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educational research and poetics are often not included in the same conversation educational poetics inquiry freedom and innovative necessity is one of the only texts to explore the possibilities of linking these domains to develop an emergent form of inquiry such an inquiry utilizes our human potential to go beyond the seductive force of everyday commonsense to consider and put into place alternative perspectives that are often hidden from view these alternative perspectives in turn help create the ability to free ourselves from mental slavery as we change in inventive ways a form of innovative necessity

this book is an accessible reference guide to the key concepts associated with argumentation theory criticism and pedagogy providing an encyclopedic style synthesis the book defines and describes 175 essential concepts of argumentation and provides discussion of the meaning application and impact as well as offering suggestions for further reading readers are introduced to foundational reasoning methods deductive inductive and abductive as well as key argumentative models such as the toulmin model and pragma dialectics the text delves into the identification and analysis of fallacies the evaluation of evidence and the crucial roles of context audience adaptation and argumentative style it explores the ethical dimensions of argument the impact of cognitive bias and the influence of cultural and discourse communities the first of its kind and a key entry point to understanding the fundamental principles of the field this guidebook is ideal for undergraduate and graduate courses in argumentation debate rhetoric and communication studies as well as other related disciplines it will also be of interest to the general reader looking to improve their analytical and decision making abilities

this book reviews what the authors term advocacy research in literacy education research that explicitly addresses issues of social justice equity and democracy with the distinct purpose of social transformation it surveys what educational researchers who are working for social justice have accomplished describes current challenges and outlines future possibilities the first section maps the terrain of advocacy research in literacy education the authors group this large and expanding body of research into four categories critical literacy ies radical counternarratives in literacy research literacy as social practice and linguistic studies each chapter describes the research area traces its history provides example

studies and assesses the contributions of research to advocacy work now and potentially in the future the second section provides a deeper consideration of challenges to the field of advocacy research and suggests future directions for research and scholarship this section reflects the need to complicate and trouble the terms and relations between and among social justice ethics democracy freedom and literacy as a whole this book is a response to the current popular understandings of literacy education that limit the efficacy of advocacy work in these troubled times understandings that support the proliferation of standardized testing teacher testing and scripted lessons and programs along with the privileging of particular forms of research intended for those who work or soon will work in literacy education students teacher educators researchers and practitioners this book represents the authors belief that it is time for advocacy workers to strengthen and intensify their efforts to promote the most principled effective literacy education for democratic life it is their hope that this book will contribute to such an effort

the political economy of expertise is a carefully argued examination of how legislatures use expert research and testimony kevin esterling demonstrates that interest groups can actually help the legislative process by encouraging congress to assess research and implement well informed policies more than mere touts for the interests of washington insiders these groups encourage congress to enact policies that are likely to succeed while avoiding those that have too great of a risk of failure the surprising result is greater legislative efficiency the political economy of expertise illustrates that this system actually favors effective and informed decision making thereby increasing the likelihood that new policies will benefit the american public kevin m esterling is assistant professor at the university of california riverside
