

Narcissistic Narrative The Metafictional Paradox

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linda hutcheon in this original study examines the modes forms and techniques of narcissistic fiction that is fiction which includes within itself some sort of commentary on its own narrative and or linguistic nature her analysis is further extended to discuss the implications of such a development for both the theory of the novel and reading theory having placed this phenomenon in its historical context linda hutcheon uses the insights of various reader response theories to explore the paradox created by metafiction the reader is at the same time co creator of the self reflexive text and distanced from it because of its very self reflexiveness she illustrates her analysis through the works of novelists such as fowles barth nabokov calvino borges carpentier and aquin for the paperback edition of this important book a preface has been added which examines developments since first publication narcissistic narrative was selected by choice as one of the outstanding academic books for 1981 1982

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the term metafiction invaded the vocabulary of literary criticism around 1970 yet the textual strategies involved in turning fiction back onto itself can be traced through several centuries in this theoretical critical study robert c spires examines the nature of metafiction and chronicles its evolution in spain from the time of cervantes to the 1970s when the obsession with novelistic self commentary culminated in an important literary movement the critical portions of this study focus primarily on twentieth century works included are analyses of unamuno's *niebla* *jarn*'s *s locura y muerte de nadie* and *la novia del viento* torrente ballester's *don juan cunquiere* s *un hombre que se parec*'a a orestes and three novels from the self referential movement of the 1970s juan goytisolo's *juan sin tierra* luis goytisolo's *la colera de aquiles* and martn gaites *el cuarto de atr*'s seeking a stronger theoretical basis for his critical readings spires offers a sharpened definition of the term metafiction the mode arises he declares through an intentional violation of the boundaries that normally separate the worlds of the author the fiction and the reader building on theoretical foundations laid by frye scholes genette and others spires also proposes a literary paradigm that places metafiction in a position intermediate between fiction and literary theory these theoretical formulations place spires's book in the forefront of critical thought at the same time his full scale analyses of spanish metafictional works will be welcomed by hispanists and other students of world literature

metafiction is one of the most distinctive features of postwar fiction appearing in the work of novelists as varied as eco borges martin amis and julian barnes it comprises two elements firstly cause the increasing interpenetration of professional literary criticism and the practice of writing and secondly effect an emphasis on the playing with styles and forms resulting from an enhanced self consciousness and awareness of the elusiveness of meaning and the limitations of the realist form dr currie's volume examines first the two components of metafiction with practical illustrations from the work of such writers as derrida and foucault a final section then provides the view of metafiction as seen by metafictional writers themselves

this volume advances scholarly understanding of the ways in which discourse deixis underpins the workings of metafictional novels building on existing scholarship in the field the book begins by mapping out key themes and techniques in metafiction and puts forward a focused and theoretically coherent account of discourse deixis language which points to a section or aspect of the discourse context in which that language is used in written literary discourse highlighting its inherent significance in metafiction specifically macrae takes readers through an exploration of discourse deixis as used within the techniques of metanarration metalepsis and disnarration drawing on a mix of both well established and lesser known metafictional novels from the late 1960s and early 1970s by such authors as john barth brigid brophy robert coover john fowles steve katz and b s johnson this comprehensive account integrates and develops a new approach to understanding discourse deixis and innovative insights into metafictionality more broadly and will be of particular interest to scholars in literary studies postmodern literature narratology and

postmodernity in latin america contests the prevailing understanding of the relationship between postmodernity and latin america by focusing on recent developments in latin american and particularly argentine political and literary culture while european and north american theorists of postmodernity generally view latin american fiction without regard for its political and cultural context latin americanists often either uncritically apply the concept of postmodernity to latin american literature and society or reject it in an equally uncritical fashion the result has been both a limited understanding of the literature and an impoverished notion of postmodernity santiago colás challenges both of these approaches and corrects their consequent distortions by locating argentine postmodernity in the cultural dynamics of resistance as it operates within and against local expressions of late capitalism focusing on literature colás uses julio cortázar's hopscotch to characterize modernity for latin america as a whole manuel puig's kiss of the spider woman to identify the transition to a more localized postmodernity and ricardo piglia's artificial respiration to exemplify the cultural coordinates of postmodernity in argentina informed by the cycle of political transformation beginning with the cuban revolution including its effects on peronism to the period of dictatorship and finally to redemocratization colás's examination of this literary progression leads to the reconstruction of three significant moments in the history of argentina his analysis provokes both a revised understanding of that history and the recognition that multiple meanings of postmodernity must be understood in ways that incorporate the complexity of regional differences offering a new voice in the debate over postmodernity one that challenges that debate's leading thinkers postmodernity in latin america will be of particular interest to students of latin american literature and to scholars in all disciplines concerned with theories of the postmodern

despite the prominence given to it recently by Mikhail Bakhtin and Northrop Frye, Menippean satire remains a neglected and misunderstood genre focusing on the eighteenth-century writers John Dunton, Thomas D'Urfey, and Laurence Sterne. Menippean satire and the poetics of wit explore the excesses of these eccentric transgressive writers who take their readers to the limits of language as the outlaw of genre. Menippean satire exploits the improprieties supplied by a self-conscious use of wit, the principle of exuberance in eighteenth-century poetics. In fact, the exuberance of wit produces Menippean satire's central paradox: that self-conscious writers lose their identity in the very pursuit of it by tracing wit's exuberance through its abusive metaphors or catachreses to the abusive ideologies of class and gender. This genre study provides a literary tradition for the postmodern deconstructive project including the work of Jacques Derrida.

Black metafiction examines the tradition of self-consciousness in African American literature. It points to the shortcomings of theories of metafiction founded on studies of Anglo-American literature while some literary critics situate metafiction within the domain of postmodernism. Others regard it to be as old as storytelling itself. Scholars of African American literature acknowledge it to be a distinguishing feature. Critics such as Henry Louis Gates Jr. and Houston A. Baker Jr. perceive it as fundamental to the aesthetics of the Black vernacular. Black metafiction analyzes and evaluates these theories, comparing work by scholars of comparative Anglo-American and African American literature. Jablon's study leads to her revision of established theories and provides a model for the evaluation and reformulation of other Eurocentric theories. Jablon begins with a historical overview of theories of metafiction by scholars who specialize in African American literature and Anglo-American literature. She situates metafiction within African American literary history, tracing it from slave narratives to a discussion of ten contemporary novels, including Alice Walker's *The Temple of My Familiar*, Leon Forrest's *Divine Days*, Walter Mosley's *Black Betty*, Charles Johnson's *Middle Passage*, Rita Dove's *Through the Ivory Gate*, Arthur Flowers' *Another Good-Loving Blues*, Ernest Gaines' *A Lesson Before Dying*, Toni Morrison's *Tar Baby*, Octavia Butler's *Parable of the Sower*, and Charlotte Watson Sherman's *One Dark Body*. Among the topics Jablon addresses are the *Kunstlerroman* and the blues hero, the thematization of art, voice, metanarrative, and the oral tradition and genres of metafiction.

This book explores how silences in Carmen Martín Gaité's novels affect narrative communication and the reader, focusing on *Entre visillos* (1957), *El cuarto de atrás* (1978), and *Nubosidad variable* (1992). This study shows how silences inhere in Martín Gaité's narrative style, especially in the distinctive ways that her novels create interlocation and communicate feminist messages. It also probes how silences in the author's narrative relate to historical and social conditions in Spain and to various literary periods and genres. Silence as a literary term can be ambiguous because critics give it many different meanings and often without specifying types of silences. Accordingly, the book typologizes narrative silences and their roles in narrative communication. This study reveals that in Martín Gaité's novels, women's silences become over time more a means for creative expression and personal growth than a result of oppression.

The author addresses the influence of poststructuralism on literary studies in Britain and America, focusing on the theory of deconstruction as developed by Jacques Derrida. The book redresses common misinterpretations and assesses arguments for the collapse of disciplinary boundaries.
