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the author offers an enlightening look at the life and work of filmmaker kim ki duk

winner of the iajs award for best edited book of 2018 the routledge international handbook of jungian film studies weaves together the various strands of jungian film theory revealing a coherent theoretical position underpinning this exciting recent area of research while also exploring and suggesting new directions for further study the book maps the current state of debates within jungian orientated film studies and sets them within a more expansive academic landscape taken as a whole the collection shows how different jungian approaches can inform and interact with a broad range of disciplines including literature digital media studies clinical debates and concerns the book also explores the life of film outside cinema what is sometimes termed post cinema offering a series of articles exploring jungian approaches to cinema and social media computer games mobile screens and on line communities the routledge international handbook of jungian film studies represents an essential resource for students and researchers interested in jungian approaches to film it will also appeal to those interested in film theory more widely and in the application of jung s ideas to contemporary and popular culture

film authorship in contemporary transmedia culture the paratextual lives of asian auteurs examines film authorship in the transmedia era whereby film directors have become public figures through a wide range of textual material and performative practices the book draws on the notion of paratext and its related term palimpsest to bring forth the idea of self reflexive authorship as a method of examining the mediated past present and afterlife of east asian filmmakers the first part of the book pays attention to materials surrounding film festivals multi platform distribution and cinephile fan creative practices which have been created rewritten and shared to foster and problematize the reputations

of selected filmmakers the second part examines alternative modes of self projections and creative productions that address the filmmakers sense of selves and relations with the industry and the public across different chapters discourses surrounding film authorship and east asian cinema are revisited and expanded to highlight its multiple histories and possible futures

this book problematizes the role of education in an increasingly mediatized world through the lenses of creativity new media and consumerism at the core of the issue the author argues creativity in art education is being co opted to serve the purposes of current economic trends towards designer capitalism using an east meets west approach jagodzinski draws on deleuze and guattarian philosophy to explore visual and popular culture in korean society addressing the tensions that exist between designer education and art that explores the human condition in doing so he challenges art educators to envision a new paradigm for education which questions established media ontologies and incorporates new ways to confront the crisis of the anthropocene

south korean cinema is a striking example of non western contemporary cinematic success thanks to the increasing numbers of moviegoers and domestic films produced south korea has become one of the world s major film markets in 2001 the south korean film industry became the first in recent history to reclaim its domestic market from hollywood and continues to maintain around a 50 percent market share today high quality south korean films are increasingly entering global film markets and connecting with international audiences in commercial cinemas and art theatres and at major international film festivals despite this growing recognition of the films themselves korean cinema s rich heritage has not heretofore received significant scholarly attention in english language publications this groundbreaking collection of thirty five essays by a wide range of academic specialists situates current scholarship on korean cinema within the ongoing theoretical debates in contemporary global film studies chapters explore key films of korean cinema from sweet dream madame freedom the housemaid and the march of fools to oldboy the host and train to busan as well as major directors such as shin sang ok kim ki young im kwon taek bong joon ho hong sang soo park chan wook and lee chang dong while the chapters provide in depth analyses of particular films

together they cohere into a detailed and multidimensional presentation of Korean cinema's cumulative history and broader significance with its historical and critical scope. Abundance of new research and detailed discussion of important individual films rediscovering Korean cinema is at once an accessible classroom text and a deeply informative compendium for scholars of Korean and East Asian studies, cinema and media studies, and communications. It will also be an essential resource for film industry professionals and anyone interested in international cinema.

From the 1970s onward, exploitation cinema as a concept has circulated inside and outside of East Asian nations and cultures in terms of aesthetics and marketing. However, crucial questions about how global networks of production and circulation alter the identity of an East Asian film as mainstream or as exploitation have yet to be addressed in a comprehensive way. *Exploiting East Asian Cinemas* serves as the first authoritative guide to the various ways in which contemporary cinema from and about East Asia has trafficked across the somewhat elusive line between mainstream and exploitation. Focusing on networks of circulation, distribution, and reception, this collection treats the exploitation cinemas of East Asia as mobile texts produced, consumed, and in many ways reappropriated across national and hemispheric boundaries. As the processes of globalization have decoupled products from their nations of origin, transnational taste cultures have declared certain works as art or trash regardless of how those works are received within their native locales. By charting the routes of circulation of notable films from Japan, China, and South Korea, this anthology contributes to transnationally accepted formulations of what constitutes East Asian exploitation cinema.

This study investigates the controversial motion pictures written and directed by the independent filmmaker Kim Ki Duk, one of the most acclaimed Korean auteurs in the English-speaking world. Propelled by underdog protagonists who can only communicate through shared corporeal pain and extreme violence, Kim's graphic films have been classified by Western audiences as belonging to sensationalist East Asian extreme cinema, and Kim has been labeled a psychopath and misogynist in South Korea. Drawing upon both Korean language and English language sources, Hye Seung Chung challenges these misunderstandings, recuperating Kim's oeuvre as a therapeutic yet brutal cinema of

nietzschean ressentiment political anger and resentment deriving from subordination and oppression chung argues that the power of kim s cinema lies precisely in its ability to capture channel and convey the raw emotions of protagonists who live on the bottom rungs of korean society she provides historical and postcolonial readings of victimization and violence in kim s cinema which tackles such socially relevant topics as national division in wild animals and the coast guard and u s military occupation in address unknown she also explores the religious and spiritual themes in kim s most recent works which suggest possibilities of reconciliation and transcendence
