this collection of essays edited by eric johnson and stanton jones offers four different models for the relationship between christianity and psychology

this book follows the standard progression of introductory psychology texts and adds a christian perspective that contributes needed diversity to the study of the mind and behavior topics range from esp to moral development each chapter provides an introduction and overview of a given theme a discussion of issues an exploration of how psychological and biblical perspectives might be complementary and a recap with suggested readings

the psychology of christian character formation offers clergy and those preparing for ministry some of the potential riches provided by rapidly developing branches of contemporary scientific psychology of which they might otherwise be unaware joanna collicutt an experienced psychologist and theological educator focuses on the psychology of character virtue and spirituality furthermore the psychology is not used to support training in pastoral ministry to others but rather to support the reader s own self awareness and spiritual growth joanna collicutt understands christian formation as christian communities and their members growing up into conformity with the character of christ through the action of the holy spirit this is explored in the three parts of the book first an exploration of the process of christian formation that includes a detailed analysis of the character of jesus of nazareth secondly some focused psychology aimed at supporting an informed self awareness in the reader finally and the most lengthy section a series of chapters devoted to using psychological insights to help cultivate the christ like characteristics identified in the first section

introductory psychology courses can raise significant questions about the nature of being human christianity with its emphasis on humans made in the image of god has a clear perspective psychology offers answers too but they are often subtly implied this introductory guide drawn from more than fifty years of classroom experience provides students with a coherent framework for considering psychology from a christian perspective the authors explore biblical themes of human nature in relation to all major areas of psychology showing how a christian understanding of humans can inform the study of psychology brief accessible chapters correspond to standard introductory psychology textbooks making this an excellent supplemental text end of chapter questions are included a test bank for professors is available through baker academic s textbook esources

between these two sources of knowledge about humans this book goes to the heart of the past and present dialogue between christianity and psychology comparing three models that have been used to describe the relationship between them because christianity and psychology deal with different levels of truth and speak vastly different languages efforts to unify them often create more problems than they solve what is needed is a better way to think about the relationship an approach that does justice to the emerging insights from psychological science and biblical scholarship and that can enrich our understanding of both in this volume two accomplished psychologists show how this complementary dialogue can unfold giving us a broader deeper understanding of ourselves our relationships and our place in the cosmos

since the first edition of integrative approaches to psychology and christianity was published in 2004 this has become the standard textbook on the topic now in its fully revised fourth edition dr entwistle s book elucidates historical philosophical and practical issues in the integration of psychology and christianity as in previous editions the current text provides an introduction to many of the worldview issues and philosophical foundations that frame the relationship of psychology and theology includes scholarly reflection on the integration literature and surveys six models of possible relationships between psychology and christianity ranging from those that are completely opposed to either religion or psychology to intermediate models that assert that some limited interaction between them is possible to viewpoints which suggest that a christian worldview approach can be used to provide a context for exploring areas of overlapping interest between psychology and christianity the current edition considers recent advances in both catholic and protestant thinking on integration including contemporary questions about what evangelicalism is and is not that shape evangelical reactions to the integration debate new content ranges from information about the contrasting views of tertullian and augustine to insights from contemporary psychology about factors that adversely affect the quality and reliability of human thinking to how conflict over covid 19 has entered contemporary religious debate the book is designed to help readers become aware of the presuppositional backdrops that each of us brings to these issues questions at the end of each chapter are included to help readers evaluate both the material and their own burgeoning approach to integration this book is ideal as a textbook for students of psychology and other behavioral and social sciences social work sociology theology counseling pastoral counseling at both the graduate and undergraduate level it is also written for the broader readership of psychologists counselors pastors and others

over the past century theories about personality have greatly increased our insight into ourselves we have greater knowledge and understanding of the unconscious of sexuality aggression the self personal relations the influence of childhood morality guilt dreams and so on but modern personality has little or nothing to say about any need for god in accounts of psychologists jung apart god is dead peter morea seeks to remedy this lack by combining the insights of scientific psychology and religion in an approach to the study of personality he takes six accounts of personality given by famous christians and presents them as significant theories in their own right relevant now using them to engage in dialogue with the variety of modern theories the christians he chooses are varied in time and approach augustine of hippo soren kierkegaard thomas merton blaise pascal teresa of avila and karl rahner after they have been studied peter morea examines the similarities and differences between scientific and christian theories of personality such as in their analysis of self then he considers the materialist assumptions behind

scientific theories and in a subsequent chapter the different assumptions of christian accounts his conclusion is that those of christian theories are as reasonable as those behind science and that in spite of differences between the two the task of relating them has already begun with existential and humanistic psychology

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
