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examines the relationship between health literacy and health outcomes and the role of schools in promoting health literacy through the curriculum this volume utilizes research literature reviews and case studies that examine how education can support health literacy development as a vital 21st century citizenship competency

health promotion is a key mechanism in tackling the foremost health challenges faced by developing and developed nations covering key concepts theory and practical aspects this new edition continues to focus on the themes central to health promotion practice worldwide social determinants equality and equity policy and health working in partnerships sustainability evaluation and evidence based practice are detailed and the critical application of health promotion to practice is

outlined throughout the book beginning with the foundations of this important area in this new edition the authors then place greater emphasis on the role of power within health and communities drawing upon international settings and teaching experience in the global north and south it finishes with a summary of the future directions of professional health promotion practice placing a strong emphasis on a global context this book provides an accessible and engaging resource for postgraduate students of health promotion public health nursing and related subjects health practitioners and ngos

this book brings together recent international scholarship on the links between education and health and recent research evidence evaluating the processes and outcomes of health promoting schools initiatives the book arises out of the education and health in partnership conference which took place in egmond aan zee the netherlands in september 2002 the key aims of the conference were to focus on effective partnership working for health in schools and to consider the evidence base for health promoting schools programmes a significant outcome of the conference was the egmond agenda which outlines the principal components for success in establishing health promoting schools contributors from across europe the united states south africa and australia present findings from national health promoting school projects with a particular emphasis on the promotion of mental health the volume will be of interest to all education and health professionals interested in the contributions of schools in promoting health empowerment action competence and wellbeing of young people

the idea for this volume developed when we were co teaching our introductory master s level course in the department of health behavior at the uab school of public health a core course for all masters of public health students in the school regardless of the department in which they enrolled or the focus of their studies hence in the course we sought to provide both students in our department as well as those who might not ever again take a health behavior course with an overview that would both truly represent the field and substantially provide educational research and public health practice benefits this was and continues to be a challenge with the diversity of students specializing in fields that include not only health behavior but also bio statistics environmental health sciences epidemiology health care organization and policy international health and maternal and child health the course that we taught attempted to provide the students with an overview of some of the important health promotion and disease prevention theories methods and policy issues while reviewing applications of these theories and methods to promoting health and preventing disease through a variety of channels for a variety of disease outcomes and among a variety of populations since no one text provided this variety of readings we depended on readings and guest lectures

there is growing evidence from developed and developing countries that community based approaches are effective in improving the health of individuals and populations this is especially true when the social determinants of health are

considered in the design of the community based approach with an aging population and an emphasis on health promotion the united states is increasingly focusing on community based health and health care preventing disease and promoting health calls for a holistic approach to health interventions that rely more heavily upon interprofessional collaborations however the financial and structural design of health professional education remains siloed and largely focused on academic health centers for training despite these challenges there are good examples of interprofessional community based programs and curricula for educating health professionals in may 2014 members of the institute of medicine s global forum on innovation in health professional education came together to substantively delve into issues affecting the scale up and spread of health professional education in communities participants heard a wide variety of individual accounts from innovators about work they are undertaking and opportunities for education with communities in presenting a variety of examples that range from student community service to computer modeling the workshop aimed to stimulate discussions about how educators might better integrate education with practice in communities building health workforce capacity through community based health professional education summarizes the presentations and discussion of this event
