this handbook provides a critical guide to the most central proposition in modern linguistics the notion generally known as universal grammar that a universal set of structural principles underlies the grammatical diversity of the world s languages part i considers the implications of universal grammar for philosophy of mind and the philosophy of language and examines the history of the theory part ii focuses on linguistic theory looking at topics such as explanatory adequacy and how phonology and semantics fit into universal grammar parts iii and iv look respectively at the insights derived from ug inspired research on language acquisition and at comparative syntax and language typology while part v considers the evidence for universal grammar in phenomena such as creoles language pathology and sign language the book will be a vital reference for linguists philosophers and cognitive scientists

this introductory guide to language acquisition research is presented within the framework of universal grammar a theory of the human faculty for language the authors focus on two experimental techniques for assessing children s linguistic competence the elicited production task a production task and the truth value judgment task a comprehension task their methodologies are designed to overcome the numerous obstacles to empirical investigation of children s language competence they produce research results that are more reproducible and less likely to be dismissed as an artifact of improper experimental procedure in the first section of the book the authors examine the fundamental assumptions that guide research in this area they present both a theory of linguistic competence and a model of language processing in the following two sections they discuss in detail their two experimental techniques

the 3rd edition of chomsky s universal grammar introduces the reader to noam chomsky s theory of language by setting the specifics of syntactic analysis in the framework of his general ideas updated and revised to include a broader range of issues and discussion topics traces the development of chomsky s thinking and of the minimalist program since 1995 providing a new picture of this current model of syntactic theory introduces both the general concepts of the theory of universal grammar and

the main areas of syntax such as x bar theory movement and government binding theory includes discussion topics exercises and suggestions for further readings in each chapter

this collection of 15 articles reflects edward keenan s long standing research interests in the comparative syntax of the languages of the world it includes two seminal foundation articles noun phrase accessibility and universal grammar with bernard comrie and towards a universal definition of subject of most of the other articles have appeared in a variety of relatively inaccessible places and so this book brings together for the first time a large body of work supporting the research directions taken in the foundation articles in addition one article of a psycholinguistic sort was specially prepared for this volume

this book develops a bold new approach to universal grammar based on research findings of the natural semantic metalanguage nsm program the key idea is that universal grammar is constituted by the inherent grammatical properties of some 60 empirically established semantic primes which appear to have concrete exponents in all languages for six typologically divergent languages mangaaba mbula mandarin chinese lao malay spanish and polish contributors identify exponents of the primes and work through a substantial set of hypotheses about their combinatorics valency properties complementation options etc each study can also be read as a semantically based typological profile four theoretical chapters

by the editors describe the nsm approach and its application to grammatical typology as a study of empirical universals in grammar this book is unique for its rigorous semantic orientation its methodological consistency and its wealth of cross linguistic detail

seminar paper from the year 2006 in the subject english language and literature studies linguistics grade 1 3 university of cologne englisches seminar course research in language acquisition language english abstract if we take for granted that children acquire their first language with the help of an innate language acquisition device containing universal grammar is it likely that the acquisition of a second language works in the same way is universal grammar still the driving force or did the prerequisites for the acquisition change in a way that learners need to consult other means and resources like only their general cognitive abilities and learning strategies there are many points in which first and second language acquisition differ it is these differences that made linguists doubt that first and second language acquisition are entirely the same process this paper is concerned with the question whether universal grammar is still available for second language learners and whether the mental grammar of l2 learners shows signs of impairment after a short introduction to the concept of universal grammar in first language acquisition it will turn to universal grammar in second language acquisition in this context it will be considered whether the interlanguage grammar might be impaired and whether ug is probable to influence second language acquisition several theories of second language acquisition will be presented in advance to the discussion whether learners are likely to have full access partial access or no access to universal grammar before being concluded it will take a short look at the problems that arise in second language research

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
