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teach yourself linguistics is a straightforward introduction to linguistics the systematic study that seeks to answer two fundamental questions what is language and how does language work this book outlines the scope of linguistics explaining the basic concepts and essential terminology it discusses sound patterning syntax and meaning as well as the rapidly growing areas of pragmatics sociolinguistics psycholinguistics and stylistics and it explores language and linguistic typology as well as contemporary uses of language and style in literature advertising and newspapers

written by david hornsby who is a current linguistics lecturer and researcher at the university of kent linguistics the essentials is designed to give you everything you need to succeed all in one place it covers the key areas that students are expected to be confident in outlining the basics in clear jargon free english and then providing added value features like summaries of key books and even lists of questions you might be asked in your seminar or exam the book uses a structure that mirrors many university courses on linguistics with separate chapters focusing on linguistic thought syntax sound systems morphology semantics pragmatics language acquisition and much more

all languages change just as other aspects of human society are constantly changing this book is an introduction to the concepts and techniques of diachronic linguistics the study of language change over time it covers all the major areas of historical linguistics presenting concepts in a clear and concise way while examples are given from a wide range of languages most major concepts and techniques are illustrated by material drawn from the languages of australia and the pacific the needs of undergraduate students of linguistics have been kept firmly in mind but the book will also be of interest to the general reader seeking to understand language and language change this third edition includes a number of rewritten and supplemented sections and new material on grammaticalization ergativity and accusativity language diversification palaeolinguistics and morphological evolution

this accessible text is split into 2 halves initially janet townend takes the reader through the early development and the structure and usage of spoken english in the second half jean walker explains the history and structure of written english including word formation and grammar it is unusual to find both aspects of this fascinating area of human activity combined in one volume these insights form an essential foundation for teachers student teachers teacher trainers and specialists in special needs and literacy it will be of interest to all who speak and write and are involved in helping others to do so janet townend trained as a speech and language therapist and jean walker as an english teacher both are now specialist teachers and trainers in the field of dyslexia literacy and language

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
