literary and filmic depictions of the disabled reinforce an ableist ideology that classifies bodies as normal or abnormal positive or negative disabled characters are often represented as aberrant or evil and are isolated or incarcerated this book examines language in film fiction and other media that perpetuates the representation of the disabled as abnormal or problematic the author looks at depictions of disability both disparaging and amusing and discusses disability theory as a framework for reconsidering normal and abnormal bodies

this book negotiates the notion of a classic in film and fiction exploring the growing interface and the blurring of boundaries between literature and film taking the problematic term classic as its focus the contributors consider both canonical literary and film texts questioning whether classic status in one domain transfers it

to another classics in film and fiction looks at a wide range of texts and their adaptations authors discussed are shakespeare charlotte bronte henry james franz kafka thomas mann virginia woolf nathaniel hawthorne arthur miller truman capote and lewis carroll book to film adaptations analysed include jane eyre the crucible the tempest and alice in wonderland the collection also evaluates the term classic in a wider context including a comparison of joyce s ulysses with hitchcock s rear window throughout the contributors challenge the dichotomy between high culture and pop culture

malcolm le grice an important experimental filmmaker from england film journalist for studio international and teacher gives us a lucid account both historical and theoretical of the main preoccupations of abstract filmmakers le grice begins with a painter cezanne to show how his preoccupation with pictorial space is a key to any understanding of the notion of abstraction he goes on to discuss the futurists cinema the early abstract film experiments by eggeling duchamp and others in germany and france of the 20s the west coast filmmakers of the 40s and a stimulating view of the experimental film movement after ww ii including the

works of brakhage snow gidal and sharits art direction whether or not one agrees with le grice s valuation of an alternate cinema abstract film and beyond clearly demonstrates that the cinema that great twentieth century art is no mere entertainment but an event of tremendous importance and implication the journal of aesthetics and art criticism

although films rarely act as mirror reflections of everyday reality they are nevertheless powerful cultural expressions of the dreams and desires of the american public this work provides a complete post world war ii survey of american cinema and its often complex and contradictory values

the past two decades have witnessed major changes in film industries worldwide in response to both economic globalisation and technological developments the dominant position of hollywood movies in the global film market has remained largely uncontested but hollywood itself has become increasingly international in its operations whilst regional screen industries such as those in east asia and in the indian subcontinent have re emerged and developed new forms of collaboration the advent of digital technologies has also transformed the content of films and the ways in which they are made and consumed such changes in turn have posed new economic and cultural challenges for policy makers around the world and led to a degree of rethinking of how film policy objectives are to be conceived defined and implemented this collection brings together a range of international scholars from the usa europe and asia to consider how film policy has responded to the various economic technological and political shifts shaping the global film industry and to identify the many tensions between global and local economic and cultural and public and private policy objectives that have been the result of these changes this book was originally published as a special issue of the international journal of cultural policy
