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in the critical essays collected in *Black Looks* bell hooks interrogates old narratives and argues for alternative ways to look at blackness black subjectivity and whiteness her focus is on spectatorship in particular the way blackness and black people are experienced in literature music television and especially film and her aim is to create a radical intervention into the way we talk about race and representation as she describes the essays in *Black Looks* are meant to challenge and unsettle to disrupt and subvert as students scholars activists intellectuals and any other readers who have engaged with the book since its original release in 1992 can attest that is exactly what these pieces do

according to the *washington post* no one who cares about contemporary african american cultures can ignore bell hooks electrifying feminist explorations targeting cultural icons as diverse as madonna and spike lee *Outlaw Culture* presents a collection of essays that pulls no punches as hooks herself notes interrogations of popular culture can be

roger a sneed offers an alternative approach to black homosexuality for black religious scholars who have traditionally viewed homosexuality as a problem instead by drawing on a range of black gay writers representations of homosexuality points black religious scholarship towards an ethics of openness

in 1920 w e b du bois cited the damnation of women as linked to the devaluation of motherhood this dilemma he argues had a crushing blow on black women as they were forced into slavery black womanhood portrayed as hypersexual by nature became an enduring stereotype which did not coincide with the dignity of mother and wife this portrayal continues to reinforce negative stereotypes of black women in the media today this book highlights how black women have been negatively portrayed in the media focusing on the export nature of media and its ability to convey notions of blackness to the public it argues that media such as rap music videos television dramas reality television shows and

newscasts create and affect expectations of black women exploring the role that racism misogyny and media play in the representation of black womanhood it provides a foundation for challenging contemporary media's portrayal of black women

even with increased attention to refugee women's issues in the late 20th century post colonial discourses have nurtured limiting representations of refugee women predominantly as subjects of charity and as victims adding to a growing body of work in the field the author challenges this preconception by offering an opportunity for women's voices

precarious empowerment sexual labor in the coffee shops of chile's santiago provides a textured and telling exploration into the lives and experiences of sex workers in chile their encounters with discrimination and economic precarity and their empowered resistance set in and around tinted cafes spaces hidden from public view where women dance for their male clients and perform sexual services within chile's capital city of santiago author pilar ortiz traces connections between sex work in the present day and the lasting legacies of colonialism and gender and sexual norms drawing on her careful ethnographic observations and in depth interviews with the workers and their clients the book reveals the many challenges women face at the intersection of class racial and gender inequalities it also documents their resistance to stigma and stifling social norms and predetermined gender roles in their practice of sexual labor the book argues that women display a considerable degree of agency mobility and empowerment within this contentious space the author explores how sex workers negotiate inequalities and exclusion and how they are poised to do so in a rapidly changing political and social climate exploring experiences of exploitation and resistance within chile this book speaks to the much larger question of agency versus oppression in conversations about sexual labor worldwide its compelling

analysis will captivate those interested in scholarly studies of sexual labor and the ways it is performed and shaped across hierarchies of race class and gender

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providing fully developed rhetorical theories from feminist perspectives this book offers coherent systematic overviews of complex large bodies of work and ideas relevant to rhetoric and communication the book presents theories developed from the work of nine feminist theorists each from diverse standpoints demonstrating the diversity of both feminism and feminist rhetorical theories chris kramarae bell hooks gloria anzaldúa mary daly starhawk paula gunn allen trinh t minh ha sally miller gearhart and sonia johnson the resulting theories differ substantially from traditional rhetorical theories and will encourage scholars to rethink many traditional rhetorical constructs

a collection of photographs and poems celebrating black dolls from around the world includes historical background about some of the dolls

the second edition of melanie bush s acclaimed everyday forms of whiteness looks at the often unseen ways racism impacts our lives the author has interviewed and surveyed hundreds of college students and reveals that even though we talk as though we live in a post racial world after the election of barack obama racism is still very much a factor in everyday life the second edition incorporates new data and interviews to show how the everyday thinking of ordinary people contributes to the perpetuation of systemic racialized inequality the book introduces key terms for the study for race and ethnicity reveals the mechanisms that support the racial hierarchy in u s society then outlines ways we can challenge long standing patterns of racial inequality

implicitly the essays show how the souls of black folk has influenced teaching practices and suggested alternative ways of teaching that create a pedagogy of inclusion

if it can be argued that young people construct their identities through the social formation of boundaries then it is important to uncover how social cultural and political boundaries are created and lived through popular music this is both a pedagogical and political concern

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
