this book features contributions from leading experts who present peer reviewed research on how the unprecedented covid 19 pandemic affected u s teachers students parents teaching practices enrolments and institutional innovations offering the first empirical findings exploring educational impacts likely to last for decades the covid 19 pandemic presented the greatest crisis in the history of u s schooling with america s 50 states thousands of school systems and tens of thousands of private and charter schools responding in myriad ways this book brings together peer reviewed empirical research on how u s schools responded and on the educational and health impacts likely to persist for many years contributors explore how the u s responses differed from those in other countries with slower reopening and both reopening and modes of instruction varying widely across states and school sectors compared to european countries u s responses to reopening schools reflected political influences more than health or educational needs though this was less true in market based private and charter schools the pandemic was a catalyst for school choice movements across the u s many parents reacted to school closings by exploring alternatives to traditional public schools including an important and likely permanent innovation small parent created or pod schools as the papers here detail long term student learning loss and health and socioemotional impacts of covid 19 closings may well last for decades the volume concludes by exploring teacher experiences across different sectors following the pandemic covid 19 and schools will be a key resource for academics researchers and advanced students of education education policy and leadership educational research research methods economics sociology and psychology the chapters included in this book were originally published as a special issue of journal of school choice

everywoman a coalition of women s organizations and formations currently numbering 11 combined with individual women affiliates and backed up by a facebook page with more than 100 000 followers was formally organized in august 2017 for the purpose of defending democracy and upholding women s rights and dignity at a time when these are under severe attack not only in the philippines but globally we had come together cutting across diverse socioeconomic ethnic professional ideological and generational backgrounds to propel organized pushback against the further erosion of civic also civil space and of the status and rights that filipino women have fought hard to attain and have won over the years as such our actions in the past years have tended towards the loud and dramatic in the streets in public fora in stinging public statements often joining our voice with those of our allied hubs in tindig pilipinas a book had no space in our crowded blueprint for 2020 but then the covid 19 pandemic happened as with everyone else everywoman s world was turned upside down needing to get back our bearings personally organizationally politically we started discussions to try to understand the situation better including the nature of this global health crisis how it was affecting different aspects of our national life how it was especially reshaping women s lives on the ground how government was responding or not the role of the private sector and other institutions the plight of ordinary citizens we probed our own areas of work and engagement we invited friends and colleagues where we needed help we saw it to be our responsibility to continue to surface and strengthen women s perspectives and agency in these difficult and extraordinary times and thus this book was born emerging from every woman talking to each other and claiming our space to speak up and be heard intent to make a difference especially since we saw no women at the frontlines of the national task force set up by the president to respond to the crisis

disability justice in public health emergencies is the first book to highlight contributions from critical disability scholarship to the fields of public health ethics and disaster ethics it takes up such contributions with the aim of charting a path forward for clinicians bioethicists public health experts and anyone involved in emergency planning to better care for disabled people and thereby for all people in the future across 11 chapters the contributors detail how existing public health emergency responses have failed and still fail to address the multi faceted needs of disabled people they analyze complications in the context of epidemic and pandemic disease and emphasize that vulnerabilities imposed upon disabled people track and foster patterns of racial and class domination the central claim of the volume is that the ethical and political insights of disability theory and activism provide key resources for equitable disaster planning for all the volume builds upon the existing

efforts of disability communities to articulate emergency planning priorities and response measures that take into account the large body of qualitative and quantitative research on disabled people's health needs and experiences it is only by listening to disabled people's voices that we will all fare better in future public health emergencies the book will be of interest to scholars and graduate students working in bioethics disability studies public health policy medical sociology and the medical humanities
