around the world more young people than ever before are attending university student numbers in south africa have doubled since democracy and for many families higher education is a route to a better future for their children but alongside the overwhelming demand for higher education questions about its purposes have intensified deliberations about the curriculum culture and costing of public higher education abound from student activists academics parents civil society and policy makers we know from macro research that south african graduates generally have

good employment prospects but little is known at a detailed level about how young people actually make use of their university experiences to craft their life courses and even less is known about what happens to those who drop out this accessible book brings together the rich life stories of 73 young people six years after they began their university studies it traces how going to university influences not only their employment options but also nurtures the agency needed to chart their own way and to engage critically with the world around them the book offers deep insights into the ways in which public higher education is both a private and public good and it provides significant conclusions pertinent to anyone who works in and cares about universities

in this book rakesh mittal has narrated his personal experiences describing them in an interesting manner his narration imparts valuable information and wisdom and underlines his conviction that when we think positive things go right

as cliched as it may sound the world is rapidly changing preparing our children for the challenges that these changes may bring in their wake is non negotiable preparation isn't just about acquiring specific knowledge or skills as we can't predict the challenges ahead what is essential is cultivating attitudes and mindsets that enable us to confront whatever obstacles lie ahead to every parent to every school addresses the challenges posed by our swiftly changing vuca volatile uncertain complex and ambiguous world it goes beyond mere knowledge acquisition or curriculum revisions which are necessary and continuous processes nor is it about swapping topics in and out of curricula while these adjustments are necessary they aren't sufficient what is crucial is empowering our children with the capacity to anticipate and adapt to rapid changes as they occur the authors both veteran educators and thought leaders offer a variety of insights and action points making this book a valuable addition to the library of every parent and school

gregory s remarkable career and his scientific work are detailed and critically assessed accounts of his heroic 1893 expedition to the rift valley a term he coined in kenya now the gregory rift his first crossing of spitzbergen and his resignation as leader of the first british antarctic expedition of 1901 when racing to the pole under scott became the priority draw on unpublished letters while in melbourne he published on mining geology and a series of geography textbooks his 1901 lake eyre expedition in central australia initiated the phrase the dead heart of australia and controversy over the source of artesian water in the chair of geology in glasgow from 1904 he

built up the largest first year geology class in the uk over 400 students he worked in every field of geology and every continent except antarctica he was also involved with the search for a homeland for the jews in libya and angola he shrewdly realized that wegener s continental drift theory erroneously supposed that the pacific ocean was wider than now before the atlantic opened this led to his influential rejection of continental drift he drowned in peru traversing the andes having published over 30 books and nearly 400 articles

like other big city school systems chicago s has been repeatedly reformed over the last century yet its schools have fallen far short of citizens expectations and left a gap between the performances of white and minority students many blame the educational establishment for resisting change other critics argue that reform occurs too often still others claim it comes not often enough dorothy shipps reappraises the tumultuous history of educational progress in chicago revealing that the persistent lack of improvement is due not to the extent but rather the type of reform throughout the twentieth century managerial reorganizations initiated by the business community repeatedly altered the governance structure of schools as well as the relationships of teachers to children and parents but brought little improvement while other more promising reform models were either resisted or crowded out shipps chronicles how chicago s corporate actors led abetted or restrained nearly every attempt to transform the city s school system then asks whether schools might be better reformed by others to show why city schools have failed urban children so badly she traces chicago s reform history over four political eras revealing how corporate power was instrumental in designing and revamping the system her narrative encompasses the formative era of 1880 1930 when teachers unions moderated business plans previously unexplored business activism from 1930 to 1980 when civil rights dominated school reform and the decentralization of the 1980s she also covers the uneasy cooperation among business associations in the 1990s to install the mayor as head of the school system a governing regime now challenged by privatization advocates business people may be too wedded to a stunted view of educators to forge a productive partnership for change unionized teachers bridle at the second class status accorded them by managers if reform is to reach deeply into classrooms shipps concludes it might well require a new coalition of teachers unions and parents to create a fresh agenda that supersedes corporate interests this study clearly shows that in chicago as elsewhere urban schooling is intertwined with politics and power by reviewing more than a century of corporate efforts to make education work shipps makes a

strong case that it's high time to look elsewhere perhaps to educators themselves for new leadership

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
