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much of what we take to be meaningful and significant in life is inextricably linked with our capacity to experience emotions here jonathan mitchell considers emotional experiences as sui generis states to be given their own place within our mental economy and proposes an original view of emotional experiences as feelings towards values

since the 1970s the study of emotions moved to the forefront of sociological analysis this book brings the reader up to date on the theory and research that have proliferated in the analysis of human emotions the first section of the book addresses the classification the neurological underpinnings and the effect of gender on emotions the second reviews sociological theories of emotion section three covers theory and research on specific emotions love envy empathy anger grief etc the final section shows how the study of emotions adds new insight into other subfields of sociology the workplace health and more

emotion experience has failed to date to gain a central place in the study of consciousness this special issue of the journal of consciousness studies presents the most recent views on the matter with discussions of several aspects of emotion experience contributors from different disciplines address links between feelings brain body and world what happens in the brain and in the body when we have feelings how do feelings relate to our understanding of the world the contributors also analyse emotion experience per se the character of moods the role of emotion experience in demarcating the class of emotion the alleged positive and negative character of affect its embodied feel and its relation to action

wynn tackles established topics in philosophical theology in the light of new perspectives on emotions

a pioneering investigation into the nature of emotions bringing together important questions in ontology metaphysics and philosophy of mind leading scholars explore a neglected aspect of the philosophy of emotion paving the way for new advances in research this book will be important for those working in the field of emotions

derived from a conference sponsored by the heinz werner institute for developmental analysis at clark university these papers consider the role emotions play in ideal human development contributors from the fields of psychology philosophy and sociology discuss the place that feelings affect passion and emotion should ideally occupy in human existence and how realization of this goal can be fostered the conference organizers focused the discussions by asking the participants to consider six questions each of which was intended to touch upon some aspect of the relationship between emotions and ideal human development chapters contain the papers presented and a summary of the discussions that followed the presentations

process of writing brand argues that to be complete theories of writing must include the affective component apart from research on writers block and apprehension almost no research addresses emotions in writing empirical studies of five groups are presented in the book college writers advanced expository writers professional writers student poets and teachers of writing examined are the intensity and frequency of 20 emotional states experienced while writing representative case studies and writing samples enrich the reader s understanding of human feeling and written language the psychology of writing begins with personal accounts of the emotions of literary figures it then describes the affective bases of linguistic thought with background on english education and the cognitive model of writing da chapter is devoted to the psychology of emotion next an operational framework for the studies is outlined and the research program described the reports of the five writing populations are followed by the conclusion in which the results are summarized and research opportunities are proposed educators psychologists and discourse specialists all those concerned with the serious study of writing will find the psychology of writing a significant work

what are emotions this book offers a balanced survey of facts and theory

michael s brady offers a new account of the role of emotions in our lives he argues that emotional experiences do not give us information in the same way that perceptual experiences do instead they serve our epistemic needs by capturing our attention and facilitating a reappraisal of the evaluative information that emotions themselves provide

in knowing emotions furtak argues that it is only through the emotions that we can perceive meaning in life and only by feeling emotions that we are able to recognize the value or significance of anything whatsoever our affective responses and dispositions therefore play a critical role in human existence and their felt quality is intimately related to the awareness they provide

despite the very obvious differences between looking at manet s woman with a parrot and listening to elgar s cello concerto both experiences provoke similar questions in the thoughtful aesthete why does the painting seem to express reverie and the music nostalgia how do we experience the reverie and nostalgia in such works of art why do we find these experiences rewarding in similar ways as our awareness of emotion in art and our engagement with art s emotions can make such a special contribution to our life it is timely for a philosopher to seek to account for the nature and significance of the

experience of art s emotions damien freeman develops a new theory of emotion that is suitable for resolving key questions in aesthetics he then reviews and evaluates three existing approaches to artistic expression and proposes a new approach to the emotional experience of art that draws on the strengths of the existing approaches finally he seeks to establish the ethical significance of this emotional experience of art for human flourishing freeman challenges the reader not only to consider how art engages with emotion but how we should connect up our answers to questions concerning the nature and value of the experiences offered by works of art

design emotion moves is an edited collection of papers presented at the 5th international design and emotion conference in gothenburg sweden in spite of the wide variety of angles and approaches all authors share the basic proposition that in order to understand users or consumers and their behaviour one must understand the affective responses that are involved in the processes of buying using and owning products the book should appeal to anyone interested in understanding emotions involved in human product relationships and in techniques that can help utilising these insights in design practice

the authors of this book analyze the influence of specific everyday life situations and contexts on the emotional state of people and the ways in which this can impact measurements of user experience the book anticipates a future in which products and machines know how we feel and adapt to the feelings they sense music systems that effectively enhance our current mood with a personalized choice of music computer dialogues that avoid upcoming frustration and photo cameras that take pictures whenever we re excited in all these situations knowledge of the emotional state of the user is prime information a previous book published in the philips research book series probing experience illustrated ways to evaluate the user experience through behavioural and physiological parameters the present book focuses on the influence of context in these measurements the everyday life contexts of future products and machines will be always specific especially in comparison to the standard laboratory situation context can impact the experience measurements and influence the occurrence and characteristics of certain signals on the other hand independent knowledge of the context could be very valuable for the interpretation of experience measurements this book provides an overview of the present knowledge on the impact of context and advocates the need for a joint understanding of its role in the measurement of experience the authors comprise many experienced researchers on this topic with a wide variety of backgrounds including business and academia covering a broad range of context situations

emotion sense experience calls on historians of emotions and the senses to come together in serious and sustained dialogue the book outlines the deep if largely unacknowledged genealogy of historical writing insisting on a braided history of emotions and the senses explains why recent historical treatments have sometimes profitably but nonetheless unhelpfully segregated the emotions from the senses and makes a compelling case for the heuristic and interpretive dividends of bringing emotions and sensory history into conversation ultimately we envisage a new way of understanding historical lived experience generally as a mutable product of a situated world brain body dynamic such a project necessarily points us towards new

interdisciplinary engagement and collaboration especially with social neuroscience unpicking some commonly held assumptions about affective and sensory experience we re imagine the human being as both biocultural and historical reclaiming the analysis of human experience from biology and psychology and seeking new collaborative efforts

why should researchers be interested in their feelings and emotions as they carry out research emotion is what it is to exist to be human and is present in every sphere of our lives all activities are infused with emotion even those that are constructed as rational because rationality and emotionality are interpenetrated and entwined because all thinking is tinged with feeling and all feeling is tinged with thinking this book illuminates the emotional processes of doing social and organizational research and the implications of this for the outcomes of research with contributions from leading academics and research practitioners it addresses the significant issue of the sometimes intense emotional experiences involved in doing research and the implications it has for the theory and practice of social research by examining the nature of feelings and emotions it explores how we might understand researchers emotions and experiences and considers the often powerful feelings encountered in a variety of research contexts topics discussed include power relations psycho social explanations of researcher emotions paradoxical relations with research participants and the sometimes disturbing data that is gained research supervision the politics of research gender publishing undergoing vivas and presenting at conferences this book will therefore be a valuable companion to researchers and research students from the start of their career onwards

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
