the son of sogolon the hunchback princess and maghan known as the handsome sundiata grew up to fulfill the prophesies of the soothsayers that he would unite the twelve kingdoms of mali into one of the most powerful empires ever known in africa which at its peak stretched right across the savanna belt from the shores of the atlantic to the dusty walls of timbuktu retold by generations of griots the guardians of african culture this oral tradition has been handed down from the thirteenth century and captures all the mystery and majesty of medieval african kingship it is an epic tale part history and part legend

this collection of essays introduces students of african literature to the heritage of the african prose narrative starting from its oral base and covering its linguistic and cultural diversity the book brings together essays on both the classics and the relatively new works in all subgenres of the african prose narrative including the traditional epic

the novel the short story and the autobiography the chapters are arranged according to the respective thematic paradigms under which the discussed works fall

they came before columbus reveals a compelling dramatic and superbly detailed documentation of the presence and legacy of africans in ancient america examining navigation and shipbuilding cultural analogies between native americans and africans the transportation of plants animals and textiles between the continents and the diaries journals and oral accounts of the explorers themselves ivan van sertima builds a pyramid of evidence to support his claim of an african presence in the new world centuries before columbus combining impressive scholarship with a novelist s gift for storytelling van sertima re creates some of the most powerful scenes of human history the launching of the great ships of mali in 1310 two hundred master boats and two hundred supply boats the sea expedition of the mandingo king in 1311 and many others in they came before columbus we see clearly the unmistakable face and handprint of black africans in pre columbian america and their overwhelming impact on the civilizations they encountered

sub saharan african history does not feature in the world history of the classical period because it continues to be dominated by an emphasis on local paradigms using hitherto unexplored sources this study places parts of west and also east africa on the map for the ancient world it shows in particular that the main clan and state structures of several west african kingdoms are based on the same dualistic pattern as that of the canaanite israelite and hence also phoenician societies supported by written records oral traditions and cult dramatic performances these similarities suggest the existence of early trans saharan contacts reaching back to the pre roman period the phoenician slave trade appears to have been the single most important factor explaining the transfer of these organizational forms from north

africa to the sub saharan region where they are particularly prominent in the hausa and yoruba societies similar social institutions were transmitted from the semitic world to the horn of africa as a result of the ancient myrrh and frankincense trade their subsequent contextualization and local adaptation led to the rise of a number of great kingdoms in west and east africa some of these polities grew so powerful that they conquered and controlled the successor states of their former metropolitan suzerains dealing with regional history as well the volume presents the development of the west african empires of ghana mali and songhay from the new perspective of ethnogenesis there are numerous original maps charts and photographs to illustrate the text dierk lange is professor of african history at the university of bayreuth in germany he presents here the results of more than thirty years of research devoted to the history of africa and explains his more recent focus on relations with phoenician north africa before his appointment in bayreuth he studied african and islamic history as well as anthropology in paris worked on arabic texts for four years in cairo and taught african and islamic history for five years at the university of niamey he crossed the sahara several times and undertook more than fifteen research trips to nigeria niger and chad his publications in three languages include two books numerous articles in learned journals and two contributions to the unesco history of africa he is unique in comparing african cultural forms with those of the ancient near east

founded in the early thirteenth century the mali empire stretched from the atlantic coast of west africa across the savannah lands to timbuktu and gao comprised of multiple ethnics groups the soninke the mandenka fula soso tuareg sonrai almoravids mali was politically dominated by the mandenka people who developed a comprehensive eloquent and ennobling historical tradition that has garnered international recognition and praise combining music poetry drama storytelling genealogy history and philosophy the malinke griot or jeli interprets mali s history both aesthetically and discursively with the utilitarian objective of maintaining peaceful and ethical social relations within the empire far more than a storyteller the malinke historian s broad scope of knowledge enables them to perform multifaceted roles in the society he she is a political advisor ambassador judicial advisor cultural and social anthropologist historian genealogist mediator of domestic and national disputes officiator of rites of passage ceremonies musician poet and teacher kuma malinke historiography sundiata keita to almamy samori toure examines the philosophy of history and methodology of the malinke historians through an in depth analysis of historical oral literature and the griots own theories of the art of history kai discusses griot accounts of major historical figures such as sundiata keita sumanguru kante sogolon conde mansa musa manding bokari abubakr muhammad ii biton koulibaly almamy samori toure and their impact on mali s history significant components of malinke history that had been kept secret by a general consensus of master griots are exposed for the first time in the english language in this highly informative and insightful text

mali is one of the world s poorest nations and the second largest country of francophone west africa in 1883 it became a colony of france following independence in 1960 the country pursued an aggressive socialist programme under the leadership of modibo keita who was overthrown in a bloodless military coup in 1968 four coup attempts followed in the 1970s and 1980s as well as a highly publicized student strike and two disastrous droughts mali continues to be troubled by political and social tensions this annotated bibliography the first on mali to be published in english provides extensive coverage of english and french language publications on all aspects of the country

mali a country rich with history and culture but one of the poorest in the world emerged in the 1990s as one of africa s most vibrant democracies strengthened by bold political and economic reforms at home mali has emerged as a leader in african peace keeping efforts how has such a transition taken place how have these changes built on mali s rich heritage these are the questions that the contributors to this volume have addressed during the past twenty five years the scholarly research and applied development work of michigan state university faculty and students in mali represents the

most significant combined long term and continuing contribution of any group of university faculty in the united states or europe to the study of malian society economy and politics the applied nature of much of this work has resulted in a significant number of working papers reports and conference presentations this volume represents a coherent and connected set of essays from one american university with a widely known and highly respected role in african development while the essays identify and review mali s unique historical and contemporary path to democracy and development they also contribute to the advancement of theoretical knowledge about african development

introduction to the history of african civilization explores the major issues dominating african civilization from the earliest recorded period to the eve of colonial conquest of the continent c magbaily fyle begins with a discussion of the myths and prejudices underlying most analyses of african issues and moves into a discussion of the origin of humanity the similarities between the classical nile valley civilizations of egypt nubia kush and axum and the spread of islam through african societies he portrays the systems of precolonial government and society including the role of women in governance as well as traditional trade and agricultural patterns fyle provides a new perspective on the islamic jihads shifting focus from sokoto and macina to the senegambia and the upper guinea region and a revised interpretation of the atlantic slave trade which includes the importance of african objectors to this process he also discusses important cultural features such as the traditional african food architecture and typical structures of towns

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
