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one of our deepest needs is for a sense of identity and belonging a common feature in this is human attachment to landscape and how we find identity in landscape and place the late 1980s and early 1990s saw a remarkable flowering of interest in and understanding of cultural landscapes with these came a challenge to the 1960s and 1970s concept of heritage concentrating on great monuments and archaeological locations famous architectural ensembles or historic sites with connections to the rich and famous managing cultural landscapes explores the latest thought in landscape and place by airing critical discussion of key issues in cultural landscapes through accessible accounts of how the concept of cultural landscape applies in diverse contexts across the globe and is inextricably tied to notions of living history where landscape itself is a rich social history record widening the notion that landscape only involves rural settings to embrace historic urban landscapes townscape examining critical issues of identity maintenance of traditional skills and knowledge bases in the face of globalization and new technologies fostering international debate with interdisciplinary appeal to provide a

critical text for academics students practitioners and informed community organizations discussing how the cultural landscape concept can be a useful management tool relative to current issues and challenges with contributions from an international group of authors managing cultural landscapes provides an examination of the management of heritage values of cultural landscapes from australia japan china usa canada thailand indonesia pacific islands india and the philippines it reviews critically the factors behind the removal of dresden and its cultural landscape from world heritage listing and gives an overview of historic urban landscape thinking

this book approaches cultural landscape as a driver for societal challenges economic development social inclusion place assessment and heritage conservation it explores issues stemming from the relation between conservation and emergencies and identifies descriptive tools for conveying knowledge and generating new expertise heritage skills seismic culture and social resilience the documentation of landscapes due in part to new technologies increasingly involves integrated methodologies and graphic outcomes such as heritage bim advanced 3d modeling and immersive environments according to recent unesco recommendations the process of mapping places is a necessary prerequisite for design action and also includes the emotional and perceptive dimension so as to represent space through visual thought and produce graphic materials the chapters presented here will ultimately support efforts to overcome the emergency phase of reconstruction after natural disasters and by exploring relevant issues in recent studies will describe emerging tools that can help inspire practices that concern not only agrarian and urban but also historic urban landscapes the work also presents planning tools to help preserve the integrity and authenticity of urban heritages the book will benefit all scholars and practitioners who are involved in the process of understanding designing and transforming places and will foster an international exchange of research case studies and best practices to confront the practical challenges involved in keeping cultural landscapes alive

the cultural landscape past present and future considers different aspects of man s intervention with natural vegetation and the landscape resulting from a long equilibrium of co existence these landscapes are not stable and the recent and ever accelerating changes in technology and life style have increasingly affected many ancient landscapes as old land use practices are abandoned and traditions forgotten the papers in this book describe and trace the development of cultural landscapes in different climatic and biogeographical regions in europe remnants of traditional land use still remaining are described particularly from western norway where traditions have lingered because the rugged topography of the region is inimicable to high technology each chapter is by an expert in the field the topics cover the documentation of present cultural landscapes their maintenance and restoration and the history of the development of cultural landscapes from the stone age onwards linking the intensity of landscape utilization with population dynamics and technological attainments the disciplines involved include vegetation science vegetation history ecology palaeoecology archaeology sociology geography and history

this book has been initiated by the workshop on cultural heritage in changing landscapes held during the iale international association for landscape ecology european conference that started in stockholm sweden in june 2001 and continued across the baltic to tartu

estonia in july the papers presented at the workshop have been supported by invited contributions that address a wider range of the cultural heritage management issues and research interfaces required to study cultural landscapes the book focuses on landscape interfaces both the ones we find out there in the landscape and the ones we face while doing research we hope that this book helps if not to make use of these interfaces then at least to map them and bridge some of the gaps between them the editors wish to thank those people helping us to assemble this collection first of all our gratitude goes to the authors who contributed to the book we would like to thank marc antrop mats widgren roland gustavsson marion pots chin barbel tress tiina peil helen soovali and anu printsmann for their quick and helpful advice opinions and comments during the different stages of editing helen soovali and anu printsmann together with piret pungas thank you for technical help

cultural landscapes which in the field of heritage studies and practice relates to caring for and safeguarding heritage landscapes is a concept embedded in contemporary conservation heritage conservation has shifted from an historical focus on buildings city centres and archaeological sites to encompass progressively more diverse forms of heritage and increasingly larger geographic areas embracing both rural and urban landscapes while the origin of the idea of cultural landscapes can be traced to the late 19th century euro american scholarship it came to global attention after 1992 following its adoption as a category of site by the unesco world heritage committee today cultural landscape practice has become increasingly complex given the expansion of the values and meanings of heritage the influence of environmental challenges such as human induced climate change technological advancements and the need to better understand and interpret human connections to place and landscapes the aim of this handbook is to strike a balance between theory and practice which we see as inseparable while also seeking to achieve a geographical spread disciplinary diversity and perspectives and a mix of authors from academic practitioner management and community backgrounds

new approaches to both cultural landscapes and historic urban landscapes increasingly recognize the need to guide future change rather than simply protecting the fabric of the past challenging traditional notions of historic preservation conserving cultural landscapes takes a dynamic multifaceted approach to conservation it builds on the premise that a successful approach to urban and cultural landscape conservation recognizes cultural as well as natural values sustains traditional connections to place and engages people in stewardship where they live and work it brings together academics within the humanities and humanistic social sciences conservation and preservation professionals practitioners and stakeholders to rethink the meaning and practice of cultural heritage conservation encourage international cooperation and stimulate collaborative research and scholarship

since 1972 unesco has been compiling a list of world heritage sites worthy of protection and conservation for the long term written by someone who has been involved with the selection of sites for unesco this book presents a personal insight into the process and what inspires and guides the decision making of its members peter fowler examines the idea of a cultural landscape how it is defined and why some landscapes are important and others less so guiding the reader through some of the cultural landscapes designated as a world heritage site he also reveals some of the politics involved the

rivalry between areas seeking protection and the contentious issues that arise including mount athos in greece tikal national park in guatemala kakadu national park in australia the isles of scilly and hadrian s wall it will be a thoroughly interesting and engaging book for anyone interested in the preservation of our cultural heritage worldwide

while historical and protected landscapes have been well studied for years the cultural significance of ordinary landscapes is now increasingly recognised this groundbreaking book discusses how contemporary cultural landscapes can be and are created and recognised the book challenges common concepts of cultural landscapes as protected or special landscapes that include significant buildings or features using case studies from around the world it questions the usual measures of judgement related to cultural landscapes and instead focuses on landscapes that are created planned or simply evolve as a result of changing human cultures management policy and practice each contribution analyses the geographical and human background of the landscape and policies and management strategies that impact upon it and defines the meanings of cultural landscape in its particular context taken together they establish a new paradigm in the study of landscapes in all forms

cultural landscapes are usually understood within physical geography as those transformed by human action as human influence on the earth increases advances in palaeocological reconstruction have also allowed for new interpretations of the evidence for the earliest human impacts on the environment it is essential that such evidence is examined in the context of modern trends in social sciences and humanities this stimulating new book argues that convergence of the two approaches can provide a more holistic understanding of long term physical and human processes split into two major sections this book attempts to bridge the gap between the sciences and humanities the first section provides an analysis of the methodological tools employed in examining processes of environmental change empirical research in the fields of palaeocology and quaternary studies is combined with the latest theoretical views of nature and landscape occurring in cultural geography archaeology and anthropology the author examines the way in which environmental management decisions are made the book then moves on to discuss the relevance of this perspective to contemporary issues through a wide variety of international case studies including world heritage protection landscape preservation indigenous people and cultural tourism

cultural landscapes are created by people and used by people but still decidedly rich in biodiversity and in harmony with nature the landscapes of fairy tales without dragons socio economic complexity on top of biological diversity is the challenge nature conservation faces in the context of cultural landscape this book is an attempt to approach this complexity and provide a theoretical background as well as guidelines and examples for hands on solutions it draws on inputs from scientists administrators independent consultants and politicians from europe and the united states with a particular emphasis on agriculture it attempts to merge disciplines such as philosophy law planning economics and conservation biology toward a common goal nature conservation and the preservation of biological diversity in landscapes under the pressure of human usage

pluralism of south asia belies any singular reading of its heritage in spite of this diversity its cultural traditions retain certain attributes that are at their core south asian in their capacity to self organize enact and reinvent cultural memories and in their ability to retain an intimate connection with nature and landscape this volume focuses on the notion of cultural landscape as a medium integrating multiple forms of heritage and points to a new paradigm for conservation practices in the south asian context even though the construct of cultural landscape has been accepted as a category of heritage its potent use in heritage management in general and within the south asian context in particular has not been widely studied the volume challenges the prevalent views of heritage management in south asia that are entrenched in colonial legacies and contemporary global policy frameworks

through stories of diverse landscapes from around the world this book captures human cultures and their land use practices in the environments they inhabit the chapters cover topics from heritage in the 21st century appreciating and safeguarding values while facing challenges wrought by change this title will lead readers through fascinating stories of landscapes and people we learn of the physical and spiritual structure of rice terraces of the honghe mountains in china maintained by following a 1300 year sustainable practice of water allocation while the colonial tea plantations of the sri lankan highlands are managed by indian tamils who now seek tourism as a means of additional income sustainable agricultural methods in the usa are being introduced to prevent landscape loss while in australia a challenge confronting family farms is progressing to rural industrialisation challenges are further outlined in the mythical story of finland s saint henrik pilgrimage and in the intangible ui won gardens of korea the huge challenge for japan s landscapes is the legacy from fierce natural 21st century disasters while in australia s dampier archipelago an avoidable yet brutal development on a unique aboriginal rock sculptured landscape highlights serious concerns about heritage governance these remarkable stories of landscapes and their management are inseparable from the communities that inhabit them this book was originally published as a special issue of landscape research

in this book an international group of authors reflects mechanisms of the cultural and social construction of landscapes international migration and global exchange are associated with a multitude of different cultural meanings of landscapes the logics of multi cultural perceptions and meanings of landscape call for trans disciplinary research and for guidance on addressing culturally sensitive issues and inclusion in practical planning

places are locations of value where psychological and cultural needs are satisfied human relationships with particular environments play a key role in motivating developing and nurturing the life of societies undifferentiated space becomes 'place' as we understand it better and its built and natural forms become endowed with value however misunderstanding the critical importance of heritage locations particularly based on rejection of local and regional distinctiveness has often led to their destruction featuring essays from across central europe and beyond and aimed at practitioners decision makers and concerned citizens alike this book raises awareness about the responsibility that we bear for every action taken that modifies the formal and socio cultural context potentially these actions can negatively impact the cultural landscape learning to recognize the essential value of heritage to the 'placeness' of our cities and landscapes is vital in helping us to preserve and enjoy their intrinsic beauty and cultural importance

this book offers perspectives on how to develop a sustainable global balance of urbanization land use intensification land abandonment and multifunctional cultural landscapes the focus is on the latter by describing the large variety of traditional cultural landscapes having evolved through centuries or even millennia by the use of the natural terrestrial and aquatic resources those cultural landscapes encompass pasture agroforestry terraced irrigation coastal monastic and sacred landscapes as well as lake river and saltscapes the restoration of low input land use systems which often carry a high biodiversity on the species ecosystem and landscape level as well as agrobiodiversity and agrodiversity is outlined the restoration of multifunctional and

diverse landscapes however is not only an ecological issue but encompasses many socio economic aspects such as e g the revitalization of villages eco tourism healthy food production infrastructure and rural urban partnerships global environmental problems which are related to urbanization and the intensification of the use of land and water resources are comprehensively outlined land abandonment which occurs on all continents is qualitatively and quantitatively assessed and the consequences for natural and cultural heritage loss is highlighted with the presentation of current rural development and landscape conservation strategies on the national as well as international level the topic reflects the high significance of environmental policy on the global scale the global implementation of natural and cultural heritage conservation is for example given by the unesco world heritage sites national parks biosphere reserves globally important agricultural heritage sites high nature value farmland and the satoyama initiative however also the every day landscapes can contribute to biodiversity and strong sustainability this comprehensive compendium based on about 4 000 references of scientific studies literature reviews project reports and environmental policy papers is thought for all students scholars and stakeholders from multifaceted disciplines interested in multifunctional cultural landscapes and how traditions and innovation on the landscape level can be merged for a sustainable future on our planet case studies from all over the world are presented which can be used in higher education or to demonstrate the numerous approaches of sustainable rural development

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
