the prime method of inquiry in science is the experiment the key features are control overvariables careful measurement and establishing cause and effect relationships an experiment is an investigation in which ahypothesis is scientifically tested in an experiment an independent variable the cause is manipulated and the dependent variable the effect is measured any extraneous variables are controlled an advantage is that experiments should be objective the views and opinions of the researcher should not affect the results of a study this is good as it makes the data more valid and less bias

this book introduces students of education to the elements of educational psychology it also relates as closely as possible the findings of research to classroom practice in order to make clear the fundamental processes involved in psychological development the book starts with a study of the way in which the young child adapts its behaviour to its environment this study considers some of the key aspects of physical development mainly the central nervous system at the same time the way physical growth and psychological development are influenced by the experience of the individual is also discussed this discussion of development is followed by an examination of the processes of learning with particular attention paid to the works of piaget the salient points of each chapter are brought together in a summary which may be
