feminism is rapidly developing as a significant critical ideology it constitutes a major segment of the contemporary writing in english the two volume anthology has detailed discussions on the writings of anita desai shashi deshpane bharati mukherjee arundhati roy manju kapur kamala das githa hariharan chitra banerjee divakaruni and bapsi sidhwa the central objective of the book is to discuss the

theoretical investigations carried out by indian women writers in their works and to arrive at a deeper understanding of feminist contentions r k dhawan teaches english at s b s college university of delhi he has lectured extensively at many universities including those at sri lanka bangladesh singapore tunisia italy and australia publisher s note

feminism in modern english drama explores the emergence of the new woman in the plays of bernard shaw galsworthy and granville barker and how their dominating role revolutionized the modern drama the emphasis shifted from the male protagonist to the unwomanly woman who is shown more as a product of social economic and political interactions than individual creation the focus is on the early and middle plays of bernard shaw and the influence of ibsen s plays has been given their rightful place most of shaw s major plays from widowers houses to pygmalion come under the purview of the book while the plays of contemporaries like pinero jones and oscar wilde have been discussed to highlight the contrast more interesting are the unknown assertive heroines of galsworthy s middle and late plays from the eldest son and the fugitive to the skin game his women characters remain in oblivion because hardly any scholar has bothered to study them though granville barker is well known as a critic and director of shakespeare s plays his own plays with the new woman as heroine still remain little known in the academic circle in the conclusion the bearing of this early feminism is shown on the feminist playwrights like caryl churchill pam gems et al of the 1980s it is hoped that the present book will prove an asset to those who have keen interest in english drama in addition the students researchers and teachers of english literature will find it an ideal reference book

if the first phase of feminist criticism of english renaissance studies unduly stressed women s victimization the revisionist trend this collection argues is in denial about gender inequality altogether this exciting volume represents the newest post revisionist phase of feminist criticism which tries to integrate the vital insights of both earlier phases of scholarship and to establish a more accurate and nuanced picture of women s relation to early modern english culture features an afterword by gail kern paster and contributions from jean howard kate chedgzoy and grace ioppolo amongst others

gender in translation is a broad ranging imaginative and lively look at feminist issues surrounding translation studies students and teachers of translation studies linguistics gender studies and women s studies will find this unprecedented work invaluable and thought provoking reading sherry simon argues that translation of feminist texts with a view to promoting feminist perspectives is a cultural intervention seeking to create new cultural meanings and bring about social change she takes a close look at specific issues which include the history of feminist theories of language and translation studies linguistic issues including a critical examination of the work of luce irigaray a look at women translators through history from the renaissance to the twentieth century feminist translations of the bible an analysis of the ways in which french feminist texts such as de beauvoir s the second sex have been translated into english

critical alliances argues that late victorian and modernist feminist authors saw in literary representations of female collaboration an opportunity to produce new gender and economic roles for women it is not often that one thinks of female allegiances such as kinship networks cultural inheritance or lesbian marriage as influencing the marketplace nor does one often think of economic models when theorizing feminist cooperation's brooke cameron suggests that through their representations of female partnership feminist authors

such as virginia woolf olive schreiner george egerton amy levy and michael field redefined the gendered marketplace and with it women s professional opportunities interdisciplinary at its core and using a contextual approach critical alliances selects cultural texts and theories relevant to each writer s particular intervention in the marketplace chapters look at how different forms of feminist collaboration enabled women to stake their claim to one of the many emergent professions at the turn of the century

the goal of the editors in this volume is to build on and empirically flesh out the feminist argument that law cannot be thought of as simply a determining force in the defining of woman it must be thought of as a site of struggle the editors and contributors explore and analyze law as a gendering practice assuming that law is a practice that interacts with other practices to produce meanings about gender
