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america s global cultural impact is largely seen as one sided with critics claiming that  
it has undermined other countries languages and traditions but contrary to popular  
belief the cultural relationship between the united states and the world has been  
reciprocal says richard pells the united states not only plays a large role in shaping  
international entertainment and tastes it is also a consumer of foreign intellectual  
and artistic influences pells reveals how the american artists novelists composers jazz  
musicians and filmmakers who were part of the modernist movement were greatly  
influenced by outside ideas and techniques people across the globe found  
familiarities in american entertainment resulting in a universal culture that has  
dominated the twentieth and twenty first centuries and fulfilled the aim of the  
modernist movement to make the modern world seem more intelligible modernist  
america brilliantly explains why george gershwin s music cole porter s lyrics jackson  
pollock s paintings bob fosse s choreography marlon brando s acting and orson welles  
s storytelling were so influential and why these and other artists and entertainers  
simultaneously represent both an american and a modern global culture

freaks in late modernist american culture explores the emergence of what nancy bombaci terms late modernist freakish aesthetics a creative fusion of high and low themes and forms in relation to distorted bodies literary and cinematic texts about freaks by nathanael west djuna barnes tod browning and carson mccullers subvert and reinvent modern progress narratives in order to challenge high modernist literary and social ideologies these works are marked by an acceptance of the disteleology anarchy and degeneration that racist discourses of the late nineteenth and early twentieth centuries associated with racial and ethnic outsiders particularly jews in a period of american culture beset with increasing pressures for social and political conformity and with the threat of fascism from europe these late modernist narratives about freaks defy oppressive norms and values as they search for an anarchic and transformational creativity

charles altieri s groundbreaking new book sets modernist american poetry in a precise cultural context by analyzing how major poets reacted to the challenge posed by modernist painting s radical critique of traditional representational models for art it argues that modernist poets have tended to resist the received values of their contemporary culture by finding idealizing principles in modes of pure abstraction it traces the use of such abstraction in literature from wordsworth through baudelaire and mallarmé to t s eliot william carlos williams marianne moore and gertrude stein there are summary chapters also on wallace stevens and ezra pound considerations of cézanne and the cubists and a substantial theoretical discussion of the nature of abstract art

university of duisburg essen language english abstract this paper examines selected literature of the modernist era and the search for identity in and outside of the united states during this time one of the characteristics of modernism in america is the development of changing attitudes towards religion and in particular christianity which was seen as the traditional religion that had up until then been a pillar of american beliefs these changed attitudes ranged anywhere from questioning one's religion or faith to having flat out aversions to even the idea of any god my emphasis in the late 1800s under the influence of the idea of successful manifest destiny and major advances in sciences and technology people were generally high spirited grounded in their beliefs they minded their own business followed their goals and dreams they witnessed or even experienced abundance and paid little attention to things that they felt did not concern them including foreign affairs

in the last two decades of the nineteenth century americans were faced with the challenges and uncertainties of a new era the comfortable victorian values of continuity progress and order clashed with the unsettling modern notions of constant change relative truth and chaos attempting to embrace the intellectual challenges of modernism american thinkers of the day were yet reluctant to welcome the wholesale rejection of the past and destruction of traditional values in reluctant modernism american thought and culture 1880 1900 george cotkin surveys the intellectual life of this crucial transitional period his story begins with the darwinian controversies since the mainstream of american culture was just beginning to come to grips with the implications of the origins of species published in 1859 cotkin demonstrates the effects of this shift in thinking on philosophy anthropology and the newly developing field of psychology drawing on his extensive knowledge of these fields he explains clearly and concisely the essential tenets of such major thinkers and writers as william james franz boas charlotte perkins gilman henry adams and kate chopin throughout this fascinating readable history of the american

fin de siècle run the contrasting themes of continuity and change faith and rationalism despair over the meaninglessness of life and ultimately a guarded optimism about the future

saarinen f l wright and zeisel are also featured reproduced in full color each work is accompanied by an accessible and up to date text complete with comparative illustrations the introduction traces the formation of this important collection by a number of noted curators collectors and patrons distributed for the art institute of chicago

in this beautifully designed and lavishly illustrated book toni greenbaum analyzes the output of american modernist jewelers many of whom such as alexander calder and harry bertoia began as sculptors or painters in their metal working skills many of these artists were self taught and evolved new techniques this jewelry rejected expensive precious stones in favor of cheaper irregular gems and even glass pebbles and shards of pottery the influence of surrealism cubism constructivism and abstract expressionism led these artists to explore representations of space and individual perception in ways which challenged the traditions of earlier jewelry production

widely acknowledged as the most authoritative art critic of his generation hilton kramer advanced his comments and judgments largely in the form of essays and short pieces thus this first collection of his work to appear in twenty years is a signal event for the art world and for criticism generally the triumph of modernism not only traces the vicissitudes of the art scene but diagnoses the state of modernism and its vital legacy in the postmodern world mr kramer bracingly updates his incisive critique of the artists critics institutions and movements that have formed the basis for modern art appearing for the first time in greatly expanded form is his consideration of the foundations of modern abstract painting and the future of abstraction the aesthetic intelligence that mr kramer brings to bear on certain tired assumptions about modernism many of them derived from methodologies and politics that have little to do with art helps rescue the artwork itself and its appreciation from the very institutions such as the art museum and the academy that purport to foster it always
