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one of the most complex global challenges is improving wellbeing and developing strategies for promoting health or preventing illbeing of the population the role of designers in indirectly supporting the promotion of healthy lifestyles or in their contribution to illbeing has emerged this

means designers now need to consider both morally and ethically how they can ensure that they do no harm and that they might deliberately decide to promote healthy lifestyles and therefore prevent ill health design for health illustrates the history of the development of design for health the various design disciplines and domains to which design has contributed through 26 case studies presented in this book the authors reveal a plethora of design research methodologies and research methods employed in design for health the editors also present following a thematic analysis of the book chapters seven challenges and seven areas of opportunity that designers are called upon to address within the context of healthcare furthermore five emergent trends in design in healthcare are presented and discussed this book will be of interest to students of design as well as designers and those working to improve the quality of healthcare

architecture of health is a story about the design and life of hospitals about how they are born and evolve about the forces that give them shape and the shifts that conspire to render them inadequate reading architecture through the history of hospitals is a deciphering tool for unlocking the elemental principles of architecture and the intractable laws of human and social conditions that architecture serves in each of our lives this book encounters brilliant and visionary designers who were hospital architects but also systems designers driven by the aim of social change they faced the contradictions of health care in their time and found innovative ways to solve for specific medical dilemmas less known designers like filarete llus domonech i montaner albert schweitzer max fry and jane drew john dawe tetlow gordon friesen thomas wheeler and eberhard zeidler are studied here while the medical spaces of more widely known architects like isambard brunel alvaraalto le corbusier louis kahn and paul rudolph also help

inform this history all these characters were polymaths and provocateurs but none quite summarizes this history more succinctly than Florence Nightingale who in laying out her guidelines for ward design in 1859 shows how the design of a medical facility can influence an entire political and social order. Architecture of Health richly illustrated with images and never before published renderings and drawings from the mass design group charts historical epidemics alongside modern and contemporary architectural transformations in service of medicine, health and habitation. It explores how infrastructure facilitates healing and architecture's greater role in constructing our societies.

Design innovation for health and medicine offers an innovative approach for solving complex healthcare issues. In this book, three design experts examine a range of case studies to explain how design is used in health and medicine, exploring issues such as diverse patient needs, an ageing population and the impact of globalisation on disease. A case for government intervention can be made where it can be argued that either there is market failure or that a market based solution, even though efficient, is not optimal according to the government's definition of welfare. The provision of healthcare faces many problems of market failure and welfare loss that are accentuated by the fact the consequences of low quality healthcare can seriously impair the quality of life and are often irreversible and sometimes even life threatening. In healthcare, there are a number of distortions present that make the idealised view of markets a difficult one to sustain. These include: a lack of knowledge of one's own health; b) consequent upon this, a high level of price elasticity in the primary healthcare domain when the disease is at an early stage and a low level for secondary and tertiary care when the illness is considerably advanced; c) a number of behavioural issues which influence health seeking behaviours; d) a high level of information asymmetry between the provider and the patient; e) a relatively primitive state of the art in medicine itself combined with rapid changes; and f) high volatility in healthcare expenditures at the level of the individual. Given these issues, countries have struggled to devise solutions to develop well functioning health systems within the limits of their internal capacities to finance and govern these systems in order to ensure that the health system that is chosen by a country has a good design and uses its governmental and other resources in an optimal manner. It becomes important to first study it carefully and to only then

develop choices for policy makers there are a number of frameworks that facilitate this study and suggest that it is indeed possible to arrive at feasible designs even in highly resource constrained settings
