a fresh modern prose retelling captures the vigorous and bawdy spirit of chaucer s classic renowned critic historian and biographer peter ackroyd takes on what is arguably the greatest poem in the english language and presents the work in a prose vernacular that makes it accessible to modern readers while preserving the spirit of the original a mirror for medieval society chaucer s canterbury tales concerns a motley group of pilgrims who meet in a london inn on their way to canterbury and agree to take part in a storytelling competition ranging from comedy to tragedy pious sermon to ribald farce heroic adventure to passionate romance the tales serve not only as a summation of the sensibility of the middle ages but as a representation of the drama of the human condition ackroyd s contemporary prose emphasizes the humanity of these characters as well as explicitly rendering the naughty good humor of the writer whose comedy influenced fielding and dickens yet still masterfully evokes the euphonies and harmonies of chaucer s verse this retelling is sure to delight modern readers and bring a new appreciation to those already familiar with the classic tales

playing the canterbury tales addresses the additions continuations and reordering of the canterbury tales found in the manuscripts and early printed editions of the tales many modern editions present a specific set of tales in a specific order and often leave out an entire corpus of continuations and additions andrew higl makes a case for understanding the additions and changes to chaucer s original open and fragmented work by thinking of them as distinct interactive moves in a game similar to the storytelling game the pilgrims play using examples and theories from new media studies higl demonstrates that the tales are best viewed as an interactive fiction reshaped by active readers readers participated in the ongoing creation and production of the tales by adding new text and rearranging existing text and through this textual transmission they introduced new social and literary meaning to the work this theoretical model and the boundaries between the canonical and apocryphal texts are explored in six case studies the spurious prologues of the wife of bath s tale john lydgate s influence on the tales the northumberland manuscript the ploughman character and the cook s tale the canterbury tales are a more dynamic and unstable literary work than usually encountered in a modern critical edition

the canterbury tales was chaucer s magnum opus he used the tales and the descriptions of the characters to paint an ironic and critical portrait of english society at the time and particularly of the church structurally the collection resembles the decameron which chaucer may have come across during his first diplomatic mission to italy in 1372 the tales are told as part of a story telling contest by a group of pilgrims as they travel together on a journey from southwark to the shrine of saint thomas becket at canterbury cathedral

the canterbury tales and other poems geoffrey chaucer an oddly diverse group of twenty nine people meet at an inn each of them is on a pilgrimage to a martyr s shrine in canterbury the host suggests the strange bunch journey together and tell stories to pass the time the group heads off including a knight a miller a wife a cook a shipman and a nun among others telling stories that range from bawdy exploits to foolish workers to the lives of saints a classic of english literature this unabridged version of geoffrey chaucer s the canterbury tales was first published in the early 1400s and edited into modern english by d laing purves in 1879 purves s collection of chaucer s works also contains troilus and cressida and additional poems and prose

the same artistic techniques of contrast cross referencing and leitmotif which unify the individual tales he used to unify the multitalle fragments and to ensure the coherence of the whole project even when they do not share the same tone point of view narrator or genre the tales within each fragment belong together because they share the same themes and types of characters and perhaps most indicative of chaucer s ideas of order they share the same structure these parallels which pervade every fragment of the canterbury tales insist that certain tales and no others be joined to form a coherent aesthetic unit therefore each fragment regardless of its intended position in a overall scheme which chaucer never completed is a coherent work of art by examining the methods chaucer used to link the tales into clearly defined and coherent fragments professor mandel shows how chaucer designed and built the tales to fit together with mutual coherence

the canterbury tales middle english tales of caunterbury is a collection of 24 stories that runs to over 17 000 lines written in middle english by geoffrey chaucer between 1387 1400 in 1386 chaucer became controller of customs and justice of peace and in 1389 clerk of the king s work it was during these years that chaucer began working on his most famous text the canterbury tales the tales mostly written in verse although some are in prose are presented as part of a story telling

the object of this volume is to place before the general reader our two early poetic masterpieces the canterbury tales and the faerie queen to do so in a way that will render their popular perusal easy in a time of little leisure and unbounded temptations to intellectual languor and on the same conditions to present a liberal and fairly representative selection from the less important and familiar poems of chaucer and spenser there is it may be said at the outset peculiar advantage and propriety in placing the two poets side by side in the manner now attempted for the first time although two centuries divide them yet spenser is the direct and really the immediate successor to the poetical inheritance of chaucer those two hundred years eventful as they were produced no poet at all worthy to take up the mantle that fell from chaucer s shoulders and spenser does not need his affected archaisms nor his frequent and reverent appeals to dan geffrey to vindicate for himself a place very close to his great predecessor in the literary history of england if chaucer is the well of english undefiled spenser is the broad and stately river that yet holds the tenure of its very life from the fountain far away in other and ruder scenes the canterbury tales so far as they are in verse have been printed without any abridgement or designed change in the sense but the two tales in prose chaucer s tale of meliboeus and the parson s long sermon on penitence have been contracted so as to exclude thirty pages of unattractive prose and to admit the same amount of interesting and characteristic poetry the gaps thus made in the prose tales however are supplied by careful outlines of the omitted matter so that the reader need be at no loss to comprehend the whole scope and sequence of the original with the faerie queen a bolder course has been pursued

this introductory guide places the canterbury tales in the context of the crisis in english society in the fourteenth century it examines the social diversity of chaucer s pilgrims the stylistic range of their tales and the psychological richness of their interaction the volume offers students a clear image of the powerful representation of the social reality that makes the canterbury tales one of the most important texts in english literature emphasis is placed on the language of the poem the place of chaucer in subsequent literary tradition and an entire chapter is devoted to the general prologue which is widely studied on undergraduate courses finally the volume offers a helpful chronology of the period and an invaluable guide to further reading

the canterbury tales recounts the stories told by pilgrims to one another as they make their way from london to canterbury cathedral this volume contains the introduction to those tales by describing the characters who are embarking upon that pilgrimage the facing page contains chaucer s original text as it was written in fourteenth century middle english alongside there is room in the wide outer margins for students to write their own notes on the general prologue or perhaps to define unfamiliar key words the reverse side of each page contains a new translation into modern english the translation into modern english differs only slightly from those found elsewhere here the key difference is that lines are translated separately thereby avoiding the problem seen in some translations that words are borrowed from adjacent lines to help maintain chaucer s rhyming structure accordingly this translation adheres more closely to chaucer s own words although in doing so it may occasionally contain rather more descriptive explanations than is usual in translated works nevertheless this word for word approach will greatly assist those new to chaucer s middle english parents will be pleased that the general prologue contains no lewdness or vulgarity as can be found in some of the other canterbury tales in this regard it may appropriately be studied at middle school level this volume contains the complete and unabridged text with line numbers a helpful translation and a personal study notebook which means it offers excellent value for money the translator was educated at st chad s college durham warwick exeter and de montfort universities lately he was both a hardwicke and sir thomas more scholar of lincoln s inn london his publications include works on english law and literature
