mounting of theatrical productions in his wide ranging and provocative study clifford ashby a theatre historian trained in the practical processes of play production as well as the methods of historical research takes advantage of his understanding of technical elements to approach his ancient subject from a new perspective in doing so he challenges many long held views archaeological and written sources relating to greek classical theatre are diverse scattered and disconnected ashby s own and memorable fieldwork led him to more than one hundred theatre sites in greece southern italy sicily and albania and as far into modern turkey as hellenic civilization had penetrated from this extensive research he draws a number of novel revisionist conclusions on the nature of classical theatre architecture and production the original orchestra shape for example was a rectangle or trapezoid rather than a circle the altar sat along the edge of the orchestra not at its middle the scene house was originally designed for a performance event that did not use an up center door the crane and ekkyklema were simple devices while the periaktoi probably did not exist before the renaissance greek theatres were not built with attention to vitruvius injunction against a southern orientation and were probably sun sited on the basis of seasonal touring the greeks arrived at the theatre around mid morning not in the cold light of dawn only the three actor rule emerges from this eclectic examination somewhat intact but with the division of roles reconsidered upon the basis of the actors performance needs ashby also proposes methods that can be employed in future studies of greek theatre final chapters examine the three actor production of ion how one should not approach theatre history and a shining example of how one should ashby s lengthy hands on training and his knowledge of theatre history provide a broad understanding of the ways that theatre has operated through the ages as well as an ability to extrapolate from production techniques of other times and places

a new and definitive guide to the theatre of the ancient world the guide to greek theatre and drama is a meticulously researched and accessible survey into the place and purpose of theatre in ancient greece it provides a comprehensive author by author examination of the surviving plays of aeschylus sophocles euripides aristophanes and menander as well as giving an insight into how and where the plays were performed who acted them out and who watched them it includes a fascinating discussion of the function of the essential characteristics of greek drama including verse rhetoric music comedy and chorus above all it offers a fascinating viewpoint onto the everyday values of the ancient greeks values with a continuing influence over the theatre of the present day

peter arnott discusses greek drama not as an antiquarian study but as a living art form he removes the plays from the library and places them firmly in the theatre that gave them being invoking the practical realities of stagecraft he illuminates the literary patterns of the plays the performance disciplines and the audience responses each component of the productions audience chorus actors costume speech is examined in the context of its own society and of theatre practice in general with examples from other cultures professor arnott places great emphasis on the practical staging of greek plays and how the buildings themselves imposed

particular constraints on actors and writers alike above all he sets out to make practical sense of the construction of greek plays and their organic relationship to their original setting

a history of ancient greek drama including discussion of the drama competition oedipus the king actors and the chorus playwrights and the legacy of greece

this is a meticulously researched survey into the place and purpose of theatre in ancient greece it examines the surviving plays of aeschylus sophocles euripides aristophanes and menander as well as giving an insight into how and where the plays were performed who acted them out and who watched them

the aim of this book is to explore the definitions of theatre and metatheatre that scholars use when studying the ancient greek world although in modern languages their meaning is mostly straightforward both concepts become problematical when applied to ancient reality in fact theatre as well as metatheatre are used in many different sometimes even contradictory ways by modern scholars through a series of papers examining questions related to ancient greek theatre and dramatic performances of various genres the use of those two terms is problematized and put into question must ancient greek theatre be reduced to what was performed in proper theatre buildings and is everything that was performed within such buildings to be considered as theatre how does the definition of what is considered as theatre evolve from one period to the other as for metatheatre the discussion revolves around the interaction between reality and fiction in dramatic pieces of all genres the various definitions of metatheatre are also explored and explicated by the papers gathered in this volume as well as the question of the distinction between paratheatre understood as paratragedy comedy and metatheatre readers will be encouraged by the diversity of approaches presented in this book to re think their own understanding and use of theatre and metatheatre when examining ancient greek reality

aristophanes has enjoyed a conspicuous revival in nineteenth and twentieth century greece here gonda van steen provides the first critical analysis of the role of the classical athenian playwright in modern greek culture explaining how the sociopolitical venom of aristophanes' verses remains relevant and appealing to modern greek audiences deriding or challenging well known figures and conservative values aristophanes' comedies transgress authority and continue to speak to many social groups in greece who have found in him a witty pointed and accessible champion from their native tradition the book addresses the broader issues reflected in the poet's revival political and linguistic nationalism literary and cultural authenticity versus creativity censorship and social strife van steen's discussion ranges from attitudes toward aristophanes before and during greece's war of independence in the 1820s to those during the cold war from feminist debates to the significance of the popular music integrated into comic revival

productions from the havoc transvestite adaptations wreaked on gender roles to the political protest symbolized by karolos koun's directorial choices crossing boundaries of classical philology critical theory and performance studies the book encourages us to reassess aristophanes comedies as both play acts and modern methods of communication van steen uses material never before accessible in english as she proves that aristophanes remains greece's immortal comic genius and political voice

surveys important greek and roman authors plays characters genres historical figures and more

in theatre in ancient greek society the author examines the social setting and function of ancient greek theatre through the thousand years of its performance history instead of using written sources which were intended only for a small educated section of the population he draws most of his evidence from a wide range of archaeological material from cheap mass produced vases and figurines to elegant silverware produced for the dining tables of the wealthy this is the first study examining the function and impact of the theatre in ancient greek society by employing an archaeological approach

classical drama on the modern stage as a cultural and political phenomenon is scholarly trailed since the 1950s and 60s and intensified in the last third of the twentieth century the evidence is being extensively documented pioneered by walton 1987 and mcdonald 1992 and subsequently developed by collaborative research projects which include published databases it is clear from the work of these projects that performance of classical drama is a major feature in all types of theatre avant garde and experimental student international and fringe epic and classical commercial popular and canonical this means that it is closely intertwined with the politics of locale environment and geography as well as of language translation and culture each of the essays has a specialised contribution to make however the total impact of the whole section will be even greater than the sum of the parts because the authors not only intersect in their discussions of common concerns in modern performance of ancient drama but also provide case studies that will add to the knowledge base and critical acumen of everyone working in the field

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in this volume the leading experts on ancient greek theatre architecture present new excavation results and new analyses of individual monuments many well known theatres such as the one of dionysos in athens and others at for instance messene sikyon chaironeia in greece and aphrodisias in turkey have been re examined since their original publication with stunning results new research also includes less well known or newly discovered ancient greek theatres in albania turkey cyprus and sicily further studies on the history of research regional theatrical developments terminology and function as well as a perspective on roman theatres built in greek traditions make this volume a comprehensive book of new research for specialist scholars as well as for students and the interested public fundamental publications on the topic have not been presented for many years and this book aims to form a new foundation for the study of theatre architecture

age old scholarly dogma holds that the death of serious theatre went hand in hand with the death of the city state and that the fourth century bc ushered in an era of theatrical mediocrity offering shallow entertainment to a depoliticised citizenry the traditional view of fourth century culture is encouraged and sustained by the absence of dramatic texts in anything more than fragments until recently little attention was paid to an enormous array of non literary evidence attesting not only the sustained vibrancy of theatrical culture but a huge expansion of theatre throughout and even beyond the greek world epigraphic historiographic iconographic and archaeological evidence indicates that the fourth century bc was an age of exponential growth in theatre it saw the construction of permanent stone theatres across and beyond the mediterranean world the addition of theatrical events to existing festivals the creation of entirely new contexts for drama and vast investment both public and private in all areas of what was rapidly becoming a major industry this is the first book to explore all the evidence for fourth century ancient theatre its architecture drama dissemination staging reception politics social impact finance and memorialisation
