prison writing and the literary world tackles international prison writing and writing about imprisonment in relation to questions of literary representation and formal aesthetics the value or values of literature textual censorship and circulation institutional networks and literary critical methodologies it offers scholarly essays exploring prison writing in relation to wartime internment political imprisonment resistance and independence creation regimes of terror and personal narratives of development and awakening that grapple with race class and gender cutting across geospatial divides while drawing on nation and region specific expertise it asks readers to connect the questions examples and challenges arising from prison writing and writing about imprisonment within the uk and the usa but also across continental europe stalinist russia the americas

africa and the middle east it also includes critical reflection pieces from authors editors educators and theatre practitioners with experience of the fraught testing and potentially inspiring links between prison and the literary world

an authoritative and comprehensive survey of australian literary writing from beginningless time to the present in all genres this is an essential reference for anyone interested in australian literary history

when arcade publishing originally contracted this extraordinary collection of poetry and literature the department of the treasury was attempting to censor the publication of works from countries on america s enemies list arcade along with the pen american center the association of american publishers professional and scholarly publishing division and the association of american university presses filed a lawsuit in federal court against the united states government their landmark case forced the office of foreign assets control to change their regulations regarding editing and publishing literature in translation and arcade is proud to reissue this anthology that showcases the developments in iranian literature over the past quarter century since the iranian revolution of 1979 the united states has been virtually cut off from that country s culture despite severe difficulties imposed by social political and economic upheavals as well as war repression and censorship a veritable cultural renewal has taken place in iran over the past quarter century not only in literature but in music art and cinema over forty writers from three generations contributed to this rich and varied collection or to use the persian term golchine a bouquet one that provides a much needed window into a largely undiscovered branch of world literature in the wake of the green revolution and sweeping changes in the region this particular golchine is more relevant than ever and will bring literary enjoyment as well as a fuller understanding of a complex and ever shifting culture

this book is an original account of coterie culture in twentieth century ireland and the networks and connections which fostered women s writing it paints a vivid portrait of the inspirational women involved in the women writers club showcasing their influence and achievements in literature and their political campaigning for intellectual and creative freedom

speaking the earth s languages brings together for the first time critical discussions of postcolonial poetics from australia and chile the book crosses multiple languages landscapes and disciplines and draws on a wide range of both oral and written poetics in order to make strong claims about the importance of a nomad poetics not only for understanding aboriginal or mapuche writing practices but more widely for the problems confronting contemporary literature and politics in colonized landscapes the book begins by critiquing canonical examples of non indigenous postcolonial poetics incisive re

readings of two icons of australian and chilean poetry judith wright 1915 2000 and pablo neruda 1904 1973 provide rich insights into non indigenous responses to colonization in the wake of modernity the second half of the book establishes compositional links between aboriginal and mapuche poetics and between such oral and written poetics more generally the book s final part develops an emerging synthesis of contemporary aboriginal and mapuche poetics with reference to the work of two of the most important avant garde aboriginal and mapuche poets of recent times lionel fogarty 1958 and paulo huirimilla 1973 speaking the earth s languages uses these fascinating links between aboriginal and mapuche poetics as the basis of a deliberately nomadic open ended theory for an australian chilean postcolonial poetics the central argument of this book the author writes is that a nomadic poetics is essential for a genuinely postcolonial form of habitation or a habitation of colonized landscapes that doesn t continue to replicate colonialist ideologies involving indigenous dispossession and environmental exploitation

more than fifty specialists have contributed to this new edition of volume 4 of the cambridge bibliography of english literature the design of the original work has established itself so firmly as a workable solution to the immense problems of analysis articulation and coordination that it has been retained in all its essentials for the new edition the task of the new contributors has been to revise and integrate the lists of 1940 and 1957 to add materials of the following decade to correct and refine the bibliographical details already available and to re shape the whole according to a new series of conventions devised to give greater clarity and consistency to the entries

in recent years australian literature has experienced a revival of interest both domestically and internationally the increasing prominence of work by writers like christos tsiolkas heightened through television and film adaptation as well as the award of major international prizes to writers like richard flanagan and the development of new high profile prizes like the stella prize have all reinvigorated interest in australian literature both at home and abroad this companion emerges as a part of that reinvigoration considering anew the history and development of australian literature and its key themes as well as tracing the transition of the field through those critical debates it considers works of australian literature on their own terms as well as positioning them in their critical and historical context and their ethical and interactive position in the public and private spheres with an emphasis on literature s responsibilities this book claims australian literary studies as a field uniquely positioned to expose the ways in which literature engages with produces and is produced by its context provoking a critical re evaluation of the concept of the relationship between national literatures cultures and histories and the social function of literary texts

what role should australian literature play in the school curriculum what principles should guide our selection of australian texts to what extent should concepts of the nation and a national identity frame the study of australian writing what do we imagine australian literature to be how do english teachers go about engaging their students in reading australian texts this volume brings together teachers teacher educators creative writers and literary scholars in a joint inquiry that takes a fresh look at what it means to teach australian literature the immediate occasion for the publication of these essays is the implementation of the australian curriculum english which several contributors subject to critical scrutiny in doing so they question the way that literature teaching is currently being constructed by standards based reforms not only in australia but elsewhere the essays assembled in this volume transcend the divisions that have sometimes marred debates about the place of australian literature in the school curriculum they all recognise the complexity of what secondary english teachers do in their efforts to engage young people in a rich and meaningful curriculum they also highlight the need for both secondary and tertiary educators to cultivate an awareness of the cultural and intellectual traditions that mediate their professional practice and to encourage a critically responsive pedagogy

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
