this work investigates the close relationship between language and culture it explains key concepts such as social context and cultural authenticity using insights from fields which includes linguistics sociology and anthropology

young people around the world are increasingly able to access english language media online for leisure purposes and interact with other users of english this book examines the extent of these phenomena their effect on language acquisition and their implications for the teaching of english in the 21st century

citizenship can be defined simply as being a member of political institutions citizenship the first evidence of which is encountered in ancient greek city states in history is found in the roman state constitutionally for the first time national citizenship which became more important with the importance of nation states was supported by the concept of human rights after the french revolution events and phenomena such as reform industrialization democracy globalization digitalization international trade and migration have given different dimensions to the concept of citizenship today

all states have determined the rights and duties of individuals as their citizens in their constitutions and convey the rights and responsibilities of citizenship to the students in school education societies with good citizens who know their rights and responsibilities are thought to develop and advance more in any area

despite policies promoting multilingualism monolingual methods dominate hungarian education drawing from theory and research on multilingual approaches to language teaching in the european context this volume explores the effectiveness of multilingual awareness raising in learning german after english in the hungarian secondary school context a year long intervention comparing students linguistic development and motivation shows that building on prior language knowledge and raising multilingual awareness significantly enhances third language acquisition and boosts student motivation thus representing a compelling case for integrating multilingual strategies in language teaching

this work is dedicated to circassia the historical homeland of the circassians who inspired and encouraged emerging generations to maintain the torch of freedom and to lead the way despite all obstacles and attempts of exclusion that have been tested over the years since the subjugation of their homeland the circassians were subjected to harsh conditions in all walks of life which wasn't easy to withstand and get through this meant a dictatorial savage direct military and security jurisdiction and domination for the duration of both tyrant tsarist imperial and soviet communist eras from the beginning of the 1990s on the general situation has been quite different concerning the circumstances that the circassian affairs have been clutched to after decades of being forgotten the people of the caucasus region and the world at large have started to become enlightened with information that was prevented and blocked from the public even the historians specialists and academicians were not in the picture of the pain destiny and suffering that the circassian nation was inflicted with for decades

specifically since the occupation and deportation of 1864

in a world where over half of the remaining six thousand languages will most likely disappear by the end of the century attention has finally begun to focus on the struggles of indigenous people to save their languages lack of knowledge concerning the vast linguistic diversity of oregon s languages has been a major obstacle to language revitalization in this state native peoples were subjected to disease displacement and forced linguistic assimilation leaving many languages with only a few speakers some languages died out but others prevailed in the privacy of homes and longhouses this book tells the story of perseverance and survival against unbelievable odds using the words of today s speakers and learners of oregon s languages in addition to drawing on archival and scholarly research the authors interviewed fifty two individuals throughout oregon who are speakers of their native languages their interviews are excerpted throughout the book these native speakers provide valuable insights into how languages are lost and how a linguistic heritage can be brought to life teaching oregon native languages discusses the role of state and federal language policies explores how archival collections can be used in language revitalization and describes strategies for creating a successful teaching environment a timely and necessary resource it will educate all readers about the important efforts underway to revitalize oregon s first languages

this book takes cultural knowledge in language learning not only as a necessary aspect of communicative competence but as an educational objective in its own right if the aim of foreign language education is to foster cross cultural awareness and self realization language pedagogy needs to come to grips with a range of fundamental issues what do we mean by cultural context can discourse practices be taught like rules of grammar what role does literature play in the development of second language literacy how can learners acquire both an insider s and an outsider s understanding of the foreign culture as expressed through its language by exploring these and other

issues the book can help language teachers reflect on their profession and place it within its larger societal and educational context in turn they can help learners become not only skilful users of the language but also active architects of a new cross cultural world order
