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when the first europeans arrived in the hawaiian islands in 1778 the volcano goddess pele was the central deity of a complex religion in the volcano districts of hawai i

island while native hawaiians were quickly converted to christianity pele remained remarkably relevant as a deity this book is a critical biography of the volcano goddess as well as a history of her religion topics covered include the ongoing belief in pele her popular manifestations her ceremonies her new cultural roles and her current status in hawai i

possessing the power to create new land pele also has a volcanic personality an impetuous lusty nature jealous unpredictable capable of sudden fury and great violence yet she can also be gentle loving and as serene as her forests of ferns and flowering trees page 4 of cover

the ancient legends of hawaii tell how pele came to the islands from far across the sea after traveling from north to south testing each of the islands for a home suitable for herself and her family she took up her abode inhalemaumau crater at the summit of kilauea on the island of hawaii to the hawaiians of old she was a living deity today pele personifies the volcano to visitors and residents showing her capriciousness and power while both destroying and creating new land perhaps it is she who weaves the spell that brings people back again and again to the island of hawaii sometimes to spend the rest of their days in this vibrant land that can be said of both likeke r mcbride the author and dietrich varez the illustrator often crossing paths they each found homes for themselves and their families and lived for decades in volcano deep in the land of pele join them in exploring stories of the fire goddess that clearly paint the history of this dynamic land as seen through the eyes of inhabitants over generations passed down through the ages originally published over fifty years ago pele volcano goddess of hawaii will now with new illustrations give these tales renewed life

and linguistic contexts offering an illuminating overview of the origin of the polynesians as a distinct people and tracing their voyages and settlements from indonesia to malaysia tonga samoa the marquesas the various islands of eastern polynesia including hawaii easter island and new zealand the introduction presents fascinating information on polynesian navigational skills and the voyages themselves as well as a chart that details the evolution of the thirty polynesian languages and compares cognates from several of these languages a simplified pronunciation guide and a selected list of polynesian dictionaries and or grammars are provided for those interested in pursuing the richness of the polynesian languages this introductory survey gives readers the necessary background to understand the origin development and dispersion of the myths throughout the pacific basin the dictionary of polynesian mythology is the result of many years of research the individual entries were gleaned from nearly 300 sources in english german french and polynesian languages with the majority extracted from a number of primary sources that date generally in the nineteenth and early twentieth centuries the printed source materials for this volume are fully described and listed by geographical group including maori cook islands tahitian marquesan hawaiian samoan and tongan general collections that retell the polynesian stories are also surveyed the entries are alphabetically arranged by major mythological figure lesser characters can be located in the index short bibliographical citations author date and page number are included at the end of each main entry to direct readers to fuller information contained in the printed sources an appendix provides valuable supplemental information on polynesian gods and goddesses this dictionary is sure to become a basic reference tool for libraries students and scholars of pacific history and culture as well as for courses in mythology religion and philosophy

one of the great epics of hawaiian mythology is the story of pele goddess of hawai i s volcanoes and her youngest sister hi iakaikapoliopole pele was driven out of her homeland after a quarrel with her older sister namakaokaha i a sea goddess she readied her great double hulled voyaging canoe and left kahiki sailing to hawai i she was accompanied by a number of relatives including her youngest sister hi iaka the heroine of our story none of the islands seemed to suit pele until she reached hawai i

transmitted and remembered this is not a history book nor is it spiritual tourism this is a torch passing the reader is invited not only to learn but to remember to remember what the soul already knows to reawaken that quiet ember within the one that responds when it hears the drum smells the smoke or feels the earth humming a language older than thought volume i is the foundation the first flame and prepares the reader for the deeper darker and more dangerous lineages that follow in later volumes but without these roots there can be no ascent in a world of forgetting this is a book of remembering let the first flame be lit
