violent misogynist phenomena such as revenge porn toxic geek masculinity and men s rights movements banet weiser
traces how popular feminism and popular misogyny are co constituted from black girls code and the always likeagirl
campaign to gamergate and the 2016 presidential election banet weiser shows how popular feminism is met with a
misogynistic backlash of mass harassment assault and institutional neglect in so doing she contends that popular
feminism s problematic commitment to visibility limits its potential and collective power

an examination of feminist writers appropriation of a range of popular genres detective fiction science fiction romance and the fairy tale the author argues that feminists can successfully appropriate all four genres because genres as cultural productions have accommodated the cultural changes brought about by second wave feminism the book

provides a history of each of the genres reinstating women's contributions in those histories and a comprehensive review of the feminist critical debates on each of the genres

in this accessible introductory guide the author identifies key feminist approaches to popular culture from the 1960s to the present and demonstrates how the relationship between feminism femininity and popular culture has often been a troubled one the book introduces the central ideas of both second wave feminism and feminist cultural studies and demonstrates how they inform feminist debates about a range of popular forms and practices through a series of case studies the woman's film romantic fiction soap opera consumption and material culture fashion and beauty practices and youth culture and popular music

sex and sexuality are topics that have defined feminism since its inception what has changed is that there is now a generation of feminists and scholars who are comfortable not only to write in their own disciplines but who incorporate feminist ideas in their research this book assembles a variety of essays most of which were written especially for this collection that negotiate sex and sexuality in historical contexts as well as in contemporary times there is a common ground of history and popular culture among the articles while different theories of feminism operate in these essays feminist lenses have allowed the reevaluation of familiar topics from early religious practices to medieval literature to current films and advertising the authors represented in this collection range from established feminist and gender scholars to those who employ feminist theoretical frameworks in their respective disciplines

when the term postfeminism entered the media lexicon in the 1990s it was often accompanied by breathless headlines

this volume examines the phenomenon of laddishness and the cult of the girlie in film tv advertising music politics literature and society it interprets these trends as a nostalgic longing for a pre feminist society which through the medium of comedy and irony has been manipulated by popular media as a liberation from political correctness contrasting the culture icons of the 1990s with the 1970s tough chicks and the 1980s new man and have it all woman the book aims to show how the rhetoric of laddism emerged and how it has infused so many aspects of our cultural identity

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the relationship between feminism and domesticity has recently come in for renewed interest in popular culture this

collection makes an intervention into the debates surrounding feminism's contentious relationship with domesticity and domestic femininities in popular culture it offers an understanding of the place of domesticity in contemporary popular culture whilst considering how these domesticities might be understood from a feminist perspective all the essays contribute to a more complex understanding of the relationships between feminism femininity and domesticity developing new ways of theorizing these relationships that have marked much of feminist history essay topics include marguerite patten reality television shows like how clean is your house the figure of the maid in contemporary american cinema aging or widowed domestic femininities and the relationship between domesticity and motherhood

soon after its publication in 1973 *fear of flying* brought erica jong immense popular success and media fame alternately pegged sassy and vulgar jong's novel embraced the politics of the women's liberation movement and challenged the definition of female sexuality yet today more than twenty years and several books later literary reputation continues for the most part to elude jong typecast by her adversaries as a media seeking sensationalist erica jong has been unfairly side stepped by academia charlotte templin contends in this carefully researched study augmented by personal interviews with jong templin assembles and analyzes the medley of responses to jong's books by reviewers critics writers academics and the media by liberals conservatives and feminists she examines the diverse opinions on the merit and relevance to contemporary life of *fear of flying* the invocation of a high culture low culture dichotomy to discredit *how to save your own life* the anatomy of literary success with fanny jong's reception in a postfeminist age and the trivialization of jong's works that is inevitable with mass media exposure templin also shows how antagonistic reviewers tend to identify jong with her fictitious characters a practice more common when the author is a woman and judge her to

be guilty of the sin of not being a proper woman in turn she shows how reviewers reveal something of their own values and ideological biases in their critiques and how literary reputations are built destroyed and altered over time the first book to make a detailed examination of the reputation of a woman writer feminism and the politics of literary reputation provides an excellent case study for the literary reception of women writers within a broad cultural context templin s analysis offers valuable insight into the reception of women writers especially commercially successful women writers and dramatically illustrates the relation of literary reputation to popular appeal and cultural mores

while some have argued that we live in a postfeminist era that renders feminism irrelevant to people s contemporary lives this book takes feminism the source of eternal debate contestation and ambivalence and situates the term within the popular cultural practices of everyday life it explores the intimate connections between the politics of feminism and the representational practices of contemporary popular culture examining how feminism is made sensible through visual imagery and popular culture representations it investigates how popular culture is produced represented and consumed to reproduce the conditions in which feminism is valued or dismissed and asks whether antifeminism exists in commodity form and is commercially viable written in an accessible style and analysing a broad range of popular culture artefacts including commercial advertising printed and digital news related journalism and commentary music film television programming websites and social media this book will be of use to students researchers and practitioners of international relations international political economy and gender cultural and media studies

with quiet eloquence lane sunderland argues that we must reclaim the fundamental principles of the constitution if we are to restore democratic government to its proper role in american life for far too long he contends the popular will has been held in check by an overly powerful supreme court using non constitutional principles to make policy and promote its own political agendas his work shows why this has diminished american democracy and what we can do to revive it sunderland presents a strong thoughtful challenge to the constitutional theories promoted by ronald dworkin archibald cox richard epstein michael perry john hart ely robert bork philip kurland laurence tribe mark tushnet and catharine mackinnon an enormously diverse group united by an apparent belief in judicial supremacy their theories he demonstrates undermine the democratic foundations of the constitution and the power of the majority to resolve for itself important questions of justice central to this enterprise is sunderland's reconsideration of the federalist as the first most reliable and most profound commentary on the constitution the federalist he states is crucial because it explains the underlying theory of the constitution as a whole a theory that gives meaning to its particular provisions in addition sunderland reexamines the declaration of independence and the work of hobbes locke and montesquieu in order to

better define the nature and limits of their influence on the framers his reading of these works in conjunction with the federalist shows just how far afield contemporary commentators have strayed sunderland deliberately echoes and amplifies madison s wisdom in federalist no 10 that the object of the constitution is to secure the public good and private rights and at the same time to preserve the spirit and form of popular government to attain that object he persuasively argues requires that the judiciary acknowledge and enforce the constitutional limitations upon its own powers in an era loudly proclaiming the return of popular government majority rule and the will of the people that argument is especially relevant and appealing

the eight essays contained in philosophical feminism and popular culture explore the portrayal of women and various philosophical responses to that portrayal in contemporary post civil rights society the essays examine visual print and performance media stand up comedy movies television and a blockbuster trilogy of novel these philosophical feminist

analyses of popular culture consider the possibilities both positive and negative that popular culture presents for articulating the structure of the social and cultural practices in which gender matters and for changing these practices if and when they follow from lead to or perpetuate discrimination on the basis of gender the essays bring feminist voices to the conversation about gender and attests to the importance of feminist critique in what is sometimes claimed to be a post feminist era

this book presents provocative analyses of the simultaneous oppressions of race class gender and sexuality as well as the role that imperialism plays in the productions of knowledge and of persons a powerful collection
