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as a consequence of various rounds of eu enlargements the degree of cultural diversity in europe has intensified a phenomenon which is increasingly perceived as problematic by many eu citizens this fascinating book not only empirically explores the current state of the identity and the legitimacy of the eu as viewed by its citizens but also evaluates their attitudes towards it the expert contributors show that the development of a european identity and a common european culture is a prerequisite for european integration that european identity and a common political

culture will not develop rapidly but emerge slowly and that the beginnings of a european identity and a common european culture are currently emerging the roles of civil society organizations and political parties are examined within this context and an explanatory model with subjective predictors of the attitudes towards the eu is tested the empirical analysis is underpinned by a theoretical framework incorporating operational definitions and conceptual discussion of legitimacy and identity this intriguing and thought provoking book will be of great interest to academics researchers and students focusing on political science and international relations

this book examines the link between political identity and legitimacy in the european union stimulated by the crisis of legitimacy and identity suffered by the eu after the referenda on the constitutional treaty the editors have developed a theoretical framework to examine the interplay between these two items in the problematic development of the eu into a fully fledged political actor the contributors to the volume seek to redefine the key notions in the rigorous way of political philosophy thus avoiding the generic or imprecise language usage found in a large part of political science literature on identity test these concepts in the analysis of eu policies that may reveal the world views and the principles upon which eu legislation is based and whose degree of acceptance on the side of the citizens is an indicator of how far a shared political identity has developed featuring case studies on foreign and environmental policy biosafety policy biotechnology regulation civil society human rights promotion as well as studies on the role of memory space and external views on the process of european identity building this book will be of interest to students and researchers of political science political philosophy european politics and european studies

this original work explores the increasingly important phenomenon of the formation of transnational identity considering the ongoing relevance of the european union the contributors ask a series of intriguing questions is a european identity possible how are the various types of european identity formed and maintained how are these identities linked to the process of european integration examining the psychological institutional and political mechanisms that encourage or impede identification with transnational groups the book considers these theoretical questions in light of new evidence drawn from a rich body of primary research including field experiments in depth interviews with elites and public opinion surveys brought together for the first time social psychologists sociologists political scientists and ethnographers share their theoretical and methodological perspectives in tackling the common issues surrounding the emergence of european as a political identity paying special attention to the role of the institutions of the eu the authors investigate the impact of neo functionalist strategies and find that the processes of identity formation are far more complicated than can be explained by material and institutional factors alone the

authors engage in a fruitful dialogue about how much a european identity exists and how much it matters as they delve into the sources of disagreement and their implications

seminar paper from the year 2004 in the subject politics topic european union grade english 6 5 out of 10 maastricht university language english abstract europe is coming closer together this is shown in many parts of daily life it is often argued that money is one of the best known and most effective tools in symbolising the united europe the eu most of the member states of the european union who matched the criteria of the growth and stability pact seem to have agreed to this and joined the economic and monetary union emu as soon as it was introduced but why were there some who decided not to exchange their national currency in favour for the common european one did they not feel an affinity with other europeans did they not see that all europeans are part of a community which is trying to express its unity through a common currency or did they not view the euro ideologically but rationally and if they did what does this tell us about their european identity in short is it necessary to join the economic and monetary union to be a european this article tries to answer these questions by looking for reasons why denmark the united kingdom and sweden decided not to accept the euro in particular looking for similarities and their relation to the development of a single european identity

this book examines the interaction at national and international level of the economic political and social change processes within europe that are bringing about fundamental transformations in rural areas although such changes are experienced at a local level they are heavily imbued with a national tone given that european nations possess distinctive visions of their rural areas these rural identities set limits within which economic political and social agents can act yet these limits are constantly being subjected to strain particularly with the globalization of economic activity and the strengthening impetus for integrated ec policies

European identity examines how Europe is represented linguistically in the news media of four EU countries France Italy Poland and the UK through the use of an electronic corpus built from newspapers and television news transcripts this multilingual comparable corpus is composed of the entire contents of four newspapers published in each country collected over two periods of three months and the transcriptions of two TV news broadcasts collected over two periods of two months the theoretical and methodological frameworks adopted include discourse analysis corpus linguistics and corpus assisted discourse analysis the individual chapters investigate various aspects of European identity as it is discursively construed in the news media of the different countries such as Europe as a political and geographic entity European Union institutions European history citizenship and immigration based on a bottom up orientation and using both quantitative and qualitative methods all chapters but one use a comparative approach to the data juxtaposing the journalist representations of Europe in two or more languages the fundamental aim of the volume is to demonstrate how linguistic analysis and in particular the study of large amounts of linguistic data can make a vital contribution to the analysis of political and social issues

unification as a whole although this might spread peace freedom and welfare on the other hand if the eu or its citizens themselves would be able to create european imagined community by whatever means the split between both concepts would be overcome but how is the concept of identity then connected to europeanisation processes the main argument here is that identity still is an underestimated object of europeanisation theories but that the rise of hybrid identities and with it the manifestation of europeanised national identities instead of a european identity all over europe holds the explicit potency to establish the missing relationship between european citizens and eu politics this would lead suddenly to a strengthened legitimization of european union policies as well as people's belief in the justification of a supranational polity within a system of multi level governance
