the role objects play in a museum visitor s experience is much debated conn 2010 this study offers an empirical look at how visitors think with objects in a history museum exhibition to study the phenomenon a new method called the head camera protocol was introduced participants in the study wore a hat outfitted with a video camera and microphone and were instructed to think aloud as they explored an exhibition the resulting video constituted the head camera protocols that were analyzed the exhibition studied was called elegy in the dust september 11th and the chelsea jeans memorial on display at the new york historical society in 2006 2007 it was
