in the current resurgence of interest in heidegger an important aspect of his thought has been neglected namely his long standing interest in asian philosophy heidegger and asian thought is the first book devoted to exploring this fascinating topic it brings together essays twelve scholars from india china japan germany and the united states most of which were written especially for this volume the essays discuss heidegger s thinking in relation to vedanta taoism zen and tibetan buddhist philosophy heidegger s acquaintance with asian thought beginning from his familiarity with the chuang tzu as early as 1930 is fully documented including an account of his work on a partial translation of the tao te ching into german this book will be of interest not only to heidegger scholars but also to students of asian and comparative philosophy and religion

the striking parallels between derrida s deconstruction and certain strategies eschewing oppositional hierarchies in asian thought especially in buddhism and daoism have attracted much attention from scholars of both western and asian philosophy this book contributes to this discussion by focusing on the ethical dimension and function of deconstruction in asian thought examining different traditions and schools of asian thought including indian buddhism zen other schools of east asian buddhism the kyoto school and daoism the contributors explore the central theme from different contexts and different angles insights and notions from the contemporary discussion of derridean deconstruction and its ethic or derridean levinasian ethic as a paradigm for comparison or interpretation are used as a framework furthering our understanding of the relationship between deconstruction and the ethical in asian traditions this book also enriches the contemporary ethical discourse from a global perspective by bridging asia and the west

this multi authored monograph argues that the use of paradox and contradictions in contrast to in typical western thought can deepen rather than disprove philosophical thought and discussion here the authors apply this view to east asian philosophy examining two classical daoist texts the daodejing and the zhuangzi and the trajectory of buddhism in east asia including the san lun tiantai chan and zen traditions culminating with the kyoto school of philosophy in the twentieth century the work ultimately concludes that contradictory positions illuminate deeper understandings of inconsistencies in reality and in the world

this book broadens the inquiry into emotion to comprehend a comparative cultural outlook it begins with an overview of recent work in the west and then proceeds to the main business of scrutinizing various relevant issues from both asian and comparative perspectives finally robert solomon comments and summarizes

this book guides readers through ten classic works of asian philosophy several major schools of eastern thought are discussed including hinduism buddhism confucianism daoism taoism and chan zen the author connects the ideas of these schools to those of western philosophy thereby making the material accessible to people who are unfamiliar with the cultures and intellectual traditions of asia a wide range of important topics are addressed reality time self knowledge ethics human nature enlightenment and death

in an attempt to bridge the vast divide between classical asian thought and contemporary western philosophy joel j kupperman finds that the two traditions do not by and large supply different answers to the same questions rather each tradition is searching for answers to their own set of questions mapping out distinct philosophical investigations in this groundbreaking book kupperman argues that the foundational indian and chinese texts include lines of thought that can enrich current philosophical practice and in some cases provide uniquely sophisticated insights special attention is given to the ethical issues of formation and fluidity of self the nature and possibilities of choice the compartmentalization of life implicit in some ethical systems the variations of ethical demands from person to person and the nature of philosophy itself as a communicative activity this study will provide a wealth of information for philosophers seeking a closer knowledge of asian philosophy and general readers with an interest in eastern thought

asian thought volumes i and 2 is intended to serve as an introduction to the most important and enduring religious spiritual and intellectual traditions of india china tibet and japan all civilizations attempt to explain what humans could not explain questions about the causes and meaning of an eclipse an earthquake a flood or tsunami an illness about the possibility of some life after death or the general meaning of existence are all in need of explanation from these kinds of questions comes a world view encapsulated in symbols which guides the choices and lives of those within the system westerners who have never taken a course in world religions tend to assume that anything that is called a religion will be like christianity it will have a god or gods as its central core and would believe that this divinity lays down moral and social rules believe that humans have an eternal soul and that there is life after death when one will be judged similar concepts are true for a few asian thought systems but by no means all in volume 2 we focus on east asia specifically china and japan we will begin with china where we find confucianism taoism legalism and other early thought systems plus later developments in chinese buddhism and neo confucianism in japan we will review several varieties of buddhism including the pure land and zen traditions and the ancient religion of shinto

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
