considering how much experience there now is in providing supervisor training in the uk relatively little has been written about it this book creates a lively and readable resource that will be informative and inspirational for those planning for the future of training for supervisors of counsellors or who create teach on or apply for supervisor training the structure and content will invite reflection on the training issues that the authors address it is intended to be consciously forward looking in a period of rapid development and is designed to highlight differences between providers as well as the approaches and ideas they share it is the work of many authors all of whom are or have been involved in supervisor training in the uk the book should also be of interest to colleagues involved in training supervisors in other contexts and allied professions social work medical and nursing professions coaching and teaching it spans a range of theoretical approaches to supervisor training and authors thus inevitably write from quite different basic

assumptions about supervision

supervision in clinical psychology is a vital component of graduate training enhancing the professional and clinical skills of trainees the current literature indicates that in order to be a competent supervisor one must obtain training in supervision one highly recommended method of supervision training is through graduate coursework available literature indicates that approximately 40 of licensed clinical psychologists have received formal training in supervision e g formal course or practicum in their graduate training program however these prevalence rates were obtained over a decade ago and may not be an accurate representation of current supervisory training practices in clinical graduate programs therefore this study aimed to examine current supervision training experiences obtained by trainees in their graduate doctoral training programs for clinical psychology and how their training experiences relate to their own supervisory style or theoretical approach for the current study 106 clinical psychology interns participated in completing questionnaires assessing supervisory training experiences supervision knowledge and supervisor self efficacy results were that 81 of participants reported receiving formal training in supervision in graduate school a significantly larger amount than prior reported rates additionally amount of training and certain components of supervision training i e organization and documentation of supervision training significantly predicted supervision knowledge components of supervision knowledge e g theories and models ethical issues and supervision self efficacy e g ethical and legal issues theories and techniques were highly correlated finally supervision knowledge overall predicted supervision self efficacy this study provided an updated view into the type of training graduate students commonly receive in graduate programs in clinical psychology and supported the connection among

supervision training supervision knowledge and supervisor self efficacy clinical implications and future directions for training and related factors are discussed

clinical training in psychotherapy is challenging for supervisees many of whom are unsure how to navigate the supervisory process and effectively build clinical skills and professional competence this volume aimed at students and interns is written in a user friendly interactive style with real life case examples and reflection activities the authors describe how to establish effective working relationships with supervisors and understand the evaluation process empirically supported yet highly practical this book normalizes the anxieties and conflicts that typically arise during supervision and will be welcomed by students and interns at all levels of experience

this book provides a scientific and practical guide for training and supervision in cognitive behavioral therapy cbt it builds on more general fundamentals of clinical supervision with a theory driven approach backed by empirical support for training and supervising clinicians in the practice of cbt the book dispels the myth of do it teach it as it relates to supervision and addresses the importance of recognizing that one size does not fit all with cbt supervision the volume synthesizes cbt research on supervision and links it to the practice of supervision it reviews components of supervision that warrant consideration e g therapeutic alliance ethics specific settings e g medical setting schools and clients e g culture individual group disability and high risk in addition it addresses a neglected area of developing competency including developmental models as well as measuring trainee and supervisor competency

in the provision of clinical supervision the book recommends future directions on how to integrate technology into supervision to enhance the quality of supervision and ultimately client outcome key areas of coverage include major constructs in cbt supervision and training supervising work with various clients including individuals children adolescents families and couples supervision and high risk cases teaching and supervision within a behavioral medicine context issues of diversity technology and ethics of supervision the handbook of training and supervision in cognitive behavioral therapy is an essential resource for researchers professors and graduate students as well as clinicians therapists and other professionals in clinical and school psychology pediatrics social work developmental psychology behavioral therapy rehabilitation child and adolescent psychiatry nursing and special education

research shows that supervisors in the social service field require on going training and supervision however we do not know much about supervisors training and supervision and whether it prepares supervisors for the responsibilities of their jobs this study used a telephone survey to explore the training and supervision experiences of community agency social service supervisors the survey directly addressed 20 supervisory knowledge and skill areas identified from the literature review as those necessary for social service supervisors to be effective descriptive statistics were used to analyze participants responses and describe their training and supervision experiences the goal of the study was to describe the training and supervision that supervisors receive to see if they address the supervisory knowledge and skill areas identified from the literature although the study found that supervisors access more training and supervision than expected it also found significant inconsistencies in the training and supervision

the growth of interest in community work during the seventies was very marked but while much had been written on the actual practice of community work there was for too long a lack of british material on the vital subjects of useful theory training and the development of skills in this title originally published in 1977 the authors brought together for the national institute for social work experienced teachers and practitioners of community work in an integrated and carefully structured textbook which would further understanding of the means through which community workers develop their knowledge and skills it would be widely welcomed by all those involved in aspects of community work as teachers students practitioners supervisors and as local authority training officers the first part of the book has four chapters on the principle means through which community workers develop their skills within their employing agencies part two deals with theories and the contribution made to community work by the social sciences group work research methods and management and planning studies the last part of the book contains three papers which examine the major problems and issues in the placement learning experiences and assessment of students on field work

an excellent compilation given the explosion in the demand for both counselling and supervision this book should be required reading for all those putting a toe in these complex waters however i think it is also a salutary guide for those already practising as trainers and supervisors i found the issues raised stimulated me to think again about my own practice and to profit from that exercise
