book are in english while many of them are translations from the dutch french greek portuguese romanian spanish and turkish languages from the preface

studies of opera film television and literature have demonstrated how constructions of madness may be referenced in order to stigmatise but also liberate protagonists in ways that reinforce or challenge contemporaneous notions of normality but to date very little research has been conducted on how madness is represented in popular music in an effort to redress this imbalance nicola spelman identifies links between the anti psychiatry movement and representations of madness in popular music of the 1960s and 1970s analysing the various ways in which ideas critical of institutional psychiatry are embodied both verbally and musically in specific songs by david bowie lou reed pink floyd alice cooper the beatles and elton john she concentrates on meanings that may be made at the point of reception as a consequence of ideas about madness that were circulating at the time these

ideas are then linked to contemporary conventions of musical expression in order to illustrate certain interpretative possibilities supporting evidence comes from popular musicological analysis incorporating discourse analysis and social semiotics and investigation of socio historical context the uniqueness of the period in question is demonstrated by means of a more generalised overview of songs drawn from a variety of styles and eras that engage with the topic of madness in diverse and often conflicting ways the conclusions drawn reveal the extent to which anti psychiatric ideas filtered through into popular culture offering insights into popular music s ability to question general suppositions about madness alongside its potential to bring issues of men s madness into the public arena as an often neglected topic for discussion

the vast literature on virginia woolf s life work and marriage falls into two groups a large majority is certain that she was mentally ill and a small minority is equally certain that she was not mentally ill but was misdiagnosed by psychiatrists in this daring exploration of woolf s life and work thomas szasz famed for his radical critique of psychiatric concepts coercions and excuses examines the evidence and rejects both views instead he looks at how virginia woolf as well as her husband leonard used the concept of madness and the profession of psychiatry to manage and manipulate their own and each other s lives do we explain achievement when we attribute it to the fictitious entity we call genius do we explain failure when we attribute it to the fictitious entity we call madness or do we deceive ourselves the same way that the person deceives himself when he attributes the easy ignition of hydrogen to its being flammable szasz interprets virginia woolf s life and work as expressions of her character and her character as the product of her free will he offers this view as a corrective against the prevailing ostensibly scientific view that attributes both her madness and her genius to biological genetic causes we tend to attribute exceptional achievement to genius and exceptional failure to madness both says szasz are fictitious entities

the pervasive idea that madness and creativity are intricately linked is one that holds tremendous fascination for both scientists and the general public alike although this view was at first largely driven by anecdotal evidence showcasing the manifestation of mental illness in individuals who exhibited extraordinary levels of creativity in various spheres of life it initiated a strong impetus to empirically investigate the association between mental health and creativity a variety of approaches and combinations of approaches have been adopted to address this association including clinical personality psychometric behavioral

cognitive historiometric and neuroscientific despite the ever accumulating body of evidence over the past six decades investigating this link what is lacking is a comprehensive overview of the disparate findings from these different approaches that will enable us to address the question of whether there is an empirically founded relationship between creativity and mental illness and if such a link does exist what is the nature of this association the purpose of this research topic was to motivate theorists and researchers to answer this question or at least attempt to do so given the available evidence thus far the themes of interest that were open to exploration in view of this topic included a which mental disorders are positively associated with creativity b which mental disorders are negatively associated with creativity c the dynamics of information processing biases positive versus negative associated with psychiatric and high risk populations d theories regarding the madness creativity link e personality based studies on creativity f creativity mental illness and the brain g genes and creativity h how can studies on neurological populations inform this debate i what are the areas of impact with regard to real world applications and practice j historical timeline of this question k evolutionary perspectives on the madness creativity link l methodological problems associated with this field m philosophical issues to bear in mind when investigating this domain n the usefulness of the troubled genius concept the invitation to contribute was open to all interested academics regardless of whether they were seasoned explorers within this field of study or just beginning to get their feet wet in its murky waters as a result of adopting this inclusive approach the contributions showcase a wide variety of perspectives from academic departments and institutions the world over what is most encouraging is that so many were willing to openly take on the challenge of tackling this difficult question head on we hope future discussions that follow through as a result of this collective effort will prove to be just as fruitful

what is the strange eros that haunts foucault s writing in this deeply original consideration of foucault s erotic ethics lynne huffer provocatively rewrites foucault as a sapphic poet she uncovers eros as a mode of thought that erodes the interiority of the thinking subject focusing on the ethical implications of this mode of thought huffer shows how foucault s poetic archival method offers a way to counter the disciplining of speech at the heart of this method is a conception of the archive as sapphic the past s remains are like sappho s verses hole ridden scattered and dissolved by time listening for eros across fragmented texts huffer stages a series of encounters within an archive of literary and theoretical readings the eroticization of violence in works by freud and eve kosofsky sedgwick the

when it was first published in france in 1961 as folie et déraison histoire de la folie à l âge classique few had heard of a thirty four year old philosopher by the name of michel foucault by the time an abridged english edition was published in 1967 as madness and civilization michel foucault had shaken the intellectual world this translation is the first english edition of the complete french texts of the first and second edition including all prefaces and appendices some of them unavailable in the existing french edition history of madness begins in the middle ages with vivid descriptions of the exclusion and confinement of lepers why foucault asks when the leper houses were emptied at the end of the middle ages were they turned into places of confinement for the mad why within the space of several months in 1656 was one out of every hundred people in paris confined shifting brilliantly from descartes and early enlightenment thought to the founding of the hôpital général in paris and the work of early psychiatrists philippe pinel and samuel tuke foucault focuses throughout not only on scientific and medical analyses of madness but also on the philosophical and cultural values attached to the mad he also urges us to recognize the creative and liberating forces that madness represents brilliantly drawing on examples from goya nietzsche van gogh and artaud the history of madness is an inspiring and classic work that challenges us to understand madness reason and power and the forces that shape them

is there really a thin line between madness and genius this book provides a thorough review of the current state of knowledge on this age old idea and presents new empirical research to put an end to this debate but also to open up discussion about the implications of its findings
