authors jacques thiroux and keith krasemann devote eight chapters to key ethical theories including both western and non western ethical theories and moral perspectives the subsequent eight chapters are dedicated to applied ethics focusing on topics such as euthanasia abortion bioethics and business ethics eight closing appendices on thiroux s theory of humanitarian ethics and the application of this theory to moral problems further encourage students to focus on applying ethical theory in real world scenarios note this isbn is for a pearson books a la carte edition a convenient three hole punched loose leaf text in addition to the flexibility offered by this format books a la carte editions offer students great value as they cost significantly less than a bound textbook ethics theory and practice eleventh edition is also available via revel tm an interactive learning environment that enables students to read practice and study in one continuous experience

aptness of moral claims and so forth the second part addresses normative theory which deals with general moral issues including the plausibility of various ethical theories and abstract principles of behavior examples of such theories are consequentialism and virtue theory as with other oxford handbooks the twenty five contributors cover the field in a comprehensive and highly accessible way while achieving three goals exposition of central ideas criticism of other approaches and putting forth a distinct viewpoint

when method in ethical theory was initially published in 1963 it called for greater awareness of how an agenda for moral philosophy is established and the conditons under which it changes edel strives for effective comparison of ethical theories denying that any one theory has exclusive claim to the truth about ethics he maintains that different theories are appropriate for particular conditions in method in ethical theory he works out an approach for ethical theory that is both critical and comprehensive edel presents four approaches to his study the analytical deals with terms and concepts the descriptive seeks to accurately depict classify and interpret moral qualities and situations the causal explanatory raises questions about functional relations and the evaluative critically observes and applies standards alongside of these perspectives edel sets up a comparative approach one that grounds the study of ethics hi empirical and historical research in his new introduction edel describes the historical context in which his book was written and explains his reasons for writing it thirty years ago method in ethical theory continues to be a fundamental contribution to ethical studies it will be of interest to philosophers sociologists and specialists in the study of ethics

john dewey was unique among american philosophers in his insistence that the events the social structure the beliefs and attitudes of a period its models of science and human history all have some constitutive role in its philosophical theory this belief is amply demonstrated in dewey s own writings dewey and james h tufts ethics was first published in 1908 with a revised edition appearing in 1932 dewey s part in the latter was wholly rewritten and in effect constituted a new work showing that dewey did not believe ethical beliefs were eternal and unchanging in ethical theory and social change abraham edel provides a comparative analysis of the two editions to show how dewey conceived ethics as part of an ongoing culture not intelligible if isolated the years between the two editions of dewey and tufts ethics were momentous in america and across the world in 1908 industrialism was in high gear putting greater pressure on social institutions and raising expectations of technological progress and extended democratic growth by 1932 the devastation of world war i economic depression and the rise of totalitarianisms of the left and right had shattered that earlier optimism the shift toward secular philosophy and new perspectives in research and method in the social sciences was challenging established universalizing views of morality with perceptions of fundamental moral conflict and the threat of relativism

in their resolution dewey is an ideal case for comparing changes in ethical theory over a quarter century unlike many philosophers he appreciated change and many of his basic ideas are geared to the problem of human control over change moreover he is concerned with the relation of theory and practice and much of his work in metaphysics and epistemology is devoted to discovering the role that doctrines in these fields play and how they reflect the movement of social life he is constantly concerned with ethics with the history of ethics and with the presuppositions of ethical theories that are studied in the social sciences and applied in the normative disciplines of politics education and law dewey s project of comparison in ethics reveals how theory is crystallized in the processes of the growth of knowledge in all fields and the human vicissitudes of history ethical theory and social change will be of interest to philosophers sociologists and intellectual historians

in presenting this reader on ethical theory shafer landau philosophy u of wisconsin has made sure to cover the standard topics of the day consequentialism deontology contractarianism and virtue ethics but has also sought to include areas that are less common in sections on moral standing moral responsibility moral knowledge and works that question the very possibility of systematic ethics he also includes a section that discusses ethics and religion and another that examines prima facie duties and particularism rather than include critics views following the various theoretical presentations he has instead decided to include more works of allied thinkers in order to provide readers with a more nuanced view of the particular view in question selections from classic writers such as aristotle thomas hobbes immanuel kant and plato are accompanied by more contemporary writings annotation 2007 book news inc portland or booknews com distributed by syndetic solutions llc
