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focuses on the novels published since 2000 by twenty major british novelists
the contemporary british novel since 2000 is divided into five parts with the first part examining the work of four particularly well known and highly regarded twenty first century writers
ian mcewan david mitchell hilary mantel and zadie smith
it is with reference to each of these novelists in turn that the terms
arealist
apostmodernist
ahistorical and
apostcolonialist
fiction are introduced while in the remaining four parts other novelists are

discussed and the meaning of the terms amplified from the start it is emphasised that these terms and others often mean different things to different novelists and that the complexity of their novels often obliges us to discuss their work with reference to more than one of the terms also discusses the works of maggie ofarrell sarah hall a l kennedy alan warner ali smith kazuo ishiguro kate atkinson salman rushdie adam foulds sarah waters james robertson mohsin hamid andrea levy and aminatta forna

science fiction and fantasy literature a checklist 1700 1974 volume one of two contains an author index title index series index awards index and the ace and belmont doubles index

this cultural history of the saltire society literary awards demonstrates the significance the awards have had within scottish literary and cultural life it is one piece of the wider cultural award puzzle and illustrates how far from being parochial or niche lesser known awards whose histories may be yet untold play their own role in the circulation of cultural value through the consecration of literary value the study of the society s book of the year and first book of the year awards not only highlights how important connections between literary awards and national culture and identity are within prize culture and how literary awards and their founding institutions can be products of the socio political and cultural milieu in which they form but this study also illustrates how existing literary award scholarship has only begun to scratch the surface of the complexities of the phenomenon this book promotes a new approach to considering literary prizes proposing that the concept of the literary awards hierarchy can contribute to emerging and developing discourses pertaining to literary and indeed cultural prizes more broadly

outlandish addresses geographical displacement as a lived experience in the twentieth century as a predicament of writing and as a problem for theory it focuses on the work of three transnational writers from diverse backgrounds working in different genres joseph conrad the ukrainian born polish novelist and storyteller living in britain at the turn of the century theodor w adorno the german jewish philosopher and sociologist transplanted to los angeles during the second world war and salman rushdie the indian born british novelist and journalist recently released from the peculiar conditions of his notorious houseless arrest the author argues that conrad adorno and rushdie emblemize significant shifts over the course of the century from a modernist expression of almost universal deracination to a post auschwitz disarticulation of home and subjectivity to an emergent conceptualization of displacement in terms of migrancy hybridity and flow he theorizes a mode of reading between exile and diaspora two fundamentally different descriptions of displacement and allows the outlandish writing of these three figures to complicate this seemingly continuous trajectory drawing on texts from literary theory philosophy psychoanalysis anthropology and geography the author explores what he calls the rhetoric of displacement the struggle to assert identity out of place he reads this writing predicament against the backdrop of the century s salient economic and technological changes political upheavals and mass

migrations in doing so he draws attention to those aspects of exile and diaspora that have remained insufficiently considered their relation to nationalism and colonialism to authority and institutionality and above all to broader questions of subjectivity race location and language as these concepts themselves subtly change over the course of the century

the extensive influence of the creative traditions derived from slave culture particularly black folklore in the work of nineteenth and twentieth century black authors such as ralph ellison and toni morrison has become a hallmark of african american scholarship yet similar inquiries regarding white authors adopting black aesthetic techniques have been largely overlooked gretchen martin examines representative nineteenth century works to explore the influence of black authored or narrated works on well known white authored texts particularly the impact of black oral culture evident by subversive trickster figures in john pendleton kennedy s swallow barn harriet beecher stowe s uncle tom s cabin herman melville s benito cereno joel chandler harris s short stories as well as mark twain s adventures of huckleberry finn and pudd nhead wilson as martin indicates such white authors show themselves to be savvy observers of the many trickster traditions and indeed a wide range of texts suggest stylistic and aesthetic influences representative of the artistry subversive wisdom and subtle humor in these black figures of ridicule resistance and repudiation the black characters created by these white authors are often dismissed as little more than limited demeaning stereotypes of the minstrel tradition yet by teasing out important distinctions between the wisdom and humor signified by trickery rather than minstrelsy martin probes an overlooked aspect of the nineteenth century american literary canon and reveals the extensive influence of black aesthetics on some of the most highly regarded work by white american authors

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
