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wittgenstein once said that a whole philosophy book could be written consisting of nothing but jokes this is not that book nor does this book treat the history of philosophy as a joke this book takes philosophy seriously but not gravely as the subtitle indicates the goal of the book is to lighten the load a bit how to do this without simply throwing the cargo overboard first by presenting an overview of western philosophy from the sixth century b c e into the early twenty first century in a way that introduces the central philosophical ideas of the west and their evolution in a concise readable format without trivializing them but at the same time without pretending to have exhausted them or to have plumbed their depths second following a time honored medieval tradition by illuminating the margins of the text

taking picture books seriously what can we learn about philosophy through children s books this warm and charming volume casts a spell on adult readers as it unveils the surprisingly profound philosophical wisdom contained in children s picture books from dr seuss s sneetches to william steig s shrek with a light touch and good humor wartenberg discusses the philosophical ideas in these classic stories and provides parents with a practical starting point for discussing philosophical issues with their children accessible and multi layered it answers questions like is it okay for adults to deceive kids what s the difference between saying the mona lisa is a great painting and vanilla is your favorite flavor each chapter includes illustrations commissioned especially for this book

bridging the gap between interpretations of third way platonic scholarship and phenomenological ontological scholarship this book argues for a unique ontological hermeneutic interpretation of plato and plato s socrates reconceptualizing plato s socrates at the limit of education offers a re reading of plato and plato s socrates in terms of interpreting the practice of education as care for the soul through the conceptual lenses of phenomenology philosophical hermeneutics and ontological inquiry magrini contrasts his re reading with the views of plato and plato s socrates that dominate contemporary education which for the most part emerge through the rigid and reductive categorization of plato as both a realist and idealist in philosophical foundations texts teacher education programs this view also presents what he terms the questionable socrates as teacher model which grounds such contemporary educational movements as the paideia project which claims to incorporate through a scripted curriculum with socratic lesson plans the so called socratic

method into the common core state standards curriculum as a technical skill that can be taught and learned as part of the students critical thinking skills after a careful reading incorporating what might be termed a third way of reading plato and plato s socrates following scholars from the continental tradition magrini concludes that a so called socratic education would be nearly impossible to achieve and enact in the current educational milieu of standardization or neo taylorism social efficiency however despite this he argues in the affirmative that there is much educators can and must learn from this non doctrinal re reading and re characterization of plato and plato s socrates

gender scholarship during the last four decades has shown that the exclusion of women s voices and perspectives has diminished academic disciplines in important ways traditional scholarship in philosophy is no different the recovery project in philosophy is engaged in re discovering the names lives texts and perspectives of women philosophers from the 6th century bce to the present karen warren brings together 16 colleagues for a unique groundbreaking study of western philosophy which combines pairs of leading men and women philosophers over the past 2600 years acknowledging and evaluating their contributions to foundational themes in philosophy including epistemology metaphysics and ethics introductory essays primary source readings and commentaries comprise each chapter to offer a rich and accessible introduction to and evaluation of these vital philosophical contributions a helpful appendix canvasses an extraordinary number of women philosophers for further discovery and study

this book examines the ideas and influences of a nearly forgotten swedish american philosopher john elof boodin 1869 1950 a friend and student of william james and protégé of josiah royce at harvard boodin combined jamesian pragmatism and roycean idealism in developing original scholarship nearly sixty articles and eight books from 1900 to 1947 in addition to a volume of posthumous papers published in 1957 although he is seldom remembered today the enduring importance of pragmatism and the rising influence of process theology today suggests that his close reading of early to mid twentieth century science and vast grasp of philosophical issues warrants a renewed interest in his work that can be a valuable antidote to the sterile and constricting effects of reductionism and dogmatic materialism prevalent today in both those fields
