the photographer the photographed the viewer and those who are using the
photography are often contradictory from these beginnings they develop a theory of
photography that has at its centre the form s essential ambiguity arguing that
photography is totally unlike a film and has nothing to do with reportage rather it

constitutes another way of telling the unique combination of critic and photographer results in a work that moves beyond the landmarks established by walter benjamin roland barthes and susan sontag to establish a new theory of photography this unique combination of words and pictures includes 230 photographs by jean mohr

from early reports of the invention to its wide application during world war i the idea of photography created anticipation and participation in the modern world the first volume of a history of photography in canada captures this phenomenon by looking at hundreds of photographs generated in and about canada in the making and by listening to the chords they struck in the collective imagination emphasizing technological readiness and cultural eagerness for the medium martha langford shows how photography served ideals of progress and improvement as canada's settler society looked to master the world by seizing its visible traces the imposition of these programs on indigenous peoples and indentured labourers is confronted throughout this volume which offers both narratives and counternarratives of subjectification reproducing images of people places events and objects from the unceded territories of the first nations inuit and métis from british north america and from the dominion of canada and the dominion of newfoundland langford asks where and when photographs were taken why and by whom how did the making and preservation of a photograph alter the circumstances in which it was produced and how did this affect individual and collective consciousness alongside accomplished portraits landscapes still lifes and their vernacular counterparts the book draws glimmers of photographic experience from treatises and doggerel official reports and personal diaries newspapers magazines letters and travelogues anticipation to participation chronicles eight decades of reinvention and repurposing from a wondrous discovery to the wide adoption of a basic tool for knowledge gathering artmaking and journaling langford's sweeping narrative rewrites the history of photography from the bottom up vividly expanding the definition of photographic experience

the british painter francis bacon 1909 1992 is famed for his idiosyncratic mode of depicting the human figure thirty years after his death his working methods remain underexplored new research on the francis bacon studio archive at hugh lane gallery dublin sheds light on the genesis of his works namely the photographic source material he collected in his studios on which he consistently based his paintings the book brings together the artist's pictorial springboards for the first time delineating and interpreting recurring patterns and methods in his preparatory work and adoption of photographic material in addition it correctly locates chance as a driving force in bacon's working method and qualifies the significance of photography for the painter german photo book award 23 24 gold in the category text volume photo theory

from the publisher john gutmann 1905 1998 was one of america s most distinctive photographers born in germany where he trained as an artist and art teacher he fled the nazis in 1933 and settled in san francisco reinventing himself as a photo reporter gutmann captured images of american culture celebrating signs of a vibrant democracy however imperfect his own status as an outsider a jew in germany a naturalized citizen in the united states informed his focus on individuals from the asian american african american and gay communities as well as his photography in india burma and china during world war ii this handsome book acknowledges gutmann s place in the history of photography drawing on his archive of photographs and papers at the center for creative photography it presents both unfamiliar works and little known contexts for his imagery linking his photography to his passionate interest in painting and filmmaking his collections of non western art and artifacts and his pedagogy in addition to a major essay by sally stein the volume includes an introduction by douglas r nickel and an overview of the gutmann archive by amy rule

in an age of digital photography and advanced technology viewers often neglect a photograph s composition and aesthetic value in favour of its informative value principles of design through photography is an investigation of how a particular principle of design

rhythm harmony contrast balance and symmetry is used in a composition and how that composition will in turn help the photographer convey an effective message to the viewer each composition aims to give a visual experience of the principle of design that helps to better perceive a photograph each principle of design has been isolated as much as possible so that it can be understood and used in combination with other design elements this book is an introduction to the way in which photographs can be read and appreciated and will delight students of photography aesthetes and those who are curious about design and photography

photography one of the most influential inventions of the nineteenth century has been shaped by canadian innovators among them are two quebec men who have flown beneath the radar in studies of the history of photography the smeaton brothers out of the studio documents the life oeuvre and achievement of charles smeaton and his younger brother john launched by the opening of their photographic gallery in 1861 they developed a reputation in quebec for images of contemporaneous people places and events taken in challenging outdoor settings smeaton pictures of the aftermath of the great fire of quebec in 1866 helped bring an understanding of the disaster to an international audience images featuring the gold mining industry were displayed at the exposition universelle in paris the following year when charles travelled to europe in 1866 he accomplished a feat previously thought impossible taking the first successful photographs in the roman catacombs john moved to montreal in 1869 where he worked for newspapers and developed techniques for the direct transfer of photographs into print without the necessity of intermediary engravings out of the studio is the first comprehensive biographical study detailing the innovation and imagination of the smeaton brothers and their legacy of images across two continents

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
