linguistics an introduction to linguistic theory is a textbook written for introductory courses in linguistic theory for undergraduate linguistics majors and first year graduate students by twelve major figures in the field each bringing their expertise to one of the core areas of the field morphology syntax semantics phonetics phonology and language acquisition in each section the book is concerned with discussing the underlying principles common to all languages showing how these are revealed in language acquisition and in the specific grammars of the world's languages key book features written by twelve linguists all internationally recognized as leaders in their fields of specialization exercises and data analysis problems within and at end of each chapter help students learn what it means to actually do linguistics includes the latest developments in theoretical linguistics for example optimality theory other pedagogical tools include extensive glossary of key terms chapter summaries further reading lists

in linguistic theory robert de beaugrande analyses linguistic theories not as abstract ideas or theses but as the process and product of theoretical discourse he argues that the best documentation of this discourse can be found in the fundamental works of major linguists from ferdinand de saussure to teun van dijk and walter kintsch he therefore employs the highly unusual strategy of a close reading of these works as discourse performances and strives to uncover their main points and characteristic moves in the linguist's own words through this approach the reader is able to appreciate and understand the variety and controversy among linguistic theories as they have emerged and developed in interaction with each other special scrutiny is allocated to the issue of how far the active practice of the linguists followed their own theories and proposals and why the author concludes by assessing the prospects for linguistics to be drawn from the retrospect in the previous chapters

in a controversial look at the study of linguistics today mortéza mahmoudian examines twentieth century theories of language in light of empirical evidence in the past linguists have had to choose between a general linguistic theory aimed at universal explanatory power and specific limited linguistic models arguing that at various levels of linguistic analysis different theories offer more or less explanatory power mahmoudian makes a persuasive case for an integrated approach incorporating the strengths of both methods the author begins with the identification of principles which despite differences in terminology are held in common by most twentieth century linguists he shows the implications merits and shortcomings of the major schools of linguistic thought as well as the techniques one can use in gathering data ranging over a wide variety of international linguistic thinking mahmoudian takes up the question of what he calls experimentation or the extent to which the application of certain linguistic theories have validity in constructing models simultaneously a survey of the current state of linguistic theory and a case for the necessity of empirical verification in linguistics modern theories of language builds a bridge across the gulf between many long standing conflicts in the theory of language accessibly written this provocative work predicts future theoretical and epistemological developments and will prove essential reading for students and scholars of linguistics as well as specialists in cognitive psychology and romance languages

karl bühler 1879 1963 was one of the leading theoreticians of language of this century his masterwork sprachtheorie 1934 has been praised widely and gained considerable recognition in the fields of linguistics semiotics the philosophy of language and the psychology of language the work has however resisted translation into english partly because of its spirited and vivid

style partly because of the depth and range of analysis partly because of the great erudition of the author who displays a thorough command of both the linguistic and the philosophical traditions with this translation Bühler's ideas on many problems that are still controversial and others only recently rediscovered are now accessible to the English speaking world contents the work is divided into four parts part i discusses the four axioms or principles of language research the most famous of which is the first the organon model the base of Bühler's instrumental view of language part ii treats the role of indexicality in language and discusses deixis as one determinant of speech part iii examines the symbolic field dealing with context onomatopoeia and the function of case part iv deals with the elements of language and their organization syllabification the definition of the word metaphor anaphora etc the text is accompanied by translator's preface introduction by Achim Eschbach glossary of terms and bibliography of cited works both compiled by the translator index of names index of topics

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in ideology and linguistic theory two students of principals on both sides of the argument Geoffrey J. Huck and John A. Goldsmith reappraise the outcome of the deep structure debate

for Roy Harris the fundamental problem about linguistics is that it has been led astray by the fact that we are capable intellectually of decontextualising our own verbal behaviour. A whole interlocking system of doctrines about forms, meanings and communication has arisen designed to support the idea that one particular kind of decontextualising analysis is a prerequisite for rather than a retrospective reflection on that behaviour. Against this in 13 essays collected here for the first time Harris argues for a fresh start which recognises that we create language as we go both as individuals and as communities just as we create our social structures, forms of artistic expression, moral values and everything else we call civilisation. If Harris's thought can be put in a nutshell it is that all utterances, whether written or spoken, have to appear in a context and that context is an integral part of the utterance: there is no such thing as a contextless utterance.

Most of the papers collected in this volume concentrate on the history of linguistic ideas in France and Italy in the modern period from the Renaissance to the present day. Some of them are specifically focused on the links between the two traditions of reflection on language. The contributions have a common methodological outlook: the authors do not believe that the history of linguistic ideas is a separate activity from research on language or that it is marginal with respect to the latter. On the contrary, they are convinced that in contemporary research into language we can still discern the influence, positive or negative, as this may be, of factors deriving from the sometimes distant past. A historical analysis of these factors, whether it rejects them as superseded or redefines them in order to elicit the fruitful suggestions they may still contain, has a contribution to make to the progress of theory.

Language and Context breaks new ground in our understanding of the relationship between register, genre and context. Leckie Tarry argues convincingly and engagingly for a functional theory of language which specifies register in terms of contextual and linguistic features and which suggests a discursive relationship between the two, moving beyond the limits of much of today's theory. This accessible volume develops a theoretical understanding of the relationship between text, context, language

function and linguistic form helen leckie tarry a specialist in the area of register and applied linguistics died in 1991 aged 49 although she had finished a large part of this work her notes and draft chapters have been extensively edited by professor david birch david birch is currently professor of communication and media studies at central queensland university australia and previously taught at murdoch university western australia and the national university of singapore
