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the norton critical edition of pride and prejudice has been revised to reflect the most current scholarly approaches to austen s most widely read novel the text is that of the 1813 first edition accompanied by revised and expanded explanatory annotations this norton critical edition also includes biographical portraits of austen by members of her family and new to the fourth edition those by jon spence becoming jane austen and paula byrne the real jane austen a life in small things fourteen critical essays eleven of them new to the fourth edition reflecting the finest current scholarship contributors include janet todd andrew elfenbein felicia bonaparte and tiffany potter among others writers on austen a new section of brief comments by mark twain virginia woolf henry james and others a chronology and revised and expanded selected bibliography

this collection of essays covering many aspects of austen s life works and historical context provides the fullest introduction in one volume to the life and times of jane austen jane austen in context is a generously illustrated

collection of short lively contributions arranged alphabetically and covering topics from biography to portraits and agriculture to transport an essay on the reception of austen s work is also included showing how criticism of austen has responded to literary movements and fashions the volume emphasises the subtle interactions between austen s life and times and her novels this is a work of reference that readers and scholars of austen will turn to again and again

the news that a wealthy young gentleman named charles bingley has rented the manor of netherfield park causes a great stir in the nearby village of longbourn especially in the bennet household the bennets have five unmarried daughters from oldest to youngest jane elizabeth mary kitty and lydia and mrs bennet is desperate to see them all married after mr bennet pays a social visit to mr bingley the bennets attend a ball at which mr bingley is present he is taken with jane and spends much of the evening dancing with her his close friend mr darcy is less pleased with the evening and haughtily refuses to dance with elizabeth which makes everyone view him as arrogant and obnoxious at social functions over subsequent weeks however mr darcy finds himself increasingly attracted to elizabeth s charm and intelligence jane s friendship with mr bingley also continues to burgeon and jane pays a visit to the bingley mansion on her journey to the house she is caught in a downpour and catches ill forcing her to stay at netherfield for several days in order to tend to jane elizabeth hikes through muddy fields and arrives with a spattered dress much to the disdain of the snobbish miss bingley charles bingley s sister miss bingley s spite only increases when she notices that darcy whom she is pursuing pays quite a bit of attention to elizabeth when elizabeth and jane return home they find mr collins visiting their household mr collins is a young clergyman who stands to inherit mr bennet s property which has been entailed meaning that it can only be passed down to male heirs mr collins is a pompous fool though he is quite enthralled by the bennet girls shortly after his arrival he makes a proposal of marriage to elizabeth she turns him down wounding his pride meanwhile the bennet girls have become friendly with

militia officers stationed in a nearby town among them is wickham a handsome young soldier who is friendly toward elizabeth and tells her how darcy cruelly cheated him out of an inheritance

in the critical tradition jane austen has long been considered a conservative writer whose novels emphasize the importance of manners and propriety this study however continues a more recent trend in austen scholarship one that focuses on her feminism it breaks new ground by identifying as one ingredient in her fiction an iconoclastic laughter that is closer to popular gaiety than to the elitist ironic stance of many of her predecessors furthermore it underlines the presence of conflict in her narrative and points to the disruptive speech reported in austen s elegant hyper correct sentences working with three of austen s novels northanger abbey pride and prejudice and emma the study analyzes the elements of feminist carnival in her prose

a story of lively and rebellious elizabeth bennett one of five unmarried daughters living in the countryside of 19th century england in a world where obtaining an advantageous marriage is a woman s sole occupation elizabeth s independent manner threatens her families future will her romantic sparing with the mysterious sophisticated and arrogant e arcy end in misfortune or will love

s true nature prevail jane austen s superb romantic classic comedy follows a cast of society s elite through the games of love and negotiations of marriage in the countryside of 19th century england it is a lighthearted commentary on the aristocratic and near aristocratic english country life by the use of gentle irony it shows us our own vanities and prejudices and encourages us to see in every person an individual to be judged strictly on his or her own merits

the only excellence of falsehood is its resemblance to truth proclaims a clergyman in charlotte lennox s the female quixote he argues that romances are bad art novels he implies are better this clergyman s remarks repeating what literary and moral authorities had been saying since the late seventeenth century are central to deborah ross s discussion of romance characteristics in english women s novels aphra behn delariviere manley eliza haywood charlotte lennox fanny burney ann radcliffe and jane austen did not take the clergyman s advice to heart to them the falsehood of romance was by no means self evident nor was the superior excellence of the novel in theory many of them accepted the distinction but their works combined aspects of the romance and the novel in ways that brought them into conflict with the critical establishment the texts discussed here illustrate a process of development both in the novel and in the conditions of women s lives tensions between romance and realism enabled women writers to question official versions of reality and to measure life against a romance ideal by altering readers perceptions and judgments these authors gradually altered the reality that novels resemble and set up new combinations of romance and realism for future writers this give and take between fiction and life is seen most dramatically in the way a romantic notion gradually comes to be treated in novels as both real and right ross follows one such notion that women have matrimonial preferences to the point where romance and reality merge ross s study brings to light an important part of the history of the novel not yet incorporated in theories and histories of the genre

dream revisionaries examines the literary social and historical catalysts for this sudden efflorescence of women s utopian writing it delineates the historical

contours of mainstream utopian fiction examines the place of women in canonical texts and demonstrates how the utopian responses of women in the 17th 18th and early 19th centuries paved the way for the late 19th century texts discussed in this study lewes observes how women s utopian fiction facilitated the creation of political and social manifestos that responded to the late 19th century historical environment and how nationality sometimes complicated and even overrode the authors apparent commonalities this volume demonstrates how the genre was used to reconcile historically opposed feminist ideologies and compares texts of the 1870s and 1970s showing that the supposedly new type of women s utopian writing in many ways resembled that of a century earlier

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
