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how are different cultures to be described and compared this book provides a clear and concise discussion of the theoretical issues involved in ethnographic description and comparative study taking up the classic problems in the study of of social organisation professor goodenough describes the major issues in the cross cultural study of kinship and the family revealing the kinds of constants both formal and functional on which such study must be based the result is new definitions of marriage family and parenthood for use in cross cultural analysis and a greater understanding of this form of analysis itself the statement on the interdependence of description and comparison in cultural anthropology and its implications for a science of culture provides fresh insights into cross cultural analysis for both the theoretical and the practical anthropologist

anthropological literature has traditionally been static and synchronic only occasionally according a role to historical processes

but recent years have seen a burgeoning exchange between anthropology and history each field taking on a powerful new dimension in consequence just what this means for anthropologists has not been clear and this collection eight core papers plus introduction and final commentary introduces focus and direction to this interface between anthropology challenges several basic assumptions long held by anthropologists researchers can no longer be satisfied with approaches epitomized in the ethnographic present society may be a bounded entity but culture cannot be treated as such a culture should be examined as it has interacted with other cultures and with its environment over time many traditionalists in anthropology faced with these disturbing new challenges fear the disintegration of the discipline but these thoughtful papers demonstrate on the contrary its vitality growth and promise in this volume major figures in symbolic semiotic anthropology offer various approaches to examining culture through time culture mediated by history and history mediated by culture in its complexity and dynamics the eight core papers focus on particular cultures in various locales hawaii nepal spain japan israel india and indonesia no artificial unity theoretical thematic or epistemological has been imposed the strength of the volume derives from a complementary diversity and tension as each player drawing on a particular culture offers an original way of penetrating that culture's historical dimensions

social and cultural anthropology and archaeology are rich subjects with deep connections in the social and physical sciences over the past 150 years the subject matter and different theoretical perspectives have expanded so greatly that no single individual can command all of it consequently both advanced students and professionals may be confronted with theoretical positions and names of theorists with whom they are only partially familiar if they have heard of them at all students in particular are likely to turn to the web to find quick background information on theorists and theories however most web based information is inaccurate and or lacks depth students and professionals need a source to provide a quick overview of a particular theory and theorist with just the basics the who what where how and why if you will in response sage reference plans to publish the two volume theory in social and cultural anthropology an encyclopedia features benefits two volumes containing approximately 335 signed entries provide users with the most authoritative and thorough reference resource available on anthropology theory both in terms of breadth and depth of coverage to ease navigation between and among related entries a reader's guide groups entries thematically and each entry is followed by cross references in the electronic version the reader's guide combines with the cross references and a detailed index to provide robust search and browse capabilities an appendix with a chronology of anthropology theory allows students to easily chart directions and trends in thought and theory from early times to the present suggestions for further reading at the end of each entry and a master bibliography at the end guide readers to sources for more detailed research and discussion

this lively and original introduction to cultural anthropology is a textbook like no other structured as a narrative rather than a compendium of facts about cultures and concepts it invites students to think of anthropology as a series of stories that emerge from cultural encounters in particular times and places these moments of encounter are illustrated with reference to both

classic and contemporary ethnographic examples from shakespeare in the bush to my freshman year and from coming of age in samoa to coming of age in second life allowing readers to experience both the excitement and the limits of the discipline chapters are organized on a thematic basis and each begins with an introduction that sets the stage for telling stories through ethnographic case studies and examples and then frames these stories in terms of their relevance to understanding anthropology and society key concepts ideas and methods pertinent to the theme are discussed ensuring a solid coverage of both content and methodology anthropological theorists and theories are also embedded in the narrative allowing readers to see how theory is put into practice the result is a fresh discussion of anthropology that is both broad in scope and selective in coverage offering a different way of engaging today's students in the enduring strengths of the discipline

katherine a dettwyler author of the margaret mead awardwinning dancing skeletons has written a compelling and original introductory text cultural anthropology human experience is suitable for use in cultural and social anthropology courses and its twelve chapters easily fit into quarter or semester terms while leaving room for additional readings discussions or other projects all the standard topics are covered but with less emphasis on method and theory and more coverage of a variety of industrial and postindustrial societies auxiliary materials bells and whistles have been kept to a minimum to reduce distractions and maintain a reasonable price to students the author has chosen all the photographs with great care to illustrate or amplify important points the instructors manual includes summaries of each chapter student exercises and a test bank dettwyler's upbeat tone inspires students to develop the ability to think logically objectively and critically about different cultural beliefs practices and social structures understand that humans are primates with culture with a complex overlay of environmental and cultural influences appreciate how powerful cultural beliefs and practices can be in shaping human perceptions of the world realize that culture is not the same thing as social constructions of race ethnic identity or place of geographic origin understand why how cultural practices make sense within the cultures that practice them articulate how an anthropological perspective helps discern everyday situations and interactions at the local national and international levels understand that anthropology is not just an academic discipline it is a way of looking at and understanding the world appreciate the ways cultural beliefs and practices social structures and human lifestyles contribute to a meaningful life

anthropology has traditionally relied on a spatially localized society or culture as its object of study the essays in culture power place demonstrate how in recent years this anthropological convention and its attendant assumptions about identity and cultural difference have undergone a series of important challenges in light of increasing mass migration and the transnational cultural flows of a late capitalist postcolonial world the contributors to this volume examine shifts in anthropological thought regarding issues of identity place power and resistance this collection of both new and well known essays begins by critically exploring the concepts of locality and community first as they have had an impact on contemporary global understandings of displacement and mobility and second as they have had a part in defining identity and subjectivity itself with sites of
