organisations and to critically evaluate how international organisational safety culture maturity development models can be adopted adapted to improve organisational safety culture in an organisation the research philosophy for this research is pragmatism following an explanatory study since a hypostasis was developed from the research question which is proven true by following an inductive and deductive research approach this study conducts a critical literature review to identify five organisational safety culture maturity development models as secondary data followed by a quantitative analysis through a desk study to critically review and identify the most popular culture components used by these models through a quantitative analysis the primary data was collected by using a survey strategy utilising a semi structured interview questionnaire using both qualitative and quantitative designed questions mixed method to generate and collect ample enough primary data from a limited number of units of analysis h s professionals specialists the key findings of this book includes a clear roadmap on how to use research methodology effectively in the design of a fit for purpose organisational safety culture maturity development model guiding students as well as organisations on best practice and world class standards available this book is intended to assist anyone who needs to work towards understanding assessing and developing organizational safety culture

despite the fact that workplaces have implemented and followed new safety innovations and approaches the majority of them have seen little if any significant progress in the reduction of accidental deaths and injuries changing the workplace safety culture demonstrates that changing the way an organization views and practices safety will impact
