exploring international opportunities and challenges this incisive modern guide provides an authoritative overview of refugee education expert authors reconsider dominant paradigms through a postcolonial lens confronting national policy failures and highlighting avenues for innovation

this volume will provide educators at all levels with a research and evidence based understanding of the educational opportunities and challenges facing refugees the chapters focus on strategies and policies for providing education to the world s refugee populations

this book focuses on global education and policy reforms for refugee and displaced children which has ascended in importance due to increased conflict migration worldwide the synthesis of research evidence suggests that there is great need to understand how host nations non governmental organizations and international development agencies grapple with the challenges and opportunities posed by large refugee or displaced populations especially in terms of educational provision for children and youth the book discusses the strategic directions and shifts in educational policy and practice to address global displacement it discusses issues such as schooling and citizen identity formation gender societal integration inclusion and exclusion educational provision and student marginalization or alienation amid conflict migration and displacement the book also examines challenges posed by centralization decentralization diversity uniformity and curriculum standardization issues it also explores new approaches to further develop and improve educational policy and practice for refugee and displaced populations in non western countries

this volume explores the shared expectations that education is a panacea for the difficulties that refugees and their receiving countries face this book investigates the ways in which education is both a dream solution as well as a contested landscape for refugee families and students using comparative cross national perspectives across five continents the editors and contributors critically analyze the educational structures policies and practices intended to support refugee youth transition from conflict and post conflict zones to mainstream classrooms and schools in their new communities

education is a pivotal influence on all members of society however in the case of immigrants and refugees integrating into a new country allowing proper learning opportunities can offer specific challenges that must be overcome educational development and infrastructure for immigrants and refugees is an innovative source of scholarly research on the role of education for refugees and immigrants and it examines methods to develop effective learning processes for these students highlighting a range of perspectives on topics such as lifelong learning legal considerations and multiculturalism this book is ideally designed for teachers policy makers researchers academics and professionals actively involved in the education sector

higher education has been a source of opportunity and achievement for migrants and refugees around the world it has provided them with the tools and knowledge to pursue careers and build lives in their new communities but it has also made them targets for discrimination colleges and universities are often ill equipped to address the unique educational needs of their diverse student populations and many times the very institution that was meant to be a safe haven for them becomes their greatest barrier to success today we are witnessing a crisis of higher education for migrants and refugees global perspectives on the difficulties and opportunities faced by migrant and refugee students in higher education focuses on the formal and informal educational opportunities that are available to migrant students as well as the barriers that prevent them from fully accessing these opportunities the book also discusses how the experiences of migrant and refugee students in higher education have evolved and the impact that this evolution has had on their educational experiences finally the book considers the ways in which higher education institutions have responded to the educational needs of migrant and refugee students and the role that the education industry has played in this response both formally and informally covering key topics such as immigration educational needs and displaced students this premier reference source is ideal for administrators policymakers scholars researchers academicians practitioners instructors and students

access to education is a fundamental human right under the convention on the rights of the child and represents a key tool to protect refugee children from recruitment into forced labour military

activity prostitution and crime the papers presented in this book were commissioned by the unhcr and presented at a workshop on refugee education held in march 2001 in the united states issues discussed include educational response in emergency situations quality of refugee school programmes youth education for peace and conflict resolution and a case study of vocational training programmes in tanzania

refugees and displaced people rarely figure as historical actors and almost never as historical narrators we often assume a person residing in a refugee camp lacking funding training social networks and other material resources that enable the research and writing of academic history cannot be a historian because a historian cannot be a person residing in a refugee camp the right to research disrupts this tautology by featuring nine works by refugee and host community researchers from across africa europe and the middle east identifying the intrinsic challenges of making space for diverse voices within a research framework and infrastructure that is inherently unequal this edited volume offers a critical reflection on what history means who narrates it and what happens when those long excluded from authorship bring their knowledge and perspectives to bear chapters address topics such as education in kakuma refugee camp the political power of hip hop in rwanda women migrants to yemen and the development of photojournalism in kurdistan exploring what it means to become a researcher the right to research understands historical scholarship as an ongoing conversation one in which we all have a right to participate

people in danger have received protection in communities beyond their own from the earliest times of recorded history the causes war conflict violence persecution natural disasters and climate change are as familiar to readers of the news as to students of the past it is 70 years since nations in the wake of world war ii drew up the landmark 1951 convention relating to the status of refugees people forced to flee marks this milestone it is the latest in a long line of publications stretching back to 1993 that were previously entitled the state of the world s refugees the book traces the historic path that led to the 1951 convention showing how history was made by taking the centuries old ideals of safety and solutions for refugees to global practice it maps its progress during which international protection has reached a much broader group of people than initially envisaged it examines international responses to forced displacement within borders as well as beyond them and the protection principles that apply to both it reviews where they have been used with consistency and success and where they have not at times the strength and resolve of the international community seems strong yet solutions and meaningful solidarity are often elusive taking stock today at this important anniversary is all the more crucial as the world faces increasing forced displacement most is experienced in low and middle income countries and persists for generations people forced to flee face barriers to improving their lives contributing to the communities in which they live and realizing solutions everywhere an effective response depends on the commitment to international cooperation set down in the 1951 convention a vision often compromised by efforts to minimize responsibilities there is growing recognition that doing better is a global imperative humanitarian and development action has the potential to be transformational especially when grounded in the local context people forced to flee examines how and where increased development investments in education health and economic inclusion are helping to improve socioeconomic opportunities both for forcibly displaced persons and their hosts in 2018 the international community reached a global compact on refugees for more equitable and sustainable responses it is receiving deeper support people forced to flee looks at whether that is enough for what could and should help define the next 70 years

this book addresses issues of access that covid 19 brought forth in higher education with a primary focus on asian countries in looking to address sdg4 to promote inclusive and equitable quality education for all the volume explores the challenges relating to educational exclusion by considering

how specially abled students have been impacted by the digital divide in the context of the pandemic it puts a spotlight on the approaches experiences and case analyses from various geographies in the region to study transitions in inclusivity universities and institutes of higher education have had to reconsider their digital offerings and services all the more since the onset of the pandemic but have in many instances failed to fully account for how internet access can be limited unavailable or unaffordable for many students as a result specially abled learners students without sufficient technological resources such as those living in remote areas where there are little or no internet facilities have been however unintentionally neglected while universities implemented their own practices processes and policies to reach and teach disadvantaged learners they had to further adapt these strategies re aligning them to meet the unprecedented circumstances and concomitant needs of specially abled learners and there is still much more to do this book consolidates regional perspectives on how to work towards goals of inclusivity and bridge the digital divide looking into and beyond the conditions of the pandemic relevant to scholars and policymakers this book is of interest to those focused on digitisation and the transition to the new normal in higher education

the second edition contains new sections focused on issues of race and racialisation treatment of people seeking asylum in both national contexts and international efforts to respond to issues with refugee access to higher education including international educational complementary pathways and national sanctuary movements

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
