in the postmodern animal steve baker explores how animal imagery has been used in modern and contemporary art and performance and in postmodern philosophy and literature to suggest and shape ideas about identity and creativity baker cogently analyses the work of such european and american artists as olly and suzi mark dion paula rego and sue coe at the same time looking critically at the constructions performances and installations of robert rauschenberg louise bourgeois joseph beuys and other significant late twentieth century artists baker s book draws parallels between the animal s place in postmodern art and poststructuralist theory drawing on works as diverse as jacques derrida s recent analysis of the role of animals in philosophical thought and julian barnes s best selling flaubert s parrot

was there a horse sense in the medieval period why did word licking dogs inhabit manuscript borders the seven intriguing articles in this publication explore animals on the edge and the boundaries between humans and animals these articles provide insights into the discussions in animal studies and medieval studies about the multiple roles of medieval fauna challenging our understanding of how animals were understood in the middle ages the authors of the articles demonstrate how humans have always constructed animals but also have been constructed by animals the examples are drawn from manuscripts fables textual and visual accounts as well as material culture this publication raises interesting aspects about the profound and ambiguous relationship between animals and humans edges and boundaries hybridity and anthropomorphism ideas and identities

this book is intended for researchers in the field of narrative from post graduate level onwards it analyzes the audio recordings of the narratives of former slaves from the american south which are now publically available on the library of congress website voices from the days of slavery more specifically this book analyses the identity work of these former slaves and considers how these identities are related to master narratives the novelty of this book is that through using such a temporally diverse and relatively large corpus we show how master narratives change according to both the zeitgeist of the here and now of the interview world and the historical period that is related in the there and then of the story world moreover focusing on the active achievement of master narratives as socially situated co constructed discursive accomplishments we analyze how different inherently unstable and even contradictory versions of master narratives are enacted

animals regularly populate philosophical texts as a foil to illustrate what it means to be human how should we understand

this human animal divide not only does it inform us of who we are it also tells us how we should relate to the larger non human world the speaking animal interrogates the human animal divide by looking at our linguistic differences how the speaking human subject is constructed through its opposition to the dumb animal alison suen begins with an analysis of the role of language in animal ethics with an eye toward the voice voiceless opposition that is at work in animal advocacy after offering a critical analysis of the ethical and political significance of speaking for animals the book takes on a more constructive turn going against the usual interpretation of language as a capacity that allows us to reason instead it argues that our language capacity is also a relational capacity language is that which enables us to develop kinship with others including animal others

examining the place of nature in victorian women s poetry fabienne moine explores the work of canonical and long neglected women poets to show the myriad connections between women and nature during the period at the same time she challenges essentialist discourses that assume innate affinities between women and the natural world rather moine shows victorian women poets mobilised these alliances to defend common interests and express their engagement with social issues while well known poets such as elizabeth barrett browning and christina rossetti are well represented in moine s study she pays particular attention to lesser known writers such as mary howitt or eliza cook who were popular during their lifetimes or edith nesbit whose verse has received scant critical attention so far she also brings to the fore the poetry of many non professional poets looking to their immediate cultural environments for inspiration these women reconstructed the natural world in poems that raise questions about the validity and the scope of representations of nature ultimately questioning or undermining social practices that mould and often fossilise cultural identities

what are we what is the nature of the human person animalism has a straightforward answer to these long standing philosophical questions we are animals after being ignored for a long time in philosophical discussions of our nature this idea has recently gained considerable support in metaphysics and philosophy of mind it has also amongst philosophers occasioned strong opposition even though it might be said to be the view assumed by much of the scientific community essays on animalism is the first volume to be devoted to this important topic and promises to set the agenda for the next stage in the debate containing mainly new papers as well as two highly important articles that were recently published elsewhere this volume s contributors include both emerging voices in the debate and many of those who have been instrumental in shaping it some of their contributions defend animalism others criticize it still others explore its more general implications the book also contains a substantial introduction by the editors explaining what animalism is identifying leading issues that merit attention and highlighting many of the issues that the contributors have raised
