in one volume there are seven slave narratives compelling harrowing at times and beautiful stories of hope in the midst of deep adversity 1 narrative of the life of frederick douglass an american slave frederick douglass s eloquently written first autobiography was one of the most persuasive forces for emancipation as well as for the enlistment of black soldiers in the union army it is written beautifully and the story flies past a dazzling and awful account of slavery 2 my bondage and my freedom this is frederick douglass s second autobiography written ten years after his emancipation and is unparalleled in its scope of the destructive effects of slavery on both individuals and communities the power of this book is that it delves into the minds of rational good people who were slave owners and discusses the economic conditions that sanctioned slavery s continued existence 3 twelve years a slave this narrative was written by solomon northrup a freeman kidnapped from the north and taken to a work on a plantation in louisiana where he lived for 12 years until he was rescued violence sadness grief and the treatment of human beings as lower than animals are the themes that run through this famous autobiography 4 the interesting narrative of the life of olaudah equiano or gustavus vassa the african olaudah equiano s interesting story provides an insight into a time and situation that few people survived to record or recall and those that did survive were rarely literate for this reason and so many others equiano or gustavus vassa as he was later christened has a unique story to tell it is an honest and chilling account of a man born free in africa and sold into slavery who spends most of life on the high seas until he finally acquires freedom he relates the experiences of black people in its myriad forms on three continents 5 incidents in the life of a slave girl seven years concealed in the pre civil war period of 1861 harriet jacobs was the only black woman in the united states to have authored her own slave narrative in a call to arouse the women of the north to a realizing sense of the condition of two millions of women at the south to convince the people of the free states what slavery really is jacobs hoped that should the white women of the north know the true conditions of the slave women of the south they would not fail to answer the call to moral action with the help of a northern abolitionist jacobs published this astounding poignant record under the pseudonym linda brent 6 up from slavery an autobiography booker t washington writes his story modestly but his greatness shines through he spent his early childhood as a slave on a plantation in the south but after the emancipation proclamation was read from the porch steps of the big house his ambitions to gain an education and make something of himself propelled him through every obstacle to his goal booker t washington was a tireless promoter of education for his race and founded a school for blacks in alabama he made great strides in elevating the sights and prospects of his people 7 running a thousand miles for freedom this is a great story of a married couple who were slaves and escaped to freedom in a unique way it is a horrifying account of the evil of slavery and the hope of freedom and human rights a compelling read

frederick douglass was born in slavery as frederick augustus washington bailey near easton in talbot county maryland he was not sure of the exact year of his birth but he knew that it was 1817 or 1818 as a young boy he was sent to baltimore to be a house

servant where he learned to read and write with the assistance of his master's wife in 1838 he escaped from slavery and went to new york city where he married anna murray a free colored woman whom he had met in baltimore soon thereafter he changed his name to frederick douglass in 1841 he addressed a convention of the massachusetts anti slavery society in nantucket and so greatly impressed the group that they immediately employed him as an agent he was such an impressive orator that numerous persons doubted if he had ever been a slave so he wrote narrative of the life of frederick douglass during the civil war he assisted in the recruiting of colored men for the 54th and 55th massachusetts regiments and consistently argued for the emancipation of slaves after the war he was active in securing and protecting the rights of the freemen in his later years at different times he was secretary of the santo domingo commission marshal and recorder of deeds of the district of columbia and united states minister to haiti his other autobiographical works are my bondage and my freedom and life and times of frederick douglass published in 1855 and 1881 respectively he died in 1895 table of contents preface letter from wendell phillips frederick douglass chapter 1 chapter 2 chapter 3 chapter 4 chapter 5 chapter 6 chapter 7 chapter 8 chapter 9 chapter 10 chapter 11 appendix a parody

bachelor thesis from the year 2019 in the subject english language and literature studies literature grade 1 8 technical university of braunschweig institut für anglistik und amerikanistik language english abstract the slave narrative played a crucial role in the period of the abolitionist movement and thus became an important genre of american literature the majority of slave narratives were written by men and therefore the experiences of most slaves were told from a male perspective one of the most popular female slave narratives however is incidents in the life of a slave girl written by harriet ann jacobs she was the first fugitive female slave who published a full length narrative under the pseudonym linda brent in 1861 as the opening quote shows harriet jacobs work deals with the unique experiences of female slaves she addresses sensitive topics such as physical abuse and sexual violence in order to emphasize that women experienced slavery differently than for example black men or white women female slaves were not only faced with racism but also sexism classism and many other forms of oppression against this background this thesis suggests that linda brent s experiences during slavery are a prime example for intersectionality it is designed in order to critically analyze the experiences and oppression of female slaves on the basis of the narrative incidents in the life of a slave girl

bachelor thesis from the year 2006 in the subject american studies literature grade 1 15 university of bayreuth language english abstract in this thesis i will first briefly outline general aspects of the autobiographical genre with emphasis on the tradition of life narratives written by african americans as this thesis focuses on two autobiographies written by women i will also go into major characteristic aspects that distinguish their personal accounts from men s before introducing the autobiographies of assata shakur and elaine brown within the larger context chapter three will be dedicated to a closer look on their works i will focus on shakur s and brown s representations of themselves as black women and their becoming revolutionaries within the dynamics of gender and power i will illustrate important aspects of their identity formation during childhood and adolescence e g family backgrounds school education ghetto life and their relationship to male age mates as well as their slow process of identity change due to growing critical awareness and introduction to the black power movement i will also focus on whether and if yes how their current identity is again challenged within the black power movement and especially within and outside of the black panther party lastly i will shortly concentrate on the autobiographies respective closures and how the two women see themselves directly after leaving organized struggle behind brown or from exile several years later shakur by writing their autobiographies brown and shakur take advantage of the opportunity to tell their version of the story how the two women create their identity and depict themselves retrospectively as being quite different from their public image will be the central focus of this paper
