Structural Analysis

building structures to house the logistical and manufacturing processes of industry is one of the largest and most widespread architectural assignments the complex functional requirements are often fulfilled by typified or modular solutions the organization of industrial processes together with the wide range of designs and building methods are clearly and practically treated in this design atlas a systematic section presents the typology the technical and logistical elements of industrial building in the subsequent section some 70 designs are described and analysed special emphasis is placed on those functions and procedures that inform the design such as production montage storage and distribution jürgen adam is director of the institute for design and construction at the university of stuttgart as an architect and teacher he has followed closely developments in international industrial building as have the contributing authors among others gunther henn klaus daniels and fritz haller

as a new generation of educational environments are designed and built this design manual helps architects to grasp the underlying educational theories and how they can be realized in built form so that the building fulfills its role as a 3 dimensional curriculum plan it presents over 80 international case studies

what constitutes a high rise building a high rise is in fact any building with more than 9 storeys and not just those striking skyscrapers which shape modern city skylines in the past architects who designed such structures used to be the exception but in the last 10 years more and more architectural offices have begun to focus on this type of building however the sheer complexity of designing and planning the construction of a high rise as opposed to other building types requires a wealth of specialized experience and expertise the high rise manual is the first comprehensive reference work on this subject all relevant aspects of such an undertaking are examined in detail by some 24 specialist authors each step is extensively documented including the initial project planning the building organisation the laying of the

everyone involved in a building project wants to achieve a better building but design quality means different things to clients users architects cost consultants and contractors negotiating design priorities is an important part of the development process the design quality manual helps give an objective evaluation of the qualitative aspects of design matrices with five defined levels of quality have been developed that cover the key areas of architecture environmental engineering user comfort conditions whole life costs detail design and user satisfaction these can be scored by a visual survey and professional judgement and then augmented by scientific measurement where possible e g temperature lighting and sound levels the resultant scores allow comparisons in terms of overall and specific aspects of building performance and design quality the manual covers schools hospitals and housing and offers a set of criteria by which to judge a broad range of design values it focuses the design team on the needs of the end user and on the overall building performance
