dealing with the importance of third world cultures but also with changes in russia japan the usa and the uk this book considers the relationship between culture and development within a truly global context

this second volume the cultural economy analyzes the dynamic relationship in which culture is part of the process of economic change that in turn changes the conditions of culture it brings together perspectives from different disciplines to examine such critical issues as the production of cultural goods and services and the patterns of economic globalization the relationship between the commodification of the cultural economy and the aesthetic realm current and emerging organizational forms for the investment production distribution and consumption of cultural goods and services the complex relations between creators producers distributors and consumers of culture the policy implications of a globalizing cultural economy

understanding global cultures third edition presents the cultural metaphor as a method for understanding the cultural mindsets of a nation a cluster of nations and even of a continent this method involves identifying some phenomenon activity or institution of a culture that all or most of its members consider important and with which they identify closely metaphors are not stereotypes rather they rely upon the features of one critical phenomenon of a culture to describe the entire culture the characteristics of the metaphor then become the basis for describing and understanding the essential features of the culture for example the italians invented the opera and love it passionately five key characteristics of the opera are the overture spectacle and pageantry voice externalization and the interaction between the lead singers and the chorus these features are used to describe italy and its cultural mindset thus the metaphor is a guide or map that helps such outsiders as students travelers and managers on short term and long term assignments understand quickly what members of a culture consider important

in the fully updated sixth edition of understanding global cultures metaphorical journeys through 34 nations clusters of nations continents and diversity authors martin j gannon and rajnandini pillai present the cultural metaphor as a method for understanding the cultural mindsets of individual nations clusters of nations continents and diversity in each nation a cultural metaphor is any activity phenomenon or institution that members of a given culture consider important and with which they identify emotionally and or cognitively such as the japanese garden and american football this cultural metaphoric approach identifies three to eight unique or distinctive features of each cultural metaphor and then discusses 34 national cultures in terms of these features the book demonstrates how metaphors are guidelines to help outsiders quickly understand what members of a culture consider important

contributors to the volume focus on such important issues as media imperialism national identity cultural policy globalization of urban cultures cultural production in a global context free trade negotiations and agreements the economic impact of cultural tourism the impact of globalization on children s television and the impact of japanese culture in asia

paul hopper leads the reader through the varied issues associated with globalization and culture including deterritorialization cosmopolitanism cultural hybridization and homogenization as well as claims that aspects of globalization are provoking cultural resistance

this book attempts to reconcile the concept of free trade with a key non trade social value cultural diversity in an era of economic globalisation it first shows how we can look at culture in many different ways and explains why we should care about cultural diversity the book then examines the challenges that policymakers are faced with in formulating cultural measures in the new media environment and analyses unesco s theories and approaches to cultural diversity this is followed by a comprehensive examination of the treatment of culture in global and regional trade agreements including the framework of the gatt wto system the wto s judicial practice involving cultural products and the treatment of culture under the ec eu and nafta this identifies the challenges trade norms encounter in dealing with cultural products the author seeks to formulate a balanced view of the challenge of protecting and promoting cultural diversity while also recognising the important goal of trade liberalisation to this end professor shi proposes a dual method through which the norms found in wto agreements and in unesco cultural instruments may be brought into alignment the first highlighting the compatibility of cultural policy measures with trade obligations on a domestic level the second suggesting potential linkages between the wto rules and the unesco convention from the perspectives of treaty interpretation
