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the aim of the textbook is two fold first to serve as an introductory graduate course in algebraic topology and then to provide an application oriented presentation of some fundamental concepts in algebraic topology to the fixed point theory a simple approach based on point set topology is used throughout to introduce many standard constructions of fundamental and homological groups of surfaces and topological spaces the approach does not rely on homological algebra the constructions of some spaces using the quotient spaces such as the join the suspension and the adjunction spaces are developed in the setting of topology only the computations of the

fundamental and homological groups of many surfaces and topological spaces occupy large parts of the book sphere torus projective space mobius band klein bottle manifolds adjunctions spaces borsuk's theory of retracts which is intimately related to the problem of the extendability of continuous functions is developed in details this theory together with the homotopy theory the lifting and covering maps may serve as additional course material for students involved in general topology the book comprises 280 detailed worked examples 320 exercises with hints or references 80 illustrative figures and more than 80 commutative diagrams to make it more oriented towards applications maps between spheres borsuk ulam theory fixed point theorems as applications the book offers some existence results on the solvability of some nonlinear differential equations subject to initial or boundary conditions the book is suitable for students primarily enrolled in algebraic topology general topology homological algebra differential topology differential geometry and topological geometry it is also useful for advanced undergraduate students who aspire to grasp easily some new concepts in algebraic topology and applications the textbook is practical both as a teaching and research document for bachelor master students and first year phd students since it is accessible to any reader with a modest understanding of topological spaces the book aspires to fill a gap in the existing literature by providing a research and teaching document which investigates both the theory and the applications of algebraic topology in an accessible way without missing the main results of the topics covered

several distinctive aspects make dynamical systems unique including treating the subject from a mathematical perspective with the proofs of most of the results included providing a careful review of background materials introducing ideas through examples and at a level accessible to a beginning graduate student li

many basic ideas of algebra and number theory intertwine making it ideal to explore both at the same time certain number theoretic episodes in algebra focuses on some important aspects of interconnections between number theory and commutative algebra using a pedagogical approach the author presents the conceptual foundations of commutati

almost from its inception einstein s general theory of relativity was known to sanction spacetime models harboring singularities until the 1960s however spacetime singularities were thought to be artifacts of the idealizations of the models this attitude evaporated in the face of a series of theorems due largely to stephen hawking and roger penrose which showed that einstein s general theory implies that singularities can be expected to occur in a wide variety of conditions in both gravitational collapse and in cosmology in the light of these results some physicists adopted the attitude that since spacetime singularities are intolerable general relativity contains within itself the seeds of its own destruction others hoped that peaceful coexistence with singularities could be achieved by proving a form of roger penrose s cosmic censorship hypothesis which would place singularities safely inside black holes whatever the attitude one adopts toward spacetime singularities it is evident that they raise a number of foundational problems for physics and have profound implications for the philosophy of space and time however philosophers of science have been slow to awaken to the significance of these developments indeed this is the first serious book length study of the subject by a philosopher of science it features an overview of the literature on singularities as well as an analytic commentary on their significance to a number of scientific and philosophical issues
