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this updated edition has been thoroughly revised to take account of recent scholarship and includes five new chapters

reading old english texts first published in 1997 focuses on the critical methods being used and developed for reading and analysing writings in old english the collection is timely given the explosion of interest in the theory method and practice of critical reading each chapter engages with work on old english texts from a particular methodological stance the authors are all experts in the field but are also concerned to explain their method and its application to a broad undergraduate and graduate readership the chapters include a brief historical background to the approach a definition of the field or method under consideration a discussion of some exemplary criticism with a balance of prose and verse passages an illustration of the ways in which

texts are read through this approach and some suggestions for future work

seamus heaney's engagement with medieval literature constitutes a significant body of work by a major poet including a landmark translation of beowulf this title examines both heaney's direct translations and his adaptation of medieval material in his original poems

interpretations of beowulf brings together over six decades of literary scholarship illustrating a variety of interpretative schools the essays not only deal with most of the major issues of beowulf criticism including structure style genre and theme but also offer the sort of explanations of particular passages that are invaluable to a careful reading of a poem this up to date collection of significant critical approaches fills a long standing need for a companion volume for the study of the poem larger patterns in the history of beowulf criticism are also traceable in the chronological order of the collection the contributors are theodore m andersson arthur gilchrist brodeur jane chance laurence n de looze margaret e goldsmith stanley b greenfield joseph harris edward b irving jr john leyerle francis p magoun jr m b mcnamee s j berthas phillpotts john c pope richard n ringler geoffrey r russom t a shippey and j r r tolkien

this review of the critical reception of old english literature from 1900 to the present moves beyond a focus on individual literary texts so as to survey the different schools methods and assumptions that have shaped the discipline examines the notable works and authors from the period including beowulf the venerable bede heroic poems and devotional literature reinforces key perspectives with excerpts from ten critical studies addresses questions of medieval literacy textuality and orality as well as style gender genre and theme embraces the interdisciplinary nature of the field with reference to historical studies religious studies anthropology art history and more

this work includes twenty four essays including a preface introduction afterword and sections containing seminal methodological pieces by such giants as edward said and michel foucault as well as contemporary applications to beowulf and other old english and germanic texts focusing on historicism psychoanalysis gender textuality and post colonialism

old english heroic poems and the social life of texts develops the theme that all stories all beautiful lies if one considers them as such have a potentially myth like function as they enter and re enter the stream of human consciousness in particular the volume assesses the place of heroic poetry including beowulf widsith and the battle of maldon in the evolving society of anglo saxon england during the tenth century period of nation building poetry nils argues was a great collective medium through which the anglo saxons conceived of their changing social world and made mental adjustments to it old english heroic geography is examined as an aspect of the mentality of that era so too is the idea of the oral poet or bard as a means by which the people of this time continued to conceive of themselves in defiance of reality as members of a tribe like community knit by close personal bonds the volume is rounded off by the identification of bede's story of the poet caedmon as the earliest known example of a modern folktale type and

by a spirited defense of seamus heaney's recent verse translation of beowulf

this collection of essays aims at freeing beowulf from the burden of its critical past and future it begins with a balanced yet unsparing review of the uses and abuses of contemporary criticism and continues with answers for questions familiar to students of the poem the christian pagan dilemma the connection with the grettis saga the value of treasure the role of drinking the identity of the messenger the poet on poetry the poet's rhetoric the events in heorot the notorious gífstol crux the importance of wordplay and the poet's understanding of fate other essays also engage a wide range of general topics the poet's lively sense of humour use of the *liber monstrorum* the poet's scatology and canonical parody sartorial anticipation of carlyle and more

seminar paper from the year 2004 in the subject english history of literature eras grade sehr gut 1 0 free university of berlin anglistisches seminar language english abstract among the many features which shaped and defined the reception of beowulf throughout the last 150 years the poem's complex interplay of germanic and christian worldviews has certainly been one of the most controversial in recent time particular efforts have been made to account for the exact meaning which the poem authenticates i e the point of view which beowulf's christian narrative voice exhibits towards the secular events depicted in the poem in search for such an authorial stance scholars have traditionally focused either on the christian or the heroic dimension of the story whereas most 19th century scholars e g ettm ller thorkelin ten brink in the vein of a romantic strive to unearth national origins tended to emphasize its essentially pagan mythical status and consequently downplayed the significance of any christian interpolations the 20th century beginning with klaeber instead witnessed a radical shift towards a christian allegorical understanding of the poem although nowadays most critics opt for a more balanced viewpoint the logical impossibility of two coexisting cultural frameworks into which beowulf seems embedded still remains and continues to generate much scholarly dispute in the course of this essay i shall investigate the relation between heroic and christian aspects in beowulf and thus try to account for the authorial meaning which the text itself is most likely to endorse

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
