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extending the discussion of critical content analysis to the visual realm of picturebooks and graphic novels this book provides a clear research methodology for understanding and analyzing visual imagery offering strategies for reading illustrations in global and multicultural literature chapter authors explore and bring together critical theory and social semiotics while demonstrating how visual analysis can be used to uncover and analyze power ideologies inequity and resistance in picturebooks and graphic novels this volume covers a diverse range of texts and types of books and offers tools and procedures for interpreting visual images to enhance the understandings of researchers teachers and students as they engage with the visual culture that fills our world these methods are significant not only to becoming a critical reader of literature but to also becoming a critical reader of visual images in everyday life

the first amendment ideal of an independent press allows american journalists to present critical perspectives on government policies and actions but are the media independent of

government in practice here jonathan mermin demonstrates that when it comes to military intervention journalists over the past two decades have let the government itself set the terms and boundaries of foreign policy debate in the news analyzing newspaper and television reporting of u s intervention in grenada and panama the bombing of libya the gulf war and u s actions in somalia and haiti he shows that if there is no debate over u s policy in washington there is no debate in the news journalists often criticize the execution of u s policy but fail to offer critical analysis of the policy itself if actors inside the government have not challenged it mermin ultimately offers concrete evidence of outside washington perspectives that could have been reported in specific cases and explains how the press could increase its independence of washington in reporting foreign policy news the author constructs a new framework for thinking about press government relations based on the observation that bipartisan support for u s intervention is often best interpreted as a political phenomenon not as evidence of the wisdom of u s policy journalists should remember that domestic political factors often influence foreign policy debate the media mermin argues should not see a washington consensus as justification for downplaying critical perspectives

this book integrates humanist approaches in enabling both spiritual growth and social science knowledge in advocating for the emancipation of exploited women children and youth based on critical realism through an autoethnographic account of the first author s journey from being a secular jew through anglicanism to quakerism and then islam a pacifist based social science methodology is developed this approach describes attempts to understand and liberate sexually exploited youths in bangladesh exploited women and girls in pakistan and struggling women in gaza palestine the model attempts to integrate moral goals of judaism christianity and islam in seeking peaceful co operation secular humanism is added creating a research model which seeks the enhancement of human welfare through the universal ethic of the social contract in which humans and their welfare are both interesting and exciting a review of research on child sexual exploitation elaborates the model of child centred humanism

grouping entries thematically to help students interested in a specific aspect of communication research to more easily locate directly related entries back matter includes a chronology of the development of the field of communication research a resource guide to classic books journals and associations a glossary introducing the terminology of the field and a detailed index entries conclude with references further readings and cross references to related entries to guide students further in their research journeys the index reader's guide themes and cross references combine to provide robust search and browse in the e version

marcus clarke's bohemia is the first major critical study of marcus clarke arguably australia's best known and most important nineteenth century writer it situates clarke both within the bohemian culture of melbourne and a burgeoning cosmopolitan print culture extending beyond national borders marcus clarke's bohemia offers detailed readings of clarke's major works many of which have not previously been discussed and traces the influence of other european writers on clarke's writing importantly it focuses on his engagement with the modernity of the place and time in which he worked and lived mccann's in depth study unearths the richness of clarke's writing and brings nineteenth century melbourne to life impeccably researched and gracefully written marcus clarke's bohemia is challenging and compelling reading

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
