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a vital guide to poetry from ancient times to the present a fizzing exhilarating book sebastian faulks sunday times london delightful new york times book review poetry is language made special so that it will be remembered and valued it does not always work over the centuries countless thousands of poems have been forgotten this little history is about some that have not john carey tells the stories behind the world s greatest poems from the oldest surviving one written nearly 4 000 years ago to those being written today carey looks at poets whose works shape our view of the world such as shakespeare whitman and yeats and more recent poets like sylvia plath seamus heaney and marianne moore who have started to question what makes a poem great in the first place little histories inspiring guides for curious minds

the concurrent tenures of gillian clarke as national poet of wales carol ann duffy as uk poet laureate liz lochhead as scots makar and paula meehan as ireland professor of poetry defied historic rifts between women poetry and nation this book explores the extraordinary changes these women fought to achieve as each made her way from marginalised poetess of the 1970s to laureate at the heart of cultural establishment in the 21st century it looks at how they revitalised these public offices and explores their interventions in contemporary geopolitics and national self understanding it considers how they shaped their roles by engaging with poetic icons of the past by linking poetry and education and by joining poetry with politics

poetry and voice with a foreword by helen dunmore is a book of essays which fuses critical and creative treatments of poetic voice some contributors focus on critical explorations of voice in work by poets such as john ashbery simon armitage eavan boland carol ann duffy arun kolatkar don mckay and dragica rajčić and on the musical voices of the lyric tradition and of poetry itself vicki feaver jane griffiths philip gross waqas khwaja lesley saunders and david swann reflect on their own poetic processes of composition and the development of the voices of childhood old age migration landscape bilinguality and imprisonment laurel cohen pfister and tatjana bijelić examine the nature of poetic voice in exile the need for fresh voices after

war and new spaces in which poetic voices can be heard in this international collection the contributors give rare and generous insights into inner poetic processes and external effects they engage with artistic debates about developing losing and appropriating voice in poetry and approach the question of what is finding a voice in poetry from multiple angles the book will interest literary critics poets lecturers and undergraduate and postgraduate students of literature poetry and creative writing

close listening brings together seventeen strikingly original essays especially written for this volume on the poetry reading the sound of poetry and the visual performance of poetry while the performance of poetry is as old as poetry itself critical attention to modern and postmodern poetry performance has been surprisingly slight this volume featuring work by critics and poets such as marjorie perloff susan stewart johanna drucker dennis tedlock and susan howe is the first comprehensive introduction to the ways in which twentieth century poetry has been practiced as a performance art from the performance styles of individual poets and types of poetry to the relation of sound to meaning from historical and social approaches to poetry readings to new imaginations of prosody the entries gathered here investigate a compelling range of topics for anyone interested in poetry taken together these essays encourage new forms of close listenings not only to the printed text of poems but also to tapes performances and other expressions of the sounded and visualized word the time is right for such a volume with readings spoken word events and the gaining an increasing audience for poetry close listening opens a number of new avenues for the critical discussion of the sound and performance of poetry

a poem can explain the inexplicable and express the unexpressed this is how reading poetry enhances understanding and writing poetry helps students say things that they could not say in any other way and it s why david hanauer believes that poetry deserves to play a central role in classroom literacy programs in poetry and the meaning of life david explains how teachers can use poems to help students understand and express important thoughts feelings and experiences he does this by discussing theories of reading and writing and relating these to vignettes that demonstrate how real teachers in real classrooms have used poetry to put these theories into practice with emergent and beginning readers with mature readers and with

english language learners the book concludes with a clarion call to teachers to use the transformative power of poetry to encourage their students to search out the meaning in their own lives

jean baptiste du bos critical reflections on poetry and painting first published in french in 1719 is one of the seminal works of modern aesthetics du bos rejected the seventeenth century view that works of art are assessed by reason instead he believed audience members have sentiments in response to artworks their sentiments are fainter versions of those they would feel in response to actually seeing what the work of art imitates du bos was influenced by john locke s empiricism and in turn had a major impact on virtually every major eighteenth century contributor to philosophy of art including voltaire montesquieu diderot rousseau herder lessing mendelssohn kames gerard and hume this is the first modern annotated and scholarly edition of the critical reflections in any language

one of the virtues of good poetry is the fact that it irritates the mediocre theodore roethke was one of the most famous and outspoken poets and poetry teachers this country has ever known in this volume of selected prose roethke articulates his commitments to imaginative possibilities offers tender advice to young writers and zings darts at stuffed shirts lightweights and fools art is our defense against hysteria and death with the assistance of roethke s widow this volume has been edited to include the finest selections from out of print collections of prose and journal entries focused on the making and teaching of poetry on poetry and craft will be prized in the classroom and outrageous roethke quotes will once again pepper our conversations you must believe a poem is a holy thing a good poem that is theodore roethke was of an illustrious generation of poets which included sexton plath lowell berryman and like them he received nearly every major award in poetry including the pulitzer prize and twice the national book award in spite of his fame he remained a legendary teacher known for the care and attention he gave to his students poets such as james wright carolyn kizer tess gallagher and richard hugo roethke died on august 1 1963 while swimming in a friend s pool but before i m reduced to an absolute pulp by my own ambivalence i must say goodbye the old lion perisheth nymphs i wish you the swoops of many fish may your search for the abiding be

forever furious on poetry and craft i am overwhelmed by the beautiful disorder of poetry the eternal virginity of words the poem even a short time after being written seems no miracle unwritten it seems something beyond the capacity of the gods we can t escape what we are and i m afraid many of my notions about verse i haven t too many have been conditioned by the fact that for nearly 25 years i ve been trying to teach the young something about the nature of verse by writing it and that with very little formal knowledge of the subject or previous instruction so it s going to be lik

this book draws attention to the pervasive artistic rivalry between elizabethan poetry and gardens in order to illustrate the benefits of a trans media approach to the literary culture of the period in its blending of textual studies with discussions of specific historical patches of earth the poem and the garden demonstrates how the fashions that drove poetic invention were as likely to be influenced by a popular print convention or a particular garden experience as they were by the formal genres of the classical poets by moving beyond a strictly verbal approach in its analysis of creative imitation this volume offers new ways of appreciating the kinds of comparative and competitive methods that shaped early modern poetics noting shared patterns both conceptual and material in these two areas not only helps explain the persistence of botanical metaphors in sixteenth century books of poetry but also offers a new perspective on the types of contrastive illusions that distinguish the elizabethan aesthetic with its interdisciplinary approach the poem and the garden is of interest to all students and scholars who study early modern poetics book history and garden studies

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in this book robert pinsky writes about contemporary poetry as it reflects its modernist and romantic past he isolates certain persistent ideas about poetry s situation relative to life and focuses on the conflict the poet faces between the nature of words and poetic forms on one side and the nature of experience on the other the author ranges for his often surprising examples from keats to the great modernists such as stevens and williams to the contents of recent magazines he considers work by ammons ashbery bogan ginsberg lowell merwin o hara and younger writers offering judgments and enthusiasms from a viewpoint that is consistent but unstereotyped like his poetry robert pinsky s criticism joins the traditional and the innovative in ways that are thoughtful and unmistakably his own his book is a bold essay on the contemporary situation in poetry on the dazzling achievements of modernism and on the nature or situation of poetry itself
