widely recognized as the finest definition of existentialist philosophy ever written this book introduced existentialism to america in 1958 barrett speaks eloquently and directly to concerns of the 1990s a period when the irrational and the absurd are no better integrated than before and when humankind is in even greater danger of destroying its existence without ever understanding the meaning of its existence irrational man begins by discussing the roots of existentialism in the art and thinking of augustine aquinas pascal baudelaire blake dostoevski tolstoy hemingway picasso joyce and beckett the heart of the book explains the views of the foremost existentialists kierkegaard nietzsche heidegger and sartre the result is a marvelously lucid definition of existentialism and a brilliant interpretation of its impact

a collection of one man's essays in book form tends to be viewed today with some suspicion if not hostility by philosophical critics it would seem that the author is guilty of an academic sin of pride causing or helping to cause separately conceived articles to surpass their original station and assume a new life a grander articulation it can hardly be denied that the essays which follow must face this sullen charge for they were composed at different times for different sorts of audiences and for the most part have already been published their appearance in a new form will not allay commonplace criticisms there are repetitions certain key terms are defined and defined again in various places a few quotations reappear and beyond this the essays are unequal in range depth and fundamental intent but it is what brings these essays together that constitutes i trust their collective merit underlying the special arguments that are to be found in each of the chapters is a particular sense of reality not a thesis or a theory but rather a way of seeing the world and of appreciating its texture and design it is that sense of reality that i should like to speak of here philosophy stands in a paradoxical relationship to mundane existence it is at once its critique and one of its possibilities

while existentialism has long been associated with parisian left bank philosophers sipping cocktails in smoke filled cafés or with a brooding angst filled outlook on life gosetti ferencei shows how vital and heterogeneous the movement really was in this concise accessible book gosetti ferencei offers a new vision of existentialism as she lucidly demonstrates existentialism is a rich and diverse philosophy that encourages meaningful engagement with the world around us offering a host of fascinating concepts that pertain to life as we experience it the movement was as heterogeneous as it is now misunderstood influenced by jazz music involving diverse thinkers from around the world challenging received ideas about the meaning of human existence part of the difficulty in defining existentialism is that it was never a unified philosophy but came to identify a set of shared concerns about the meaning and possibility of human freedom as it may be expressed in authentic choices actions and projects existentialists all explored how in the absence of traditional reassurances about the meaning of life we may transcend our present circumstances and give our situation new meaning with existentialism concrete lived experience of the single individual emerged from the shadow of abstract systems and long defended traditions and became subject matter in its own right for philosophical inquiry far from solipsistic gosetti ferencei shows that existentialist attention to the human self can be intertwined with ways of conceiving the world our being with others the earth and the encompassing concept of being fully appreciating what existentialism has to offer requires recognizing the rich diversity of its prospects which involve not only anxiety absurdity awareness of death and the loss of religious meaning but also hope the striving for happiness and a sense of the transcendent on being and becoming unpacks this philosophical movement s insights and reveals how its core ideas promote creative responses to the question of life s meaning

existentialism is not merely a philosophical doctrine but a living breathing confrontation with what it means to be human it is a call to face the raw realities of existence freedom responsibility anxiety alienation and ultimately death without retreating into comforting illusions this book is born out of that call to explore unpack and wrestle with the core ideas of existentialist thought not from the distance of academic abstraction but from within the very questions that define our lives the existentialist tradition is broad diverse and sometimes internally contradictory it includes thinkers as different in style and emphasis as søren kierkegaard friedrich nietzsche jean paul sartre simone de beauvoir albert camus martin heidegger and maurice merleau ponty some rooted their reflections in theology others were staunch atheists some spoke of absurdity others of transcendence but what unites them is a shared concern the centrality of individual existence in an often indifferent or unknowable universe existentialism arose in a modern world disoriented by the collapse of traditional values the disintegration of religious authority the trauma of war and the alienation of industrial society it gave voice to a generation asking not what should i believe but how should i live and who am i when all the roles and certainties fall away these are not questions with definitive answers they are lived questions answers are provisional contingent and must be earned through experience not received by doctrine this book does not pretend to provide the final word on existentialism instead it aims to guide readers through its major themes and figures to offer a map for navigating its often challenging terrain from kierkegaard s leap of faith and nietzsche s proclamation of the death of god to sartre s radical freedom and camus s myth of sisyphus we will examine how existentialists have approached the problem of meaning in a world where meaning is not given existentialism is sometimes caricatured as dark nihilistic or

pessimistic certainly it does not flinch from despair but at its heart existentialism is profoundly liberating it tells us that though we are thrown into a world not of our choosing we are not defined by our circumstances we are free and with that freedom comes the burden and the beauty of shaping a life that is authentically our own in this sense existentialism is not a philosophy of defeat but one of courage as you read you may find that existentialism doesn't offer comfort but it does offer clarity it asks you to look honestly at yourself and your condition to resist the seductions of evasion and bad faith and to take responsibility for the shape of your life that is its enduring power and its enduring challenge whether you are encountering these ideas for the first time or returning to them with new eyes i invite you to read this book not only with the intellect but with the whole of your being existentialism is not just something to be studied it is something to be lived

recently there has been a growing interest not only in existentialism but also in existential questions as well as key figures in existential thinking yet despite this renewed interest a systematic reconsideration of kierkegaard's existential approach is missing this anthology is the first in a series of three that will attempt to fill this lacuna the 13 chapters of the first anthology deal with various aspects of kierkegaard's existential approach its reception will be examined in the works of influential philosophers such as heidegger gadamer and habermas as well as in lesser known philosophers from the interwar period such as jean wahl lev shestov and benjamin fondane other chapters reconsider central notions such as anxiety existence imagination and despair finally some chapters deal with kierkegaard's relevance for central issues in contemporary philosophy including naturalism self constitution and bioethics this book is of relevance not only to researchers working in kierkegaard studies but to anyone with an interest in existentialism and existential thinking
